375,000th Member Initiated



Regions I and II joined forces in Morristown, New Jersey, for a starstudded joint regional conference, hosted by Pi Upsilon at Drew University. More than 200 brothers gathered for fellowship and fun, as well as leadership and, of course service! The Hollywood themed

conference ended with a special red carpet event, featuring the APO stars of service.

Nu Rho Chapter at the College of William & Mary in Williamsburg, Virginia, hosted the Region III Conference, "Service through History." Although it was a weekend of torrential rainfall for Virginia, brothers from all seven Region III sections braved the weather for leadership and operations workshops, as well as for service. A highlight from the weekend was the doll making service project for children with serious illnesses.

Gamma Lambda Chapter at Clemson University in South Carolina hosted the Region IV Conference. The "Cracker Barrel" family game night both bonded the brothers in attendance as well as revved their competitive nature. Intense games of Jenga, UNO and Barrel O' Monkeys were the highlight of the weekend. Brothers in attendance also participated in a photo challenge, workshops, and a hike to a local waterfall park.

"SERVICE ROCKS" was the theme of the Region V Conference, and rocked it did! Hosted by Theta Upsilon at Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland, Ohio, this regional conference set record attendance numbers with almost 500 registered brothers. The weekend featured 50 different workshops and a banquet for local alumni and graduating seniors. The event was topped off with a rockand-roll-era prom, complete with its very own prom king and queen.

Alpha Gamma Chapter at Purdue University in West Lafayette, Indiana, hosted more than 350 brothers who enjoyed a weekend of a "Service Odyssey" at the Region VI Conference. A costume banquet, featuring everyone from the Mario Bros to Bob the Builder, was held Saturday night of the conference. The



highlight of the conference was the presentation of 11 H. Roe Bartle Chapter awards and numerous Chapter of Excellence and Pledge Program of Excellence awards.

Brothers from all across Region VII gathered in College Station, Texas, for the Region VII Conference, hosted by Xi Delta Chapter at Texas A&M University. Brothers in attendance had the opportunity to participate in an amazing fellowship night on Friday, put together Halloween bags for the Texas Boys and Girls Club, purchase APO merchandise at a regional garage sale fundraiser, attend educational workshops, and have a blast at an awards banquet and dance on Saturday. In addition, 18 Life Members and seven 1925 Club members were enrolled over the weekend.

Region VIII saddled up chapters for a country-and-western conference, co-hosted by Gamma Xi Chapter at Rockhurst University and Alpha Eta Chapter at the University of Missouri - Kansas City. More than 300 brothers attended. Weekend highlights included "Pie your Brother," which raised \$200 for Project Linus and \$312 for Haitian relief efforts.

It was a "Great Night under Northern Lights" for more than 130 brothers who traveled to Duluth, Minnesota, for the Region IX Conference, hosted by Nu Mu Chapter at the University of Minnesota Duluth. Brothers across the region created 133 holiday cards for troops stationed in Afghanistan. However, the highlight of the conference was the petitioning ceremony for the University of Wisconsin - Whitewater extension group.

The Region X Conference, "APO & the Chocolate Factory," hosted by Iota Phi Chapter at the University of California at Davis, was a sweet success with a Mr. and Ms. APO contest, amazing roll calls, and a fabulous banquet where Dr. Elizabeth Tom received the Distinguished Service Key for her many years of service to the region.

YEARS OF SERVICE O LOCAL CAMP

t the end of January, Tau Beta Chapter at Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina, celebrated the 20th anniversary of its service to Camp Ginger Cascades, an American Camp Association (ACA) accredited camp for girls near Lenoir, North Carolina.

"Camp Ginger Cascades is a place for girls to be themselves. It gives them a chance to explore the natural world and grow as young people. Camp allows them to make new friends and gain an appreciation of the world around them," said Cynthia TeWinkle, program manager for Camp Ginger Cascades.

The camp stretches over 226 acres of forested land in the Brushy Mountains of North Carolina. The camp has four sleeping units, a small lake, a swimming pool, a challenge course, rock climbing, bike paths, volleyball courts and an





array of other outdoor activities. As one might imagine, maintenance at the camp is quite a chore. However, maintenance is necessary to keep up with the number of visitors and the accreditation requirements of the ACA.

Acknowledging the needs of the camp, Tau Beta started its service there in the fall of 1990 with a simple deal with the camp's former ranger, Doug Taylor. Tau Beta's vice president of service at the time, Brother Kelly Satterwhite Harrington, Tau Beta '87, was looking for a place for the chapter to gather for bonding, planning and camping. Having visited the camp as a girl, she knew it would be the perfect place to hold their meetings.

"[Ranger Doug] needed help winterizing the camp. We needed a free place to gather and work. So a beautiful relationship was forged," said Brother Harrington.

In exchange for their stay at the camp, the chapter

committed to helping tear down the 12' x 9' canvas platform tents that made up one of

the sleeping units. However, Ranger

Doug wasn't 100 percent sold on having college students stay at the camp, out of fear of inappropriate behavior. However, he quickly learned that the chapter members were trustworthy and hard working.

After that year, knowing the chapter was willing to work, the camp ranger called Tau Beta back in the fall of 1991 to tear down tents, and again in the spring to help put the tents back up in preparation for camp season. After that year, a relationship was forged; the chapter continues its work with the camp to this day.

"When the project started, we enjoyed it and looked to continue the project the next semester. After a few semesters of 'looking' to continue the project, it was just assumed that we were going to camp," said Brother Glenn Stuart, Tau Beta '90 and long-term volunteer at

Camp Ginger Cascades. "Scheduling the project was no longer a matter of asking if they wanted us back, but rather, what weekend was good. That is still the case today."

Over the past 20 years, Tau Beta's project has evolved from tent maintenance. Brothers now cover a variety of projects during their work weekends, including splitting wood, landscaping, installing flooring, maintaining trails, digging ditches, demolition, construction and





clearing brush. Tau Beta assisted in constructing a permanent boardwalk and replacing the tents with permanent cabin structures built by the chapter members.

"Once they start a project, they refuse to let weather or a lack of daylight stop them from completing it. One spring weekend, during a cold rain, they would not stop splitting wood, even after nightfall, until I took the tools from them. I have never known a more dedicated, harder working group in my 60 years," said Skip Mosher, Honorary Member '02 and Camp Ginger Cascades Camp Ranger (1999-2009).

As with most chapters, Tau Beta's membership numbers have fluctuated over the years. However, when times were tough and numbers were down, the chapter and the camp could rely on Tau Beta alumni to pull through and keep up the work weekends. This is one of the many things that make this project unique: the hard work and dedication of not only the active members of the chapter, but also the alumni volunteers who have kept the project going for these 20 years.

"I attribute the longevity of this project to several factors. First, the relationship Tau Beta established with the Camp Ginger Cascades Rangers... Second, we have a large core of 'hard core' alumni who are very loyal to both the chapter and this project..." said Brother Harrington. "Third, the nature of the project. Many times service is performed where you don't see the immediate fruits of your labor. Brothers can physically see when they finish a task that they are doing something to benefit the camp and the girls. The have instantaneous, tangible evidence of their hard work."

The project continues to evolve and change to bring in more volunteers and complete

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more necessary projects for the camp. A few years ago, Tau Beta started hosting "open Ginger weekends" where other chapters can come out and

spend a weekend serving the camp and experiencing fellowship at its best. More than once the chapter has hosted a Section 79 Service Weekend at the camp and hopes to keep bringing other chapters in to experience this project.

"I love how Tau Beta has opened up the Ginger Cascades service weekend to other chapters. At least once a year, anyone who RSVPs to the event can come and participate. I'd love to see more chapters form relationships with Boy or Girl Scout camps in their areas," said Brother Harrington.

ctor George Clooney, who plays corporate downsizer Ryan Bingham in 2009's highly lauded film "Up in the Air," imparts a bit of wisdom to the dozens of employees he lays off each day across America: "Anybody who ever built an empire, or changed the world, sat where you are now. And it's because they sat there that they were able to do it."

In the film, and in the current economy, job loss is a fact of life. Comments about building empires and changing the world can sound trite to someone who's just lost their livelihood. Yet Ryan Bingham's words ring true: Losing a job can create a whole new world.

One way to begin creating that world is to spend time volunteering while you conduct your job search. The benefits you receive from volunteering will help keep you motivated, focused and ready to step into your next position.

BENEFIT #1: Increased Self-Confidence

Helping someone less fortunate or seeing a need in your community and filling it can help you feel valued and gain a sense of accomplishment. In turn, the better you feel about yourself, the more likely you are to have a positive view of your life and future possibilities.

Benefit #2: Greater Networking Opportunities

If you're used to spending the majority of your day with other people, you're bound to miss the social interaction being employed provides. Volunteering gets you back in the saddle and lets you practice and develop social skills.

Benefit #3: Free Career Exploration

A job loss can be a freeing experience, especially if you've been toying with the idea of changing career fields. Let's say you're a computer programmer who's always had a secret longing to work outdoors.

give you a taste
of what outdoor work is all
about, while also giving you
the chance to network with
others already in the field.

Benefit # 4: Sharper Business Skills

When you volunteer, you get to put into practice and develop the skills you used in the workplace: teamwork,

communication, problem solving, project planning, task management and organization.

Benefit #5: Lowers "Red Flags"

Most hiring managers look for continuity and growth when reviewing a person's resume. Time not accounted for often raises the question "What were you doing during that time?" Volunteering gives you the answer. Highlight on your resume the skills you learn formally or informally, and be prepared to talk about the outcome of your volunteer projects. A resume with accomplishments such as "Led a team of 25 in raising \$10K for the local homeless shelter" offers a perfect opportunity for you to discuss your fundraising, motivational and teambuilding skills, among others.

Benefit #6: Help Others Prosper

Robert Rosenthal, communications director for San Francisco-based nonprofit VolunteerMatch, says that for nonprofits, "recession-era volunteers can be a crucial tonic for two ailments. On the one hand, recessions create more demand for nonprofit services in the community as more Americans move down the economic ladder. On the other, as fundraising drops, volunteers can fill critical gaps in staffing and make it

possible for a program to continue, albeit it in a more limited form."

Perhaps you've been approached by your company's version of George Clooney's character, Ryan Bingham. Take heart. The world is just waiting for someone with your skills, your commitment and your drive to build empires.

Database Update Progress Report

In November 2009, Alpha Phi Omega provided Harris Connect, a company that works with hundreds of organizations to gather and maintain data to build, reinforce and maintain bonds among organization members, more than 260,000 names and addresses in an attempt to update our membership directory. The company will update as many of our records as possible. For years, the Fraternity has maintained contact with only Life Members; therefore, the 80 percent of APO members who are not Life Members do not have up-to-date contact information in the Fraternity database. We want to celebrate who and what we are, and we should be doing that with the majority of our alumni, not just those who buy a Life Membership.


The work Harris Connect is doing is at no cost to the Fraternity; however, the information collected by the company will be used to create a membership directory coffee table book called How We Serve. This book will not only share a listing of current members, but will feature our members' stories and photos from their experiences as community service leaders. In addition to demonstrating the leadership of our

alumni members, How We Serve will give us an idea of how successful we are in developing campus and community leaders. The revenue from the sale of the book is how Harris Connect will make its money. There is no obligation to purchase the book, and it is an option to simply update your information for database purposes without purchasing the book.

Harris Connect has sent e-mails to members, asking them to call the company and update their information. Harris Connect will continue to contact alumni until late this spring. These e-mails are legitimate attempts to update our database and are not spam.

The Fraternity has already benefited by receiving updates to more than 35,000 e-mail addresses that we're adding to our distribution list for our electronic communications. With this updated information, the Fraternity will be able to reconnect with members who have been disconnected from the brotherhood with hopes of reigniting this relationship.
