A Successful Pledge Training Program

By Alpha Gamma Chapter Purdue University

The pledge system of Alpha Gamma Chapter at Purdue is the outgrowth of several years' accumulation of activities and ideas. Credit is due, most largely, to Professor Daniel Den Uyl, our advisory chairman, and to our past officers, who directed the efforts to a practical end.

The entire program is planned and carried out by a committee made up of the chairman of the advisory committee, the chapter president, both ex officio, the pledgemaster, and one active member for each four or five anticipated pledges. These actives are carefully chosen in view of the fact that they, representing the committee, will personally interview each prospective pledge.

The list of prospective pledges is obtained by two methods: from personal recommendations of the active members, and from expression of interest at an open meeting. (This meeting is preceded by a census and issuing of invitations to eligible men.)

We begin the meeting with a welcome by the president, after which both members and guests introduce themselves. The preliminary speeches consist of: an address by a representative of the university administration, who explains the attitude of the faculty toward Alpha Phi Omega; another by our advisory chairman, listing the general ideals and principles upon which APO is founded; a third by the vice-president or secretary, telling of the services and activities of the organization; a fourth by the treasurer, who discusses the financial arrangements both with the chapter and national organization. These four speeches must necessarily be short and to the point.

The main speech is given by either the president or the pledgemaster. He brings out the fact that In this timely article, the members of Alpha Gamma Chapter give us the story of the very effective pledge training program used in Alpha Phi Omega at Purdue. This material has been compiled under direction of Brother George F. Cahill, Past Pledgemaster and now President of the chapter, upon special request from the national office. We are indebted to him and to the entire chapter for this important message. In the past five years, under this plan, 292 new members have been trained and initiated in Alpha Gamma Chapter. The Editors believe herein are methods which may well be studied and adapted in other chapters.

our entire pledge system serves the single purpose of determining the sincerity of the pledges' ambitions to contribute service in our four fields. He emphasizes the point that Scouting and hazing do not mix and, since that is true, that we do not tolerate hazing our pledges.

He then outlines the requirements of the pledge for active membership and distributes application blanks to those who are interested in having an interview with one of the pledging committee members. These applications, however, are not dated nor signed until the ceremony of formal pledging.

During the next week, each man who has submitted an application is interviewed by one of the committee members, particularly assigned to him. Each candidate is then discussed before a meeting of the entire committee, who approve or disapprove the applications on the basis of the outcome of the interviews and discussion. The approved list is then given over to the secretary who issues invitations to the men accepted for formal pledging.

The ritual of formal pledging follows exactly that in the national ritual book, but in a preliminary speech by the president, we again take the opportunity to stress that they shall be expected to work and demonstrate their willingness to give freely of their time and

energy to further the principles of Alpha Phi Omega. Immediately following the ritual we hold our first pledge meeting, which consists of the listing specifically the requirements of each pledge necessary to initiation. The complete schedule of all pledge activities, together with the dates therefore is announced. This practice places a responsibility on the pledges and gives Alpha Phi Omega priority in cases of subsequent conflicting dates.

The pledges are instructed to:

I. Complete a pledge plaque in the shape of the APO key (supplied by the chapter at a cost of about 40c each);

A. It must be sandpapered and finished in the colors of the fraternity key or in the school colors;

B. Alpha Gamma (or the name of the particular chapter) should appear on the horizontal bar part of the front of the board;

C. The Greek letters, Alpha, Phi, and Omega, are oriented as on the key and may be made of decal material or painted,

D. The pledge's name and school in the university should appear on the back of the board at the top;

E. The back side should be finished and then sanded down so that the ink (from the signatures of the actives) will go on smoothly. (Clear nail polish is suggested as a good coating over these signatures.)

II. Attach to the board a rope of clothes line or similar line having nine (9) knots tied in it. Suggested knots are:
Square Fisherman's knot Bowline Figure eight Masthead Carrick bend

Clove hitch Sheepshank

Hangman's noose (13 loops in coil.)

III. Secure a special APO cap made like a sailor's white hat of blue and gold felt, having on the outside a gold crown and blue rim and on the inside a blue crown and gold rim. These caps are worn inside out by the pledges and rightside out by the actives.

The foregoing three items are carried by the pledge during his pledge period. The chief purpose of these accourrements is to make the APO pledges distinctive among those of other honorary fraternities on campus. The board furnishes a place whereon the pledges obtain the signatures of the actives and faculty members, a procedure which brings the pledges into personal contact with the members and serves to introduce the candidates individually to the active chapter.

- IV. Complete satisfactorily the educational program of tests and examinations arranged by the chapter.
- V. Fulfill a minimum suitable number of hours of supervised work in the direction of one or more of our four service fields.

Subsequent pledge meetings, five in all, comprise an educational program of assignments for study, lectures, and examinations. Topics for these assignments include a study of the university history and tradition, the names and offices of important campus executives. the constitution, organization, and history both of the local chapter and of the national structure of Alpha Phi Omega. The Pledge Manual is of great assistance to the proper instruction of the fraternity material. There are four tests and one final examination, which are not, as is often the case in honorary groups, mere matters of form. They should be made out with the intention of impressing the most important material on the pledges' minds, as well as that of affording a basis for selection of the best candidates for initiation.

The Saturday following the final

examination is devoted to a seventeen mile hike (a real hike), which is led by the pledgemaster and other active members of the chapter. The hikers leave the campus about noon and take a predetermined, but unannounced, route to the nearby Scout camp, where other actives have prepared a meal for them. On arrival, it is traditional that the pledges throw their pledgemaster into the river. After diner there is a campfire at which the pledges, previously divided into groups of convenient size. present stunts and skits for the entertainment of the company. This entertainment is followed by similar acts presented by the actives. Here, in a speech by the pledgemaster, final plans for the initiation and banquet on the following day are announced. The activities of this Saturday serve the invaluable purpose of allowing the pledges and actives to come into informal contact with each other and of cementing together the pledges as a class and as a part of the chapter.

Plans for the initiation and banquet are carried out by two committees, one for each of the two functions, under joint chairmanship; the chairman works at all times in immediate association with the president and the pledgemaster. It goes without saying that the more care taken in setting up the initiation paraphernalia, the more impressive background the ceremony will have. It is essential also that the spoken parts of the service be memorized and delivered by men with impressive manners of speech. The officers are used insofar as possible; however, we have sometimes sacrificed letter-bound ritual, for the sake of impressiveness.

The banquet committee members and the actives as well must keep in mind that the banquet is given primarily for the new members. In addition, this banquet provides the best opportunity the organization has to introduce its individual members to campus dignitaries who come there in the role of speakers. As in any banquet pro-

gram the speeches should be minimized, both in length and number. Decorations are usually within the themes of Scouting and Alpha Phi Omega.

We here also have a tradition which comes to light at the banquet each year: the outstanding pledge, as chosen by the pledging committee, is presented with an award, handed down annually from pledge class to pledge class. The names and dates of initiation of the winners of the award are inscribed thereon.

The primary basis for judging the pledges for this award, as well as for initiation, is a grading point system.

It is apparent that the pledgemaster is responsible for the execution of the entire program. He is the representative of the pledging committee and thereby of the entire chapter and is responsible to them for carrying out their ideas. On him, perhaps more than on any other one person, rests the chances for success of the plan. The most significant lesson we have learned, however, is that the adminstration of the pledge program is not a one man job; it is the obligation of every member to take an active interest in it and to see that it is brought to the best possible conclusion.

We, of course, realize that this program is, perhaps, most applicable to Alpha Gamma alone; nevertheless, we sincerely hope that parts of it, if not all of it, may be worked advantageously into the pledge period schedules of other chapters. We have found that, using this plan of activities, we are better able to select the best men for active membership in our chapter, to instruct them in the ideas and ideals of the fraternity, and to direct their ambitions into the channels of willing service. In return, we can see ourselves building a better and stronger chapter and thus contributing in the best possible way to the nationwide accomplishments of Alpha Phi Omega.
