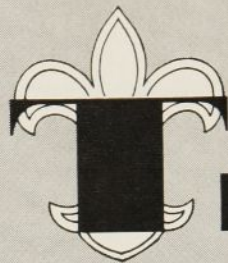

Introducing Roger A. Sherwood National Service Representative

Alpha Phi Omega is proud to announce the addition of Roger A. Sherwood to its National Service staff. Brother Sherwood, a distinguished alumnus of Eta Chapter, Northern Illinois University, will work with and under the direction of the National Secretary.

In announcing Mr. Sherwood's employment, Dr. Lester R. Steig, the National President, commented that his selection marked a milestone in the fraternity's history, and was the direct result of the National Executive Board's determination to do everything possible to insure the best possible service to chapters and campuses across the nation.

"The ever increasing responsibilities of National Secretary Scanlon, together with the continuing growth and expansion of the fraternity, have necessitated this action," President Steig said. "We expect to add additional staff personnel as finances permit."

Mr. Sherwood majored in psychology at Northern Illinois University. He was a member of the board of the University Center, and of the University Artist and Lecturer Series, and served on the Leadership Development Planning Committee, which directs the Student Leadership Workshops for which the university is famous. Dr. Ernest E. Hanson, Vice President of Student Personnel Services, and one of Eta Chapter's founders, considers Mr. Sherwood one of Northern's most outstanding graduates.

Brother Sherwood was a staff member of the Cook County Department of Public Aid, Welfare Rehabilitation Service, before joining A Phi O's staff. His wife, Darlene, also attended Northern Illinois University.

It's Almost National Convention Time

December 27-28-29 — Denver

More than 1,000 men are expected to attend Alpha Phi Omega's National Convention at the Brown Palace Hotel in Denver on December 27-28-29. This convention will mark the 40th anniversary of the fraternity.

Dr. Lester R. Steig, the National President, will preside. The Colorado chapters, hosting the first National Convention ever to be held in that state, are going all out to make this A Phi O's finest convention. Three distinguished speakers will be featured. Four outstanding training sessions will be held. All indications are that this will be a most inspiring occasion.

Hotel reservations may be made by writing directly to the Room Reservations Desk, Brown Palace Hotel, Denver, Colorado. Every chapter has been sent hotel reservation cards which set out the special convention room rates. A limited number of rooms for multiple occupancy are available at very low rates. These will be assigned by the hotel on a "first come-first served" basis. Make your reservations promptly and indicate they are for the A Phi O meeting.

All business and training sessions will be held at the Brown Palace.

Advance registrations, accompanied by a fee of \$2.00 per person, are now being accepted. Send these to the National Secretary, 1100 Waltower Building, Kansas City, Missouri 64106. Alpha Rho, University of Texas, once again has the honor of being the first chapter to register for the convention. Who's next?

Denver is accessible by all forms of transportation. Reports to date indicate that delegates plan to travel by auto, rail, bus, and even by air.

New Jersey delegates are investigating the possibility of chartering a

plane. They have discussed this with delegates from New York, Pennsylvania, and the New England states. Those interested should contact Howard R. Patton, Sectional Chairman for New Jersey. His address is National Council, B. S. A., New Brunswick, New Jersey.

Chapters in the Ohio section are planning a bus trip to Denver. The bus will pick up brothers in Cleveland, Co-

Sectional Chairman Lewis N. Jones, is working on a charter bus arrangement. Chapters in the area of Dallas and East Texas are considering teaming up on a trip by railroad. Those interested in the train trip should write to William K. Byerly, President of Beta Delta Chapter at East Texas State. His address is Box AA, East Texas Station, Commerce, Texas 75429.

Southern Illinois and Eastern Missouri chapters are working out their plans with the help of Warren Stookey, Chairman for Section 16. He may be reached at the Southern Illinois University Foundation, Edwardsville, Illinois.

California chapters are holding a special gathering to complete their plans. The same is true of the Southeast, headed by Sectional Chairman Ed Andrews, 512 Krise Building, Lynchburg, Virginia.

The important thing is for every chapter to be represented at Denver, whether it travels with others or works out its own transportation.

There will be one official luncheon and two evening banquets. These three meetings will be addressed by speakers of national prominence. Cost for the three meals will total \$13.00. All voting delegates, chapter representatives, and visitors are welcome to these three sessions. You are on your own for all other meals. Denver has a great number of outstanding restaurants, as well as points of interest that appeal to all.

The National Convention, held biennially, is the governing body of Alpha Phi Omega. It is responsible for acting on all legislation. The power of the National Convention is vested in two delegates from each chapter and the National Executive Board.

FALL PLEDGE CLASS DEDICATED TO HERBERT G. HORTON

Alpha Phi Omega proudly dedicates the 1964 fall Pledge class to Herbert G. Horton of Tucson, Arizona, one of the co-founders of Alpha Phi Omega, and its first council Scouting Advisor.

It is altogether fitting and proper in this fortieth birthday anniversary year to name the fall Pledge class for Brother Horton and to recall the stirring events which culminated in the formation of the first chapter on December 16, 1925.

Herbert G. Horton was the Scout Executive at Easton, Pennsylvania, who first acquainted Founder Frank Reed Horton (no relation) with the principles of Scouting, and the Good Turn code, on which the Fraternity rests. The Founder refers to Herbert G. Horton as "an inspiring man" in "The Story Behind the Founding," printed in the Pledge Manual.

Mr. Horton was born at Pulteney, New York, on January 23, 1886. Dur-

ing World War I he served as a Lieutenant in the Navy, assigned to destroyer convoy duty. He helped write

the Sea Scouts Manual while serving in the Sea Scouts Department of the National Council, B.S.A. Subsequently, he served as a Scout Executive for more than a decade and was active in National Youth Administration leadership, until he returned to active duty with the Navy in World War II. Thereafter, he was with Mercury Aircraft at Hammondsport and Rochester, New York, until his retirement.

Mr. Horton is a Life Member and through the years he has maintained an active interest in Alpha Phi Omega wherever stationed. President William S. Roth appointed him as Sectional Chairman for Arizona and President Steig has continued him in this capacity. In honoring him the Fraternity recalls with gratitude the work of all those who founded it 40 years ago.
