



COLLEGE PRESIDENT NEW LIFE MEMBER

Dr. Eugene E. Garbee, the distinguished President of Upper Iowa University, the home of Mu Rho Chapter, heads the latest list of new Life Members, just compiled nationally. Dr. Garbee is one of Alpha Phi Omega's most enthusiastic supporters. His letters to College Presidents on the values of Alpha Phi Omega are deeply appreciated by the National Fraternity's officers and members. He is justly proud of Mu Rho, which he did so much to form and guide. He is Past President of the Wapsipinicon Council, Boy Scouts of America, Waterloo, Iowa, and received the Silver Beaver Award in 1946.

Dr. Garbee has been President of Upper Iowa University since 1952. Prior to that he was Associate Professor of Health and Physical Education at Drake University from 1949-52. He received his M.A. degree from George Peabody College, Nashville, and his Doctor of Education from New York University in 1949. He has been in the field of education since 1932.

During World War Two he served from 1942-45 as a Lieutenant Commander in the Navy, and as Commanding Officer, Navy Detachment, Rio de Janiero, Brazil, in 1944.

He is an ardent Rotarian, and is a nominee-elect for Rotary District Governor. Dr. Garbee served in the United States Navy as a Lieutenant Commander from 1942-1945. He has the honor of being listed in Who's Who in America, Who's Who in American Education, and Who's Who in the Midwest. He was appointed to the Board of Curators, Iowa State Historical Society, in 1958, and still holds that honor.

The newest list also includes Sectional Chairman Richard H. Herron, Professor of Geology, Mississippi State University. Prof. Herron's leadership in Mississippi and Louisiana is producing outstanding results. He is Advisory Chairman to Epsilon Iota Chapter at Mississippi State University.

NEW TEXAS RANGER?


