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#### Notes from the Field

High Five, Low Five, the Fraternity's Chapter Consultants have said hello to Region V! This fall, Region V welcomed the Chapter Consultant staff with open arms, and open ideas. The Chapter Consultants have been able to help in a variety of ways. One area of focus has been the importance of valuing membership. Each brother and pledge has something unique to offer, and chapter growth is the responsibility of everyone, not just the executive board. The Chapter Consultants worked with chapters on incorporating committee structure into their programming, specifically service and fellowship. By giving each person in the chapter a responsibility, each person can "own" a piece of the chapter, and have a greater feeling of belonging. A great example of a chapter that has started to develop and utilize committees is the Alpha Iota Chapter at The Ohio State University in Columbus. Each chapter officer serves as a committee head, and the members involved actually work together to plan and execute events. It was wonderful to see everyone excited and re-motivated to participate in chapter operations!

The Chapter Consultants never thought they could learn so much about geography from looking at the palm of their hand, however their time in Region VI taught them just that! They have learned their way around Michigan just by staring intently at "the mitten" and working with students across the state. One chapter particularly eager to teach the

Consultants about the terrain was the Iota Chi Chapter at Northern Michigan University in Marquette; in fact, they learned through experience during the visit. The Chapter Consultant assisted the chapter on a service project; volunteering at an area Boy Scout camp, helping Cub Scouts learn about basic wilderness skills. Iota Chi Chapter works very closely with the Boy Scouts throughout each semester, which correlates perfectly with another key area of focus: setting in place consistency in the service program. It is so important to form relationships with organizations on and off campus and cultivate them through consistent contact.

Through working with

chapters this semester, the Chapter Consultants learned much more than just geography lessons. One of the most valuable pieces of knowledge gained was the importance of creating chapter identity. Alpha Tau Chapter at Butler University in Indianapolis, Indiana, is one chapter that particularly showcases how important it is to develop a sense of brotherhood and reaffirm the membership of the active body. With a solid identity, chapters can more easily demonstrate the principles of Alpha Phi Omega. The interaction the Chapter Consultants had with students in Alpha Tau Chapter was truly inspiring. Since the visit the chapter has grown from less than ten members to close to thirty – in this semester alone! The chapter had all of the tools it needed to succeed; the students just needed a boost of confidence and training in recruitment skills to lead them to success.

#### Chapter Consultant Opening

Alpha Phi Omega is in the process of hiring a Chapter Consultant. A Chapter Consultant is a member of APO who wants to help improve the Fraternity. The person in this twoyear position will travel to campuses across the country to provide extension groups with the tools they need to charter, such as recruitment training, officer training, officer transition workshops and project planning. The Chapter Consultant will also facilitate a goal-setting session for each group and represent APO in meetings with university administrators on campuses where the Fraternity wishes to expand.

In providing this service to extension groups, the Chapter Consultant will work closely with the Director of Educational Programs at the National Office, regional directors and their staff, sectional chairs, and other volunteers. The person in this position will be based out of the National Office in Independence, Missouri; however, he or she will be expected to travel extensively during the school year (80 percent of the time).

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#### Become an APO LEADS Presenter Through Online Training TODAY!

The Leadership Development Committee and its training team adapted the training program and presenter development materials into a series of online and live sessions, which will allow the Fraternity to develop new alumni presenters and prepare them for becoming fully certified by or at the National Convention in Anaheim.

A series of online courses was developed in order to familiarize potential presenters with the course materials and with presentation styles. Live courses now focus mainly on practice, watching potential presenters go through the material and determining if they are comfortable with and understand the material to be full-fledged presenters. Therefore, it is mandatory to attend an online session for the class you want to present. In order to attend the practical session, you will first need to complete the online session. Facilitators assign parts for the live training based on who has gone

through the online trainings; therefore, attendance is a requirement.

The practical session is limited to four participants per trainer, so register early!

Basic Skills and content training were offered in this new format since the 2010 National Convention. Please keep in mind that in order to complete content training, you need to attend the online curriculum review and attend the live practical session to be certified in the course.

Prior to taking the content practical session, you need to complete the following items:

- 1. Taken the course in question (Launch, Achieve, etc.)
- 2. Completed and passed the Basic Skills courses
- 3. Attended the online curriculum review for the specific module
- 4. Registered for the practical session at the National Convention
- 5. Attended the practical session at the National Convention





Advancements in technology enable Alpha Phi Omega brothers to reach out to more potential members than ever before and extend the hand of Leadership, Friendship and Service. This, in turn, will bring the Fraternity closer to its goal of 500 chapters by 2025.

The Fraternity entered the digital age in 1989. Since that time, APO has continued to meet brothers' ever-increasing need for information. Earlier this

year, the Fraternity advanced its online presence by launching the Chapter Officer Portal and creating a new, improved website. These updates streamline and enhance how the Fraternity conducts business and interacts with brothers and potential members.

#### Chapter Officer Portal


In fall 2012, the Fraternity transitioned from paper rosters and forms to the Chapter Officer Portal (OP), a new chapter membership management system at *https://op.apo.org*. The transition to the OP allows for a more streamlined and efficient approach for our chapters. This is exactly what our chapter officers need to enable them to be more self-reliant, to manage deadlines and to make it more realistic to meet reporting requirements.

"As with all our relationships, our members' priorities are paramount. By moving chapter operations to the OP, we enable chapter officers to leverage real-time data, its processes and information while realizing the true benefits of cloud computing that help drive innovation and deliver faster member services." said Christy Byrns, Director of Technology at the National Office.

The turnaround time for conducting chapter business has been reduced substantially as a result of the transition to the OP. In previous years, the time it took to receive and process a roster ranged from 30 to 60 business days. With the introduction of the OP, updates to the Fraternity's database take a matter of minutes.

#### A New Look for www.apo.org

During the past five years, social media, technological advances and the availability of information have changed the way members access information. With that in mind, the Fraternity recently debuted its



redesigned, reorganized and more user-friendly website. At *www.apo.org*, members have a more personalized experience with the addition of targeted content and social media options.

"The migration to the new website enables greater innovation and productivity, which will in turn generate substantial direct and indirect impacts on Alpha Phi Omega's membership growth," said Byrns.


When you log on, you can read about the history of APO, featured service projects and opportunities, outstanding members, and ways to get involved with APO. The new design and content provide a more accurate feel for what APO is and what the Fraternity stands for. These pages are also great resources for potential members, school administrators and service partners.

The Members page of *www.apo.org* has been enhanced with targeted content for alumni, students, chapter officers and volunteers. For example, alumni have access to alumni-specific resources such as ways to reconnect with APO and its members, news and volunteer opportunities. Students have access to leadership development opportunities, service project ideas, national awards information, and scholarship and grant opportunities.

In addition to the new look and feel of the website, the Fraternity took additional steps to create digital documents, forms and applications that can filled out and submitted electronically, eliminating printing and postage costs.

The website can also be shared with your family, friends and brothers by connecting it to your social media accounts, such as Facebook, YouTube, Pinterest and Twitter. Users can "Like" articles, comment on articles and share videos on the site, which will then post directly on their personal account.

Omicron Upsilon Chapter hosted stations, including Hula Hoop, Corn Hole and Keep the Ball in the Air, before the 5K fundraiser finale, Run for Scouting.

#### **REGION III**

- Omicron Phi Chapter at the University of Richmond in Virginia hosted the 18th annual Teeter for Tots fundraiser. The chapter collected donations for the Friends Association, a nonprofit organization that helps homeless or nearly homeless families stabilize their lives and find or maintain permanent housing.

• Chi Lambda Chapter at Elizabeth City State University in North Carolina paired up with teachers at H L Trigg Alternative School to be a helping hand to the students. Chi Lambda brothers served as mentors to the students to help them with their classwork as well as build their self-esteem.

#### **REGION IV**

• Delta Chapter at Auburn University in Alabama celebrated the chapter's 85th anniversary on November 8.

#### **REGION V**

• Lambda Omicron Chapter at West Virginia University in Morgantown held a bellringing ceremony in memory of students and faculty who passed away over the summer. During the academic year, and as a service to the campus, the chapter conducts this ceremony the Friday after the passing of a WVU student or faculty member.

#### **REGION VI**

- Eta Sigma Chapter at Illinois College in Jacksonville helped spread the word about hunger awareness on the IC campus. The chapter partnered with the Central Illinois Foodbank to chalk campus sidewalks with hunger facts to raise awareness during Hunger Action Month.
- Upsilon Iota Chapter at DePaul University in Chicago volunteered at the hospitality tent for the 2012 Bank of America Chicago Marathon. Chapter members arrived at the event at 4 a.m. to serve breakfast to runners and their families, and then escorted runners to the starting line of the race.

#### **REGION VII**

 Omega Lambda Chapter at Fisk University in Nashville, Tennessee, organized an event with the Red Cross. Students on the campus signed up for appointments to give blood and learn more about how giving blood helps saves lives.

• Beta Sigma Chapter at Texas Tech University in Lubbock co-hosted a cookout for residents of Tent City, a homeless shelter in Lubbock. The event helped kick off a campus-wide service event at Texas Tech.

#### **REGION VIII**

• Delta Beta Chapter at the University of Oklahoma in Norman partnered with the Norman chapter of the American Red Cross to host a Heisman-themed blood drive in the Cate Center lounge at OU.

#### **REGION IX**

• Omega Chapter at Drake University in Des Moines, Iowa, participated in an overnight campus event that served as a Friday night alternative to drinking. Participants enjoyed live entertainment, arts and crafts projects, mini-golf and even hip-hop instruction. The event was free for all students.

#### **REGION X**

- Mu Zeta Chapter at San Francisco State University in California conducted a flash mob on the SFSU campus as a part of their recruitment efforts.

#### **REGION VII**

Brothers from **Delta Pi Chapter at Trinity University in San Antonio, Texas**, dressed up as their favorite superheroes September 19-21, 2012, and hit the Trinity campus asking fellow students to save lives by participating in the chapter's blood drive and bone marrow registry event. The chapter holds blood drives on the campus twice a semester; however, this was the first time they expanded to the bone marrow registry. This year's event resulted in 67 blood donations and 70 bone marrow registry additions.

Chapter members decided to add the bone marrow registry to the annual blood drive after learning that 3,000 people search for a match every day, and matches, even in families, are hard to come by. The only way to give hope to bone marrow patients is to keep adding to the registry. This was a great project for the Trinity campus, especially given the fact that registration takes very little time – just a cheek swab as students pass on their way to their next class. The prime demographic for bone marrow donations is 18 to 44.

"It was wonderful to hear from people who admitted they were nervous about the marrow donation process but were willing to overcome that because they genuinely wanted to help anyone who might need their marrow. I'm so proud of Delta Pi and Trinity for making this event such a success!" said Brother Abigail Geary, Delta Pi '11.


