The following actions were taken by the Alpha Phi Omega Board of Directors at its meeting on June 25, 2016:

The Board approved the amended agenda and adopted the consent agenda which included the approval of the minutes of the January and March meetings and the following membership goals for the 2016-17 fiscal year:

“Service is important to me, because it’s the foundation of my value system,” says Brother Fred Heismeyer. “It started with Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts. Everything has been about doing something for other people. Through service, you get to know people, appreciate people and see their potential.”

Having worked with and for the Fraternity for over 30 years, Brother Heismeyer has witnessed its growth firsthand with the chartering of chapters, the development of programs (especially playing a key role in the creation and implementation of APO LEADS) and the expanded services and support available to students and alumni. He has held many positions from chapter advisor for six different chapters and petitioning groups across three regions, to Sectional Chair, to joining various committees and serving as the National President.

“I’ve had such a remarkable career with APO,” he says. “As a student, I got to go to two National Conventions as a voting delegate, and as an alumnus volunteer, I have been very lucky.” Brother Heismeyer has attended every National Convention since 1974 (with the exception of 1980) and looks forward to the upcoming biennial celebration this December. “It is so much more than just workshops. You get a sense of stewardship,” he says. “For the alumni, it is very rewarding for them to see students’ successes today because of what they did in their chapters in the past.”

Brother Heismeyer, or “Dr. Fred” as he is known in APO circles, pledged with Alpha Phi Omega in 1973 with Lambda Omicron Chapter at West Virginia University (WVU). One of his best memories in APO as an undergraduate is visiting the pediatrics unit at West Virginia University Hospitals where he and his Lambda O brothers read stories to and performed puppet shows for the young patients. Another fond memory is Mountaineer Week on the WVU campus, where APO provided security for the annual event.


Upon graduating from WVU in 1978, Heismeyer joined the Alpha Phi Omega National Office staff. He served the Fraternity as the Director of Membership Services for two years until he enrolled in the master’s program at Emporia State University where he served as an advisor for Epsilon Alpha Chapter.

Brother Heismeyer has fond memories of his time working with Beta Rho Chapter at the University of Arkansas as well. For 21 years, he and his wife, Joyce, (a fellow APO brother!) hosted study breaks at their home in Springdale, Arkansas, during the weeks of finals for students to engage in fellowship, enjoy great food and recharge between exams.

He chose to continue his involvement with the Fraternity because he loves working with college students. “APO helps keep me in touch with younger generations. It has been an amazing experience to meet so many people as active brothers and watching them grow into successful professionals,” he says. “APO certainly got me thinking about leadership and how leadership works.”

Professionally, Heismeyer owns his own training company, Career Dimensions, which provides soft-skills training to various organizations and their employees. He is also an adjunct professor for Baker University in Kansas and for Webster University in Missouri, for which he has taught on five campuses, including Shanghai, China, and Accra, Ghana.

Dr. Fred widens his commitment to service and volunteerism beyond APO by being active in several organizations. He served on the board of governors for the Up with People International Alumni Association, supporting its mission of international understanding and peace, and is currently the president and district trainer for the Rotary Club of East Wichita.

One of Dr. Fred’s favorite aspects of Rotary is the international scope of its program. With over 102 million members worldwide, there is an opportunity to meet and make friends with Rotarians from all over the world. This summer, Fred and Joyce traveled to St. Petersburg and Moscow, Russia, for 12 days. During their stay, the couple reunited with Russian friends whom they had met at a Rotary event in Wichita, Kansas. Throughout their travels, Fred and Joyce have now attended Rotary events in Russia, Ghana, China, Poland, Finland and Sweden.

“I am truly humbled by Alpha Phi Omega National Service Fraternity honoring me,” he says. “To actively engage with APO brothers as they develop into campus and community leaders through serving others is an awesome opportunity. I’m excited to meet our Fraternity’s newest members over the coming months and to make a positive impact on our campuses and in our communities.”

Following the tremendous growth of the Fraternity over the past several years, Brother Heismeyer says that he wants to see Alpha Phi Omega continue to grow and gain recognition for having a positive impact in the world of

service. He believes that the more diverse the Fraternity becomes, the more it will be able to meet the needs of college students and the communities they serve. “You can’t just put up a poster and expect people to show up; you must have a program of value,” he says. 5 Ways for Pledges to Bring Peace to Campus

- 1. Free Hugs Table**
Make signs that offer free hugs, high fives, handshakes or fist bumps, and setup in the quad-like area on campus
- 2. Kindness Sticky Notes**
Place sticky notes with positive messages around campus on bathroom mirrors, candy machines and doors to make people smile.
- 3. Conflict Resolution Training**
Attend conflict resolution training as a chapter to better understand how to work within a diverse group and how to resolve conflicts in a peaceful, respectful manner.
- 4. “I will Seek Peace” Commitment Sign**
Use a chalkboard or dry-erase board that says “I will SEEK PEACE by _____” and have students on campus stop by, fill in the blank and then take a picture. Place the photos in a video to share on social media.
- 5. Small Acts of Kindness**
Come up with small acts of kindness for pledges to do around campus and in the community.

Spring Youth Service Day

Alpha Phi Omega first made a commitment to become a part of Youth Service America's National Youth Service Day in 2001 (now Global Youth Service Day). Our involvement helps us meet part of the commitment we make to America's Promise, the "Network for Youth," founded by General Colin Powell (Ret).

REGION I

*Alpha Gamma Eta
University of Vermont*

Earth Day Cleanup – an event coordinated with an organization called DREAM, which pairs mentors with underprivileged youth. Together, the chapter and the kids did a campus cleanup, played games and talked about the purpose of Earth Day.

REGION II

*Xi Lambda
Bloomsburg University of Pennsylvania*

Children's Book Drive – the chapter collected new and used children's books and distributed them to a local elementary school to give to low-income families on meet-the-teacher night.

REGION III

*Theta Chi
George Washington University*

Buzzing for Change – a fundraising event in support of Camp Special Love, a camp for youth cancer patients. At the event, individuals had the option to donate their hair, "buzz" their entire head or volunteer at the event itself.

REGION IV

Farm Share Gainesville Distribution – an event benefiting the Boys & Girls Club of Alachua and the local Gainesville community. Attendees were educated about healthy food options and fresh produce was distributed.



The John Mack Scholarship was established in 1997 in honor of Brother John Mack, Alpha Eta '40, the majority benefactor of this program, because he wanted to give back to the Fraternity in his retirement years.

The scholarship is for members of Alpha Phi Omega who exhibit leadership and participation in extracurricular activities to benefit charitable or humanitarian organizations in need. Recipients of the scholarship are awarded funding to put toward their educational expenses at their current university. This year, the award was increased from \$500 to a tiered award structure of \$1,000, \$2,250 and a single \$5,000 scholarship.
