THE DEAN LEWIS N. JONES PLEDGE CLASS

The Fall, 1978 Pledge Class is dedicated to Dean Lewis N. Jones, a distinguished student personnel administrator and devoted Alpha Phi Omega Brother. Dean Jones, a native of Texas, was Dean of Students at Texas Tech University until his retirement in February of 1978.

Dean Jones' association with Alpha Phi Omega began when he became an advisor to Beta Sigma Chapter while he was Assistant Dean of Men at Texas Tech University. His service to Beta Sigma covered 29½ years as an advisor, 29 of which were spent as Advisory Chairman. The chapter has honored him by naming two pledge classes for him and establishing the Lewis N. Jones Scholarship.

He is a graduate of Texas Tech, receiving both his Bachelors and Masters degrees there. He was a well-known football player at Tech, and played professional football in 1943. After serving in the Navy in



World War II, he returned to Texas, where he taught high school and coached. He went back to Tech as Assistant Dean of Men in 1947, and subsequently served as Dean of Men and Dean of Students. He was a highly respected administrator, and twice the "La Ventana," the University yearbook, has named him "Man of the Year".

He has been known as a Dean's Dean, and it is not uncommon to meet student personnel administrators throughout Texas, and the country for that matter, who got their start as a member of his staff. His involvement in Student Personnel organizations led to additional honors. The city of Lubbock recognized his community contributions by declaring a "Dean Lewis N. Jones" day in 1977.

Dean Jones served on the National Board of Directors of Alpha Phi Omega for 18 years. He received the National Distinguished Service Key, the Fraternity's highest honor, at the 1964 National Convention. He has continued to serve on various committees of Alpha Phi Omega.

The many awards and honors endowed upon Dean Lewis N. Jones signify the high esteem in which he is held. His quiet, yet firm, manner, his patient quidance, and the sense of commitment to that in which he is involved, leave those whose lives he touches far richer for the experience. Certainly the Fall 1978 Alpha Phi Omega Pledge can take great pride in bearing the name of the Dean Lewis N. Jones Pledge Class.

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WELCOME FRED HEISMEYER



As the 1978-79 school year begins, chapters and members will again set out to extend the hand of service to new members and new campuses. Assisting in that effort will be Fred C. Heismeyer, Alpha Phi Omega's new Director of Membership Services.

This new position, authorized by the National Board of Directors at its February meeting, will enable the National Office to provide increased support to chapters and petitioning groups. Fred's main emphasis will be the coordination of the Fraternity's extension program. This will in-

clude developing stronger communications with petitioning groups, working with sectional staffs to strengthen weak chapters, aiding new chapters in the early stages, and assisting in every way possible in strengthening and expanding Alpha Phi Omega.

Fred has an excellent Fraternity background since joining Lambda Omicron Chapter at West Virginia University in the Fall of 1973. He held numerous leadership positions in the chapter, and participated in sectional and regional conferences. He served on the Golden Anniversary Committee at the 1974 National Convention and as Chairman of the Service Reference Committee at the 1976 National Convention.

Fred, a native of New Jersey, has been involved in Scouting since 1963, attaining the rank of Eagle Scout and participating in two Order of the Arrow National Conclaves.

During 1975-76 Fred toured with the International cast of "Up With People", providing experience in performing, public relations, and technical theater. During the tour he continued his education through the "Up With People" college program and received a degree in Recreation and Parks from West Virginia University in 1978. In high school Fred was active in track, key club, drama, and school publications. His hobbies include travel, camping and drama.

The addition of Fred Heismeyer to the National Staff is an important milestone for Alpha Phi Omega, coming six years after the reduction in staff occasioned by declining membership in the early 1970's. We're confident that this step will mean more successful chapters and a stronger Alpha Phi Omega.

A BOLD HERITAGE: A BRIGHT FUTURE

At 9:30 A.M. on Wednesday, December 27, 1978, National Convention Chairman Frank Whitson will call to order Alpha Phi Omega's 25th National Convention. More than 1000 chapter representatives, delegates, alumni, and friends are expected to join in the three day meeting, to be held at the Opryland Hotel in Nashville, Tennessee.

For early arrivals, registration will open at 4:00 P.M. on Tuesday, December 26th. At 8:00 P.M. on the 26th the National Board of Directors will meet. This session will be open to observers.

At the opening session on the 27th, the National President, Dr. Lawrence L. Hirsch, will issue a challenge to the attendees. Lorin A. Jurvis, National Vice President, will report on the Long Range Planning Commission and Roger A. Sherwood, National Executive Director, will address the Convention. Reports will be presented by the National Committee Chairmen. The Convention Committee members, National Board of Directors, and distinguished guests will be introduced. Delegates will adopt Convention Rules and Order of Business. Regional meetings will be held at 11:30 A.M. and at 12:30 a special luncheon will be hosted by the National Board of Directors to honor and recognize Chapter Advisors, Sectional Chairmen and Sectional Staff members for their efforts in behalf of the Fraternity.

Wednesday afternoon has been reserved for Reference Committee sessions. At these sessions every member in attendance will have the opportunity to speak to the issues which will come before the legislative session. At the same time, the Leadership Development Committee will offer a series of development seminars designed to address the needs of chapters and chapter officers.

The busiest students at the Convention will be those serving on the Reference Committees, which will hear testimony from members of the Fraternity in a variety of subject areas. These include Leadership, Friendship, Service, Alumni, Finance, Fraternity Structure, Legislation, Nominating, Time and Place, Credentials, Publications and Appreciations. Voting delegates interested in serving on these Reference Committees should indicate their preferences when submitting their registration to the National Office. All of them will include delegates from each of the 10 Regions.

On Wednesday evening a "Meet Your Board" reception is scheduled for 5:30 P.M., followed by the opening banquet, "A Bold Heritage." Joseph Scanlon, former National Executive Director, will speak on the heritage of Alpha Phi Omega. The banquet will also feature a special musical show by Opryland, and several awards will be presented.

Thursday morning, December 28th, the Reference Committees will continue their deliberations, and the development seminars will continue.

At 2:00 P.M. Thursday, the legislative session of the National Convention will be called to order. The first items of business will be those related to the operation of the Convention. Following this the delegates will consider the reports of the Reference Committees. This session will recess at 6:00 P.M. and reconvene at 8:00 P.M. and continue until all legislation is completed.

At 10:00 A.M. on Friday, December 29th, the Nominating Committee will present its report and the National President, National Vice President and five National Executive Committeemen will be elected. The Time and Place Committee will report and the delegates will select the site and time of the 1980 National Convention. Reports from the Appreciations Committee and other Committees will be received and acted upon.

Friday afternoon the general session will continue until all Committees have reported. At 3:30 P.M. each of the 10 Regions will hold a Regional Meeting. Regions I, III, V, VII and IX will each elect a Regional Representative to the National Board of Directors.

The closing banquet, "A Bright Future", will be held on Friday evening. It will feature the passing of the gavel from the outgoing National President to the new National President, with appropriate remarks by each of these Fraternity leaders. The National Distinguished Service Key, the Fraternity's highest honor for exemplary service to Alpha Phi Omega, will be conferred upon deserving members. The Convention will close with the singing of the Toast Song.

The success of an Alpha Phi Omega Convention depends upon maximum chapter participation. Each chapter is entitled to send two voting delegates. Every pledge, member, advisor, and alumnus is invited to attend and participate in this unique experience in Brotherhood.

PLANNING FOR THE FRATERNITY'S FUTURE

When President Hirsch established the Long Range Planning Commission in February 1977, it was charged with the task of reviewing the current programs, operations and structure of the Fraternity, and making recommendations for the future. Over the past year and a half, the national standing committees and several special committees composed of undergraduate members and alumni, have been hard at work. These efforts have been reviewed by the National Board of Directors. Recommendations for amendments to the National By-Laws will be transmitted to the chapters in early November for consideration by the 1978 National Convention. Other recommendations of a policy or operational nature which do not require amendment of our governing documents will be presented to one of several reference committees at the Convention. These may result in resolutions or simply guidelines for individual members, chapters, sections, regions, the Board of Directors or the National Office.

The Long Range Planning effort should, in essence, result in a "platform" for action adopted by the Convention to guide Alpha Phi Omega in the decade ahead. Therefore, while some minor structural and By-Law changes will be proposed, the emphasis will be on the long term improvement of our effectiveness in meeting the Fraternity's basic purpose.

To begin the process, several chapters, sectional and regional conferences reviewed our statement of purpose. Various suggestions were made to ensure that it would speak clearly to others, telling what Alpha Phi Omega stands for. The Board, after considering all the input which was received, recommended that only a minor change be made and the revised statement of purpose. which must be considered by the Convention, read as follows:

The purpose of Alpha Phi Omega is to assemble college students in a National Service Fraternity in the fellowship of the principles of Scouting, to develop Leadership, to promote Friendship, and to provide Service; and to further the freedom that is our national, educational and intellectual heritage."

In addition, a set of operational goals which support the statement of purpose were suggested:

- Growth To extend the opportunities of membership in Alpha Phi Omega to all college students who embrace the principles of Scouting and Service.
- Leadership To provide leadership development opportunities for all members of the Fraternity.

- Service To provide, as the primary activity of each chapter, service in the following areas of emphasis:
 - A. Service to the nation as participating citizens
 - Service to the community, Scouting and youth B.
 - Service to the college and student body C
 - Service to Fraternity members through individual D personal growth
- To encourage positive, supportive interpersonal Friendship relationships through a program of social inter-action that results in a lasting fraternal bond among the membership.
- Support Systems -To maintain a strong national service structure in support of chapter operations, including both volunteer and professional leadership.
- Alumni To encourage alumni support of collegiate chapters and the national service structure through both personal service and financial contributions.

The other committees set about their task of reviewing the current operations, recommending any changes or reiterating the current method and making recommendations for the long term, guided by these goals. As indicated in the Fall, 1977 issue of T&T, the subjects covered were:

Mission Statement National Organization National Conventions National Office and Personnel Regions Sections Chapters Chapter Advisors College and University Relations Scouting Relations

Service Membership and Extension Leadership Development Finance **Public Relations** Publications Ceremonies and Ritual Alumni Awards Insignia, Merchandise

The 1978 National Convention will have a great opportunity to set the Fraternity's course for the coming years. Much preparation has been done, and more will be concluded before the Convention begins. This Convention will undoubtedly be one of the most important in the Fraternity's history, and certainly will provide the most thorough review since the 1967 Constitutional Convention in Norman, Oklahoma. Therefore, each chapter should make every effort to have its delegates in attendance to set the course for the future of Alpha Phi Omega.

BOARD HOLDS SUMMER MEETING

The National Board of Directors met at the Opryland Hotel in Nashville, Tennessee, site of the 1978 National Convention, on July 8-9, 1978. Present were:

The following actions were taken by the Board:

- Adopted a budget for fiscal 1979 calling for income of \$202,140 and expenditures of \$206,325.
- Adopted a budget for the 1978 National Convention calling for income and expenditures balanced at \$36,400.
- Elected Lorin A. Jurvis as an Endowment Trustee to fill the unexpired term of James Donnalley. (Term expires in February, 1979.)
- Directed the National Extension Committee, National Leadership Development Committee, and National Executive Director to serve on a committee chaired by the National Vice President to develop national standards for an annual review of all active chapters.
- Directed the National Extension Committee to develop National Pledge Standards for presentation to the 1978

A new phase of support for Alpha Phi Omega chapters began

on August 11, 1978 when 27 members gathered on the

Southern Illinois University campus at Edwardsville to learn more about their roles as chapter leaders. Our first National

Workshop for Chapter Presidents was authorized by the

Board in February and these members interrupted their

summer activities for an intensive weekend of learning.

Participants came from California, Texas, North Carolina,

Minnesota, and points between. The Leadership Develop-

ment Committee planned the agenda and the staff, which

included Board members Darrell Spoon, Bob Harris, and Clark Israel, and Sectional leaders Ted Greenhouse and Bill

Brown, was selected. Additional input was provided by

Sectional Chairmen Bob Dobo, Roger Elliott, and John

Wetherington. The program started Friday evening with a

study of communications, use of resources, and using the

chapter program to meet Fraternity members' needs.

Saturday's sessions started bright and early with a great deal

of attention devoted to the membership cycle of recruiting,

education, and retention. Afternoon sessions dealt with the issues of chapter program planning and the use of the

executive committee. The evening session centered around a

National Convention, and to prepare recommendations on the dechartering of inactive chapters.

- Asked the National Alumni Committee to address the involvement of non-alumni in local alumni associations.
- Adopted criteria for the selection of the chapter to receive the Arno Nowotny National Service Award.
- Voted to recommend to the 1978 National Convention that several minor realignments of regional boundaries be made.
- Adopted proposed Rules and Order of Business for the 1978 National Convention. (These will be mailed to all chapters in advance of the Convention).
- Approved the 1978 National Convention Program.
- Adopted additional publications policies calling for a biennial National Publications Survey to be used in the revision of Alpha Phi Omega publications.
- Turned down a proposal by the National Headquarters Fund Raising Committee, but charged the Committee to proceed with a program of supplemental and developmental fund raising for the Fraternity.
- Adopted several recommendations for By-Laws changes to be proposed to the 1978 National Convention. (These will be reported when By-Laws amendment proposals are distributed in November.)
- Adopted the following additional insignia items: (1) a ring; (2) a round pendant with the Greek letters within; and (3) a choker-style pendant with the Greek letters within.
- Adopted a merchandising policy to be published in the forthcoming supply catalog.
- Authorized the development of a Fraternity flag.
- Adopted a Salary Administration Program for the National Office.
- Adopted a resolution of appreciation to Mrs. M. Buford Blair.
- Received reports requiring no action from the National Executive Director, Endowment Trustees, Title IX Exemption Committee, Awards Committee, Long Range Planning Commission and several of the Long Range Planning Commission Subcommittees.

The next meeting of the National Board of Directors will be held on December 26, 1978 at the Opryland Hotel.

mock new member orientation meeting where some participants tried to convince prospects to join. The wrap-up session reviewed how to deal with conflict in the chapter and the decision-making process.

Group interest remained high throughout the sessions through the use of several practical exercises where problems were presented and solved by the participants themselves. In these sessions and in the informal activities during the weekend each person "taught" as well as learned so all benefited by the pooling of many ideas.

The evaluations were very positive. Several participants stated that for the first time they understood what it meant to be a National Fraternity. Others indicated that the programming skills and motivation they gained would be extremely helpful to them as they prepared to return to their campuses this fall. Of course the final test will occur later this year when these chapter leaders apply what they learned to make their chapters stronger. Those who are successful will be recognized at the National Convention. Hopefully, more programs of this type can be made available to an even greater number of Alpha Phi Omega chapters in the future.


OMEGA RHO INTER AMERICAN UNIVERSITY - HATO REY

KAPPA PHI SAINT LAWRENCE UNIVERSITY

After a 25 year absence, Alpha Phi Omega returned to the campus of Saint Lawrence University, Canton, New York with the reactivation of Kappa Phi Chapter on December 4, 1977.
