# HERE'S AN OPPORTUNITY TO KEEP IN TOUCH WITH ALPHA PHI OMEGA THROUGHOUT YOUR LIFETIME

#### WHAT IS LIFE MEMBERSHIP?

Life Membership in Alpha Phi Omega is a means of keeping in contact with the growth and program of our fraternity throughout the years ahead.

#### WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

Every man who has been previously registered in  $A\Phi\Omega$  either as an active member, advisor or honorary member is eligible to subscribe for Life Membership.

#### WHAT IS THE COST?

The fee for Life Membership is \$25.00. This fee was established by vote of the delegates at the 1952 National Convention. This is separate and apart from the pledge fee and active initiation fee.

#### HOW IS THE MONEY USED?

The money received for Life Membership fees is deposited in our Endowment Fund, from which the interest is used to pay the cost of service to the Life Members.

#### HOW LONG HAS THE LIFE MEMBERSHIP PLAN BEEN IN OPERATION?

This was established in 1936 by vote of the National Convention.

#### WHO IS THE FIRST LIFE MEMBER?

Dr. M. C. Hayes, who served for many years as a national officer and board member and was Chairman of the Advisory Committee of Eta Chapter at Northern Illinois University until his retirement, was the first brother to subscribe for Life Membership and is honored as the Premier Life Member.

#### HOW MANY MEMBERS HAVE SUBSCRIBED FOR LIFE MEMBERSHIP?

More than 1,100 members have subscribed and the number is steadily growing.

#### WHAT ARE THE ADVANTAGES OF LIFE MEMBERSHIP?

You may send the full amount of \$25.00 if convenient with your application. Or if more convenient for you, send a partial payment and we will credit that amount toward your Life Membership until you can send the remainder . . . or send it in installments, say five payments of \$5.00 each.

#### MAILING ADDRESS

Each Life Member is expected to keep our National Office informed of his mailing address for use in sending the TORCH AND TREFOIL. The enthusiasm and spirit of the great Southwest permeate the plans for Alpha Phi Omega's Fifteenth National Convention to be held in Austin, Texas.

For many months you and your chapter have received information about this forthcoming convention under the theme of "The Lone Star State in '58." On the morning of August 30 our National President will sound the gavel opening this 1958 National Convention. It will be the first time our fraternity has held its convention in the colorful Southwest. Answer the call by making your

personal plans to attend.

Our host chapters in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico are going all out to make this convention bigger and better than any previous convention ever held in Alpha Phi Omega. We have accumulated a fund from the chapters in this section of more than \$1,000.00 to be used for special events and features to add to your enjoyment. The Stephen F. Austin Hotel is our convention headquarters. Our accommodations will be excellent.

You have opportunity to highlight your  $A\Phi\Omega$  career by sharing your experiences with delegates from other chapters in Austin, August 30 to September 1. You will never find a better place to see Leadership, Friendship and Service in action, nor a better gang of fellows to be associated with.

With large exhibit space, displays of all phases of  $A\Phi\Omega$  activity will be one of the convention highlights. In this pictorial report of chapters there will be enough valuable tips to alone make your trip to the National Convention worthwhile. Here's where you can find new ideas for service projects, meeting programs, publications, rushing and pledging, to mention just a few.

In addition to the new ideas found by viewing the chapter exhibits, you'll find that the entire convention program is for the purpose of helping



you improve your chapter. Valuable tips will be gained from every new friend you meet, and there'll be a lot of them from almost every state in the nation.

Each of the fine speakers will leave us with the will and way to do a better job in our chapters. The group meetings will be another good source of new ideas for furthering the work of  $A\Phi\Omega$  on your campus. The inevitable bull sessions will give you one of the finest opportunities to find out how they do it from Maine to California and from Washington to Florida.

#### Enthusiasm

As you can well imagine, when all these Alpha Phi Omega men get together from all parts of the nation, the enthusiasm generated is terrific. As friendships are cemented and ideas are exchanged, spirit runs high. As these men begin to get their greatest insight into the possibilities of Alpha Phi Omega for their campuses, community, and nation, there can be nothing but the greatest of enthusiasm.

It is this enthusiasm which, when carried back to the rest of your chapter, will mean much in determining the quality and extent of your program in the years to come, making your chapter a more vital dynamic force on your campus and in your community, and making our fraternity nationally the great moving force it can be in a time when the whole world is crying for leadership. These brothers begin to look at service to others in a light far greater than what they have before imagined, at enlightened leadership as a vital necessity, and at friendship as the binding force that makes us what we are and can be.

#### Legislation

One of the functions of the convention is to enact the legislation which will guide our operations. It is important that your chapter have a hand in formulating the policies which will be adopted by the National Convention. To this end, each chapter is entitled to two official voting delegates and as many other delegates as can attend.

The two voting delegates should be elected by your chapter this Spring. In accordance with the national constitution, all proposed amendments to the constitution will be sent out to each chapter at least fifty days before the convention. In this way, the brothers who are not fortunate enough to be able to attend the convention will be able to have an indirect voice in the matters that are taken up at Austin.

#### Leadership

No less important to the welfare of the fraternity is the selection of the men who will guide us throughout the coming term through the election of our national officers and executive board. This election is conducted as part of the business of the convention and should reflect the serious thought and consideration of all of the delegates. A dynamic national board is essential to the welfare of such a large fraternity which always strives to increase its accomplishments. We must have men with the foresight to see even greater potentiality in our program.

At Austin, you will really get the vision of the principles of Leadership, Friendship and Service in action. These principles will permeate everything that is said and done. As we have said, friendship and fellowship will be evident from the first moment you encounter a brother on the way or at the convention. Just set foot in The Stephen F. Austin Hotel the first day of the convention and you will feel the  $A\Phi\Omega$  spirit filling the air.

The whole convention will be an experience in leadership as evidenced by chapter members leading legislative committees and discussion groups. Our top-flight national leaders will

# Views of the Convention Site



#### Plan Now

#### SHRINE OF TEXAS LIBERTY



Alamo, Shrine of Texas Liberty. The building pictured above is the old chapel of Mission San Antonio de Valero, founded in 1718 by the Franciscan padres. In 1836, during the war for Texas independence, the Alamo was the scene of one of the most historic events in the history of our nation. All of the defending Texas soldiers were killed here while besieged by troops under the Mexican general, Santa Anna. The battle cry, "Remember the Alamo," carried the Texans to victory at San Jacinto forty-six days later. A visit to the Alamo is one of the treats in store for the convention delegates who take the escorted trip to San Antonio the afternoon of September 1 after the adjournment of our National Convention in Austin. that you will make this the greatest convention ever.

#### **IT'S GREAT TO KNOW**

As we complete another eventful school year this month, it's a real thrill to know that Alpha Phi Omega has made excellent progress. Four new chapters have been added to our brotherhood since the opening of last Fall's semester. Several of the chapters which were weak or dormant have been reorganized. The four biggest projects conducted annually by Delta Sigma Chapter, reports Richard J. Menga, Vice President, are the election service, freshman orientation, ride service and ring sales. Those fine projects which are prominent in the chapter's vast service program are depicted on this page.

At top left the election service is shown in progress. Delta Sigma Chapter has the responsibility of guarding the polls and checking the eligibility of voters. It is also the job of the chapter president to make sure the ballot boxes have not been tampered with before nor after the elections. In lower left Brother Nick Cianciola and a member of Gamma Sigma Sigma are shown giving information to a new student upon arrival on the campus. APO's job in orientation is to welcome incoming freshmen, conduct tours, run a red cap service for carrying girls' luggage from the parking lot to dorms, proctor at exams and help maintain the traditions.

At top right is shown the ride service board. Members of Delta Sigma Chapter painted and constructed the map upon which major cities are shown. Cards are available in two colors, one for ride wanted and one for ride offered. This has been very effective and helpful to the student body. In lower right the ring sales are shown. The chapter assists ring companies' representatives by publishing advance notices of sales assisting the representative during the time he is on the campus and handling the administrative details.

#### **Career Carnival**

ALPHA ZETA CHAPTER at the University of Kentucky recently assisted at a gigantic Career Carnival which came to the University of Kentucky. This brought income to the chapter as well as being a service, as the group was paid fifteen cents each for about five hundred copies distributed. Also, they provided transportation for new freshmen from the bus station to the dorms, showed a movie and handled coke sales. It was part of the Junior Prom week end in which a Prom Queen as well as the  $A\Phi\Omega$  Ugly Man was chosen. In the Ugly Man contest the usual method of voting was in order, one cent per vote. The money collected has been donated to the American Farm School in Salonica, Greece, for the education of a war-orphaned Greek boy. Eleven candidates participated. This is reported by Herbert G. # **UGLY MAN CONTEST**

establish their own rules. Here are the regulations of this year's contest at Penn State which may provide new ideas for your future use.

- 1. When will it be held?-October 22, 23, 24 and 25.
- The purpose of this contest—To raise money for a worthy project, the nature of which will be announced two weeks before the contest.
- Who may enter—This year we are enlarging this contest to include not only fraternities, which have been the main support of this contest, but also are including the independent men units (town and campus) and any other interested organized campus group.
  - a. Neither fraternities nor independent groups will compete against one another.
  - b. A fraternity may sponsor one man and a living unit may sponsor one man. Likewise, an organization may sponsor one man. Once a fraternity has selected its candidate for UGLY MAN, no other member of that fraternity may be entered by another organization.
  - c. The entry of an organization must be a University registered male student.
- When and where do you register?—Any day from Sept. 16 to Sept. 30, between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. at the HUB desk.
- 5. A registration fee of \$2.50 is required at this time to cover the cost of having a picture taken and entering the parade. Also at this time you will be required to list your UGLY MAN entry.
- 6. When and where will the pictures be taken?-Wednesday, October 2, and Thursday, October 3, from 1:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. at KEPLER'S STUDIO located on the corner of Allen Street and Beaver Avenue in the rear of DANKS DEPARTMENT STORE. Every entry must have his picture taken as he will appear in the parade. A DAM DOES ONE GO ABOUT WINNING?
- 7. HOW DOES ONE GO ABOUT WINNING?
  - A. Must enter the parade to be held October 22 at 6:00 p.m.
    - Where will parade form?—The parade will form on Shortlidge Road between Pollock and Park Avenue.
    - 2. What are the divisions?
    - Division 1 will consist of all fraternities, and form between Pollock and Curtin Roads.
    - Division 2 will consist of all non-fraternity groups and form between Curtin Road and Park Avenue.
    - When will parade form?—At 5:30 p.m. and will move out sharply at 6:00 p.m. Late comers will be placed at the end of the parade and noted by the judges as late arrivals.
    - Will motor vehicles be allowed?—YES. One motor vehicle will be allowed per marching unit if the vehicle is actually decorated and pulling or hauling a float.
      - Definition of pulling a float—a motor vehicle drawing a wagon (float) behind it.
      - Definition of hauling a float—a float built on top of a motor vehicle.
      - a. At NO time during the parade will any member of the marching unit be allowed to stand on the running boards of any motor vehicle, or for that matter, sit on top of any open car. This above statement goes not only for a moving car, but also when the car is standing still. By sitting on a car we mean that if the car is open, such as a convertible, no one will be allowed to sit on the back of the seat. This means that anyone riding in an open car must sit in the car as normal people do when driving in a closed car. This rule is included here for the safety of all members in the marching unit.
      - b. Any wagon used as a float must be securely attached to the motor vehicle with the proper bumper hitch. This means no tying of a wagon with rope or wire to the car. This is a safety feature.
      - c. All vehicles in the parade must use low gear or no higher than second gear.
      - d. No hand-drawn floats will be allowed in the parade since motor vehicles are now included in the parade. By hand-drawn floats we mean floats on wheels drawn by human beings. This does not eliminate hand-carried floats.

- 5. What will be the line of march?—The parade will start on Shortlidge Road to College Avenue, proceed west on College to Burrows. Will turn north on Burrows to Pollock, turning east on Pollock Road to Shortlidge, then north onto Shortlidge Road and disbanding. UPON DISBANDING MARCHING UNITS MUST REMOVE ALL EQUIPMENT THAT THEY BROUGHT WITH THEM ONTO CAMPUS, sometime before 9:00 p.m. Tuesday, October 22, the night of the parade. Once in the parade, floats must complete the route of march.
- 6. Where will the judging of the parade be?—The seven judges will be scattered anywhere along the line of march.
- 7. What will the judges judge?
  - a. Presentation of theme
  - b. Group participation
  - c. Originality
  - d. Organization
  - Whether or not this presentation is in good taste. This means that groups entering with girls must be orderly and reasonably dressed.
- How will points be awarded?—There will be five places in each division, first to fifth place. The parade points will be given as follows to each of the two divisions:
  - 1st place of 2500 points equaled to \$25.00 will be given.2nd place of 1500 points equaled to \$15.00 will be given.3rd place of 1000 points equaled to \$10.00 will be given.4th place of 750 points equaled to \$7.50 will be given.5th place of 500 points equaled to \$5.00 will be given.

#### B. INDIVIDUAL CAMPAIGNS

- 1. All campaigning will be confined to the Mall, between the hours of 12 noon to 1:00 p.m., and 5:00 p.m. to 5:30 p.m.
- Any campaign materials or aids which are brought on the campus to promote an individual's candidacy may not be left on campus, but must be removed between campaign periods.
- 3. Sound equipment may not be used.
- Posters and handbills in the Borough may be used only at the permission of the store owner.
- Groups are encouraged to conduct some sort of campaign, for this may have some bearing on the outcome of choosing the winner.
- C. How will the voting take place?
  - A booth will be located on the Mall, where voting will take place between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., starting at 8:00 a.m. Tuesday, October 22, and lasting until 5:00 p.m. Thursday, October 24.
  - 2. VOTING WILL CONSIST OF-ONE VOTE EQUALED TO ONE CENT.
- D. How does one get into the finals?
  - The five fraternities collecting the largest parade vote plus money vote will be in the finals.
  - The five non-fraternity organizations collecting the largest parade vote plus money vote will also be in the finals.
     NOTE: MONEY IS THE CRITERIA AS TO WHO THE FINALIST WILL BE. It is quite possible to enter the finals
- without placing in the parade. However, bear in mind, parade points count toward your total vote. E. Where and when will the finals be held?—In Schwab
- Auditorium, Friday, October 25, at 7:30 p.m. Finalists will be announced Thursday, October 24, after 6:00 p.m. F. WHAT MUST ONE DO IN THE FINALS?
- Present a SKIT not to exceed six (6) minutes.
- G. What will judges be looking for in the skits?
  - 1. Presentation of theme
  - 2. Originality
  - 3. Organization
  - 4. Participation
  - 5. Is it done in good taste
- 6. Enunciation
- H. Who will be the judges? Theatre arts and Speech men of the University.

#### VIOLATION OF ANY RULES SET UP BY THE UGLY MAN COMMITTEE WILL DISQUALIFY THE ORGANIZATION.

#### 8. Awards: FIVE TROPHIES TO BE AWARDED

To the Grand Champion (THE UGLY MAN) will go the Ugly Man Key and to the winning group a beautiful 32-inch trophy. Each Division will receive a 1st place trophy which stands 16 inches high, and the 2nd place winners of each division will receive an engraved plaque.

#### MISCELLANEOUS INFORMATION

The \$2.50 registration fee is non-refundable. It is suggested that a candidate work up a skit—or other means of publicity—to be presented during the voting period. Publicity and pictures of the parade will be taken during the campaign by the Daily Collegian and Centre Daily Times.

Editor's Note: In publishing Alpha Beta Chapter's Ugly Man Contest rules we hope this detailed description of how the project is conducted at Penn State will provide helpful suggestions for the consideration of your chapter when you plan the next Ugly Man Contest on your campus.

#### **Queen's Float**

ALPHA LAMBDA CHAPTER at North Dakota State College constructed the Queen's float for this year's Homecoming parade.

#### **Registration Service**

The mass confusion which usually occurs with the registration of 10,000 students was reduced considerably, thanks to the efforts of GAMMA THETA CHAPTER at the University of Colorado. Over thirty members assisted officials during the two-day registration. They served as supply checkers at the entrance, traffic directors, walking information patrols and they maintained an information and lost and found booth. The chapter performed this service at both Fall and Spring registrations.

During the past semester the chapter has conducted many service projects. These include the pledge class project of building ten newsstands for the distribution of the Colorado Daily, student newspaper; lost and found service for the school; maintenance of all official campus bulletin boards; ushering at theatre productions, football games and other campus events; floorwalking at all major dances; decorating goal posts for football games; and numerous events during the freshman welcome week.

One of the chapter's most impor-

tant projects is the Scout swim program Starting in February, this is in its second eight-week session. It is conducted under the supervision of the Long's Peak Council. Members of the chapter have been teaching about 170 boys in each eight-week session. Classes are taught on Wednesday nights and they are a half-hour in length. The full range of Red Cross classes is taught from beginning swimmer to junior life-saver. The fee is \$1.50 per boy per session. From the income from this, the chapter has contributed seventy-five dollars to CARE and fifty dollars to the World Friendship Fund. Additional income will be contributed to other causes as the chapter chooses.

Recently Gamma Theta Chapter was a great help to the University during student elections. Members handled more than four thousand ballots cast in the election of the thirteenman commission of the Associated Students of the University of Colorado. Working in conjunction with the election commission, the chapter operated five polling places at various points around the campus. This news is by John S. Van Esen, Corresponding Secretary.
