

University of Washington



In Father Time's Record Book

On the cover of this issue is depicted that the achievements of Alpha Phi Omega for 1948 stand out as the biggest and best thus far in the history of our brotherhood. Drawn by the skillful hand of Brother Del Jay Kinney, Father Time tells us a graphic story. Let's take a look at the record:

- 1. Service. Evidence is conclusive that Alpha Phi Omega has done more in the past year to deserve its title of "National Service Fraternity" than in any previous period. Reports which have reached the national office from College Presidents, Deans, Chapter Officers and Advisors indicate that Alpha Phi Omega is making its services more effective and far-reaching on campuses throughout the nation. The magnitude of the service being rendered has leaped to new heights during 1948.
- 2. Leadership Opportunities. Unsolicited testimonials from chapter leaders tell of the joy and satisfaction they are receiving in their work in Alpha Phi Omega and the part which this organization has played in developing their leadership capacities. It is significant that this fraternity can render such values to its own members while promoting an extensive program of Service to Others.
- **3. Administration.** The use of the Manual of Administration has been a real factor in improving operating methods. Specific training of new officers and advisors concerning their responsibilities has increased. The use of the Executive Committee is effective as a planning body. The use of a chapter calendar to announce activities well in advance has been a great asset in many chapters.
- 4. Membership. Again the record at the close of 1948 shows more men participating actively in Alpha Phi Omega than ever before. The great majority of chapters are larger now than at any previous time, and this increase is proportionately reflected in their ability to "get things done". Thirty-seven new chapters have been installed in the past year, bringing the total number of chapters to 172.
- 5. Faculty Advisorship. The constant increase of interest and leadership on the part of Faculty Advisors and Scouting Advisors has aided immeasurably in the progress of the chapters. With more than passing interest, many advisors are giving the utmost cooperation and service in their chapters.
- 6. Personal Visitation of chapters by members of the national executive board has been increased, and these visits have aided in many ways. Although all chapters have not been visited recently, these contacts are expected to continue during 1949 and in future years.
- 7. National Office Service. A vastly increased amount of fraternity material has been furnished to the chapters in the past year. In addition, expansion of the office space, installation of an addressograph system and other new facilities are enabling your office to keep pace with the growing needs of the fraternity.

While last year's record does sound fine, Let's better it in 1949!

A new service we have inaugurated on campus this year is infirmary messenger service for ill students.



EXPANSION

As started last Spring, a special key is available for award purposes, to be presented by any chapter which wishes to honor a member who has given outstanding service.


The key bears the three Greek letters of Alpha Phi Omega showing through black enamel. Orders are accepted at the national office only, not direct to the jewelers.

Three qualities are obtainable, 10K at \$9.25, gold plated at \$3.25, and sterling silver at \$2.25. To all prices add 20% federal tax and any state or city sales taxes which apply in your locality.

CONVENTION

When this issue reaches the readers, the 1948 National Convention will be history. As this is written, plans are complete for the largest convention thus far held in Alpha Phi Omega. Advance reservations have been received for 537 chapter representatives. From as widely separated points as Boston, Los Angeles, Seattle and Miami, and points in between, the delegates are on their way to the Windy City.
