However, our most important resource, the one that we cannot have enough of, is you – the brothers of APO. You are instrumental to making our big plan a success. You are needed for your selfless contribution of your time, talent and treasure. You are needed to lend your expertise, knowledge and love of the Fraternity to help current chapters, to assist in the formation of new chapters and to help direct college students to APO. We need you, and all of your best efforts, to help us move from what we are to what we can be.

Our big plan is only one part of our future. You, the brothers of this fraternity, will make that plan a reality.


On the other side of the country, the consultants continued to assist the California State University Stanislaus extension group as they worked to complete the chartering process. This group began working

Past National President William S. Roth Passes Away at 84

It is with great sadness and respect that Alpha Phi Omega National Service Fraternity recognizes the passing of Past National President William S. Roth.

Brother Roth was initiated by Rho Chapter at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1949. He was a dedicated leader and loyal brother of Alpha Phi Omega. His passion guided him through the ranks of the Fraternity's leadership. He was elected National President by the 1958



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National Convention. He served in this role until 1962.

During his time as National President, Brother Roth traveled widely, building morale, strengthening chapter programs and pushing the expansion of Alpha Phi Omega. Among Brother Roth's accomplishments was the extension of Alpha Phi Omega to Alaska with the chartering of Nu Omega Chapter at the University of Alaska Fairbanks in 1962. In his first term as National President, Joseph Scanlon was appointed National Executive Director.

Alpha Phi Omega is forever grateful for the service of Brother Roth and

his lasting impact on the Fraternity.

He is survived by his wife, Hazel Harvell Roth; two sons, Chuck Adcock and William Stanley Roth





Jr. (Holly Harrison Roth); seven grandchildren, Katie, Sarah, Mary and Aiden Adcock, and Tyler, Courtney and Haley Roth; and one great-grandchild.





Leading by Example

Brother Sherry Leung, Alpha Beta Xi '11, shares the power of being a leader, being a friend and being of service with students worldwide.

The school day couldn't begin soon enough for service learning instructor Brother Sherry Leung, Alpha Beta Xi '11. The day had finally come when she and her English as a Second Language high school students in Hong Kong, would talk about community service and brainstorm ways to help members of their community. The students, however, did not share Brother Leung's enthusiasm.

"Many of them told me they were not interested in doing community service and thought it was a waste of time," she said. "They didn't think that one person could do anything to really make a positive change."

The more Leung thought about her students' reactions the more those reactions made sense. Most of the children were raised in households where money, food and clothing were scarce; just

trying to get by was a full-time job.

Leung immediately got to work designing an interactive service learning course to help her students see the value in helping others and to help them realize their ability to affect positive change. Her course focused on three components: leadership development opportunities, random acts of direct service for the school community, and time for self-reflection.

“Alpha Phi Omega has been one of the single most important and transformative opportunities in my life,” said Leung, who joined Alpha Beta Xi Chapter at SUNY Geneseo as a freshman. “Not only has it made me a better servant leader but also more aware of the potential each individual has to make a positive change in the world. I wanted to show my students that they have this potential too.”

During one of her classroom lessons, Leung challenged students to complete a random act of kindness by writing thank you cards to members of the school community who had made a positive difference in their lives.

Taking this good deed one step further, Leung asked her students to deliver their cards in person.

“One of my classes got together during the school assembly to deliver their cards to the hard-working and supportive administrative staff,” said Leung. “The staff was shocked by this gesture, and some of them began to cry. As I looked around, I saw how astonished my students looked. Annie, a girl in the class, came up to me afterward and said, ‘Ms. L., I can see the magic now. I can do something to make someone’s life brighter.’”

After, and perhaps because of, her transformative 10-week teaching experience in Hong Kong, Leung decided to take a leave of absence from SUNY Geneseo this fall to student teach in New York City and Kumasi, Ghana, prior to graduating in May 2014.

“Part of the whole growing process both personally and as a leader comes from a willingness to continuously challenge yourself,”

said Leung. “By pushing myself into diverse experiences I’m able to learn more about the world and different cultures and also gain a more realistic understanding of the struggles adolescents might have.”

During her NYC experience, Leung addressed one of those struggles by fostering a culture within the high school where she was teaching that made attending college a viable option.

“For many of us, we knew we would enroll in college. Many of the students I worked with, however, were afraid to have big dreams,” said Leung. “They wanted to go to college but were either unfamiliar

with what they needed to do to get there or they didn’t have anyone to consult with about the process.”

To help facilitate information sharing, Leung developed a college-bound mentorship program that connected high schoolers with college students who could share the value of having an advanced degree and answer questions about higher education.

“Each day I faced challenges that required me to reflect on the lessons I’ve learned about Leadership, Friendship and Service so I could be

the best possible role model. Teaching represents the perfect opportunity to give back to a community on a daily basis.”

Leung is currently in Kumasi, Ghana, completing her final student teaching experience. During her six weeks abroad, Leung has been collaborating with Ghanaian teachers and students to improve their school and community, all while expanding their outlook on what’s possible.

“The common link that ties my experiences together is my time as an APO brother,” she said. “I could not imagine myself taking these great leaps of faith or pushing myself so far

outside of my comfort zone if I hadn’t been provided with opportunities to grow and to be a confident servant leader.”

Not all of us will teach students in Hong Kong, New York City or Kumasi. But just like Brother Leung, we all can affect change and lead by example, no matter where we are.

“There are opportunities everywhere to lend our talents and skills to improve communities,” Leung said. “Sometimes, however, I think we lose sight of the big picture. We may think the service we’re doing isn’t meaningful because it doesn’t reach a wide enough audience or because we can’t see its impact immediately. And because of that it’s easy to get discouraged. Every little bit we do to serve those around us does matter and does leave a positive impact on those that we touch.”

“By making the decision to adopt service into our lifestyle, we truly uphold the oath we all took to give unselfishly of our time and energy to build a program of service for our fraternity, for our college, for the youth of all nations, for our community and for our nation.”

The year was 1946 and the Fraternity was preparing for its first National Convention since 1940 due to the start of World War II. Then National President H. Roe Bartle was preparing to step down as President after serving 15 years in this role during which time the Fraternity grew by more than 100 chapters. A young brother by the name of Robert J. Payne stood before Omicron Chapter at the University of Iowa with the hopes of rallying his brothers for the upcoming school year. What he didn't know at the time was that this rally cry would be shared with brothers nationwide through the November 1946 Torch & Trefoil and help build excitement for a successful 1946 National Convention in Kansas City, Missouri. Though much has changed since this story was originally published, this article is a treasured examination of the Fraternity's Toast Song and lyrics.

Update Note: Alpha Phi Omega acknowledges the importance of brotherhood among all people. In 1976, the Fraternity overwhelmingly voted to include women among its brothers as full members. The words in the Toast Song are interpreted by the Fraternity to include all members of Alpha Phi Omega. For the purposes of this article, the Fraternity adapted pronouns from the original to be more reflective of the diversity of APO. Additionally, the second verse of the Toast Song is absent from this article since it was not adopted until the 1964 National Convention.


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


