Greetings to all members of APO:

Memories of the happy meeting of our great gang at the Kansas City Convention still linger. I wish all the members of our fraternity might have listened to the delightful and friendly jabbing of Judge Charno, to the contagious enthusiasm of "Spizzenpep" Spizzirri, to the instructive and forceful expositions by Brother Wyland and Brother Pote, and to the dynamic and spirit-lifting address of President H. Roe Bartle. Many of us wished that these sessions had been presented over a nation-wide radio hook-up. Perhaps future conventions can include such arrangements.

Most certainly it was a working convention. The discussion groups, the series of five-minute talks by student leaders, and the various actions taken in the business meeting will leave their imprint on our fraternity throughout the years to come. While we are giving time and study for the institution of new chapters, we should give first consideration to the strengthening of existing chapters and the revival of our inactive chapters.

Let me express my appreciation to you for the opportunity you have given me to serve as one of your leaders, and the confidence that, with your help, there will be sustained and continuous progress in our beloved fraternity.

NATIONAL CONVENTION PLANS EXPANSION OF ALPHA PHI OMEGA ACTIVITIES

Tops in fellowship and brotherly spirit, and thoroughly consecrated to the important job at hand, the ninth national convention of Alpha Phi Omega, held in Kansas City, Missouri, December 28 and 29, 1946, was dedicated to "Service—Our Contribution to a Peaceful World."

Delegates came from all sections of the nation to invest a portion of their Christmas vacation in the interest of Leadership, Friendship and Service. The 349 delegates from 71 colleges and universities applied themselves wholeheartedly to the "working" program.

Members whose chapters are separated by thousands of miles grasped this opportunity to get acquainted and personally discuss the many phases of the APO program.

Legislation was intelligently executed by the committees and the official delegates. Several changes and additions to the National Constitution were passed by the convention, as follows:

Article III, Constitution. A section was added to read: "It shall be the policy of Alpha Phi Omega to include in its membership men of social fraternities and non-members, men of all races, creeds and colors, and men of all departments of the college, upon being so elected by the respective chapters and upon fulfilling the membership preparations prescribed by the national fraternity and by the chapters."

Article IV, Section 1, Constitution: A provision was inserted to require that at least five of the members of the National Executive Board shall have been or shall be at the time of their election active members of an Alpha Phi Omega chapter.

Article VIII, Sections 1 and 3, Constitution. The title of Senior Faculty Advisor was changed to "Chairman of the Advisory Committee".

Article IX, Section 1, Constitution. The word "shall" was changed to "should" in reference to persons making up the official delegation to the national convention.

Article XIV, Section 1, Constitution. The term "accredited college" was interpreted to include accredited junior colleges as well as four-year colleges and universities.

Article III, Section 3, By-Laws. The fee for Alumni Life Membership was changed to fifteen dollars. (Editor's Note: This in no way effects the pledge and initiation fees for new men entering the fraternity.)

Also, legislation was enacted to include in the constitution the provisions for establishing and operating alumni chapters of Alpha Phi Omega.

The convention unanimously adopted certain basic membership standards for chapters in schools of various sizes. It was recommended schools of less than 500 men maintain 25 to 50 active members in Alpha Phi Omega; chapters in schools of 500 to 2000 men should maintain 50 to 100 active APO members; and chapters in schools of more than 2000 men should maintain 100 to 150 active members.

In adopting these standards, the convention pointed out there is "strength in numbers" and adequate manpower is necessary to fully cover the service opportunities and needs on each campus. Further information concerning membership standards begin on page six of this issue.

James G. Allen (Beta Sigma) to serve as National Editor.

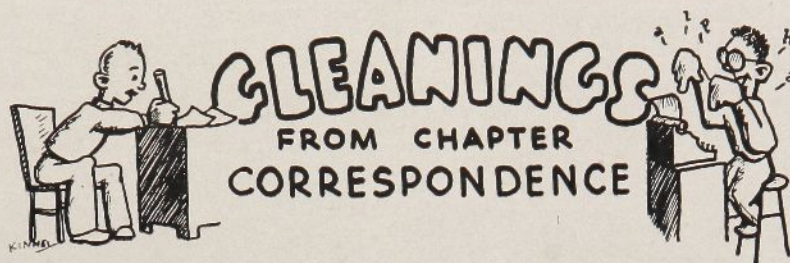
Retiring President Is Honored

One of the high spots in the convention program was the national banquet at which recognitions were presented to Dr. H. Roe Bartle in tribute to his sixteen years' service as National President. A volume of letters of appreciation was presented on behalf of all chapters by Darrell Fields of Delta Eta (Oregon State), the delegate who traveled the greatest distance to attend the convention. "The H. Roe Bartle Class" of 1023 new active members was presented by Donald Pomeroy of Lambda (Kansas University), his chapter being the one which initiated the largest number of members in the class. And a diamond-studded Alpha Phi Omega pin was presented by Dr. Ray O. Wyland (Alpha, Lafayette College) on behalf of the National Executive Board. In acceptance, Dr. Bartle gave a challenging address to the assembly, calling upon Alpha Phi Omega to take an increasingly active part in promoting world peace and brotherhood and unselfish service.

A tribute to Sidney B. North, National Secretary, signed by every member in attendance at the convention, was presented by the author, Del Jay Kinney (Upsilon, Milwaukee State).

The strong manner in which Alpha Phi Omega proceeded during the war years was lauded by the convention. Throughout the meeting there was conclusive evidence that splendid progress had been made even during the years of manpower shortage on all campuses, and plans were formulated for greater activity in the future. This convention provided a powerful stimulus which will carry over into every chapter throughout 1947 and 1948.

The full record of the convention proceedings, including addresses, reports, and legislation will be furnished to all chapters as soon as the stenographic transcription has been prepared and published.
