For the duration of the trip the Brothers stayed in the homes of Costa Rican families. Even though their Spanish speaking skills were less than perfect, the Brothers all felt at ease and at home. They gave up their spring break to do Service to others. They gained knowledge of another culture and a better understanding of humanity.

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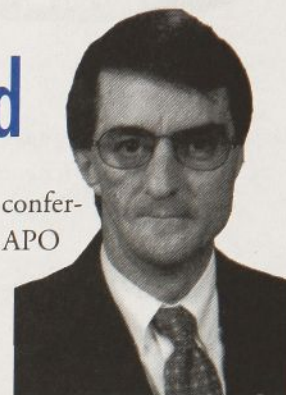
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**PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE**

Easier Done Than Said

"Officer/Brother burnout" is frequently a topic at APO conferences and workshops. This is understandable given that APO tends to attract leadership-oriented individuals eager to be of service and determined to produce high-quality results. Because leadership in APO is a hands-on, personal commitment, officers or other Brothers may take on workloads that are too heavy and may develop unrealistic (and unhealthy) expectations for themselves. The result: fatigue, disappointment in oneself and others, and burnout.

There is a way to prevent this from happening, but it requires tremendous will power to implement. The answer is to avoid the "easier done than said" syndrome.

The "easier done than said" syndrome is the habit of thinking that a task is "easier done" by doing it ourselves "than said" by discussing the need for the task, defining the expectations associated with it and, most importantly, asking for help. Delegation is tough for many enthusiastic and energetic APO leaders. There is a tendency to assume that (1) "nobody can do the job as well as I can" and (2) "since nobody else is stepping forward to do the job, then I have to do it myself."

The truth is that (1) a job can be done well without necessarily being done my way and (2) often people need to be recruited to take on a job. Identifying, recruiting and deploying volunteers and then giving them the freedom and respect to work on their own are critically important aspects of being an effective leader. They also are critically important safeguards against personal burnout.

Plus, given that one of our worlds of service is service to the members of the Fraternity, it is important to remember that we serve our Brothers and Pledges best when we give them the opportunity to experience all of Alpha Phi Omega. True Brotherhood involves sharing the work as well as the joy of our Fraternity.

At the beginning of every project, determine what needs to be done, who's going to do it and by when each assignment will get done. Don't proceed with the project until those points are clearly decided, documented, communicated and understood. The leader's job is then to see that the plan is followed and to give guidance and help along the way. The leader's job is not to do the whole thing alone.

And if there is not enough interest or involvement in an idea at the beginning to develop a well-staffed plan, then don't do the project. Again, that is sometimes a tough call to make, but it is sometimes the right thing to do.

Burnout doesn't have to happen. With good planning and teamwork, projects and other assignments can get done without anybody being overwhelmed or overworked. Just as you take precautions against getting sunburned during the summer, protect yourself from getting burned out during the rest of year.

Having been to many conventions, I just want to say how much I enjoyed all of the audio/visual touches added to this convention and our 75th Anniversary celebration. It was an event to remember.

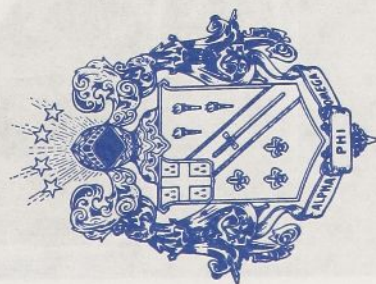

STATEMENT ON ALUMNI VOLUNTEERISM WITHIN ALPHA PHI OMEGA

Alpha Phi Omega is a National Service Fraternity governed by college students with the assistance and support of dedicated Alumni Volunteers. Alumni Volunteers provide service on a Chapter, Sectional, Regional, or National basis. Alumni Volunteers are elected by the Active Chapters, or are appointed to positions by elected volunteers. All volunteers are expected to coordinate their work through the appropriate electing or appointing body.

The Fraternity actively encourages all Alumni Brothers to become volunteers, particularly those Alumni who have special skills and interest in areas that benefit the Fraternity as a whole. Pledges and Active Brothers should have opportunities to learn about the importance of proper Alumni roles in the activities of the Fraternity. To maximize the value of new member education programs, direct and appropriate contact with Alumni Brothers is encouraged.

As a leadership development organization, Alpha Phi Omega volunteers have a responsibility to identify, to recruit, and to train others with the goal of developing a strong, dynamic, and expanding alumni leadership base. It is vital that all volunteers receive appropriate training to maximize the benefit to the Fraternity.

Every Alumni Brother can support the growth of Alpha Phi Omega. Should personal constraints prohibit direct involvement, Alumni can assist the Fraternity in a variety of ways, including but not limited to: encouraging students to pledge, using their leadership skills to assist other volunteer organizations, and providing financial gifts to the Fraternity.

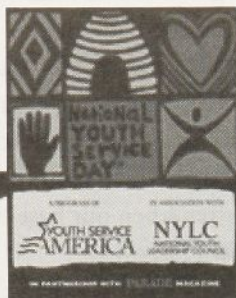

YOUTH SERVICE GRANTS

Congratulations to the 14 chapters who will be receiving Youth Service Grants (YSG) for 2001.

Chapters receiving grants include:

Omicron - \$475,
Phi - \$300, Delta Theta - \$500, Zeta Mu - \$500, Iota Tau - \$300, Kappa Omicron - \$375, Nu Alpha - \$500, Nu Sigma - \$500, Pi Omicron - \$500, Chi Gamma - \$150, Alpha Beta Rho - \$500, Alpha Epsilon Zeta - \$500, Alpha Sigma - \$400, and Omicron Zeta - \$300.

A total of \$5,800 was awarded in grants. This is the most that has been awarded so far since the program was established a few years ago.

A goal for the 2002 grant cycle would be to have at least two grant applications from each region, if not more. The project proposals were very good this year and are reaching out to more children. One item in our America's Promise effort will be to expand this program further. We are urging the Regional Directors and Regional Service Reps to promote this program. To this end, the 2000 National Convention extended the deadline for applying for Youth Service Grants to Dec. 15.

A total of 16 chapters applied for 2001 grants. The program is growing. In 2000, there were 13 applicants for YSG grants. In 1999, there were 11 YSG grant applications.

As directed by the National Convention, the Spring Service Day will be held in conjunction with National Youth Service Day, April 20-21, or on another April weekend as a chapter's campus schedule allows.

This is a part of our America's Promise commitment and we will need to encourage all chapters to participate and report their efforts. We have estimated in our commitment that 120 to 150 chapters will participate in a project to benefit the youth of their community.

We will be requesting a short report to document our national effort, which will be able to be done online, or be faxed or mailed. If your chapter is planning a project on the weekend of April 20-21, let Ed Richter, National Service/Communication Director, know as we might be able to include your project in an overall article in Parade Magazine about National Youth Service Day.

This might also be a great way to invite your alumni to come back to do a joint project this spring as many chapters host Founder's Day picnics this time of year. One idea could be to do a project then have a picnic to celebrate a successful effort and to unite the old and the new Brothers in service.

Planning information was sent to your chapter in early March from Co-Chairs Abigayle Hutten and Rob Coop and is also be available online through www.apo.org. Please help our Fraternity gain some national recognition while doing a service project for the youth of your community. Participate in the Spring Service Day!

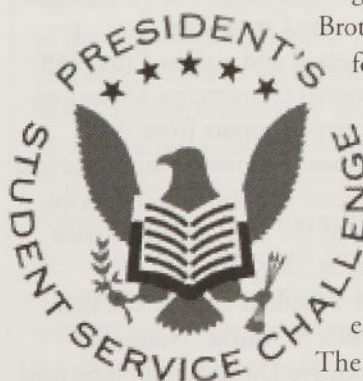
AMERICA'S PROMISE

Remembrances of the Celebration

At the National Convention in Philadelphia in December 2000, the yearlong celebration of our Fraternity's 75th Anniversary came to an end with a confetti shower and the singing of the Toast Song. A year long event that was four years in the making. A year long event that involved many hours of service by numerous people. And a year long event, which celebrated our history while helping set the stage for the next 75 years of our great Fraternity.

We began by bringing awareness of the event by advertising the celebration two years ago at our National Convention in Minneapolis, Minnesota. The unveiling of the logo, the sale of various apparel items displaying it and a 75th Anniversary raffle to raise funds, all provided a forum from which the brothers were told of what to expect from the pending celebration.

During the fall of 1999, members recommitted themselves to our ideals at their Regional and sectional conferences and at their chapters by conducting our Rededication Ceremony. If you participated in any of the Regional conferences, you probably received a t-shirt which advertised the Anniversary and the 2000 National Convention in Philadelphia. Articles concerning our Fraternity's past 75 years began appearing in the Torch & Trefoil reminding us of the brothers who came before us, their challenges and the accomplishments in building the APO we know today.

The 75th Anniversary Committee nominated our Fall 2000 Pledge Class Namesake, Bob Barkhurst, our National Archivist. As

the namesake, Bob requested that our chapters chronicle their history as the project of emphasis during the fall of 2000.

We challenged our Chapters and members with our Anniversary Service Project — "75 for the 75th". Each was asked to honor of the Anniversary in any area they deemed appropriate whether it be Leadership, Friendship or Service. From having a pledge class of 75 to collecting 75 units of blood to getting 75 brothers to a section conference, numerous projects were conducted. These were written up and collected at the National Convention as a part of the event.

During the weekend of July 14 - 16, 2000, "The Easton Event" occurred at our birthplace, Lafayette College in Easton, Pennsylvania. Actives, pledges and alumni gathered from around the country to take this step back into our history. They walked in the footsteps of our founders, rededicated themselves to our ideals at Hogg Hall (formerly Brainard Hall) where the founders met, and were inspired by the words of alumni who knew Frank Reed Horton. Active brothers gathered in a "Visioning Forum" to discuss of the future of the Fraternity.

During the National Convention, we concluded our reflection on our 75-year history with a historic timeline, a celebration of our Golden VIP's, a video depicting our Founders and a gift to our members of a CD - 75 Years of History. As a gift to the Fraternity in celebration of the Anniversary, depictions of the "Living Symbols of the Fraternity", the sturdy oak, the majestic golden

eagle and the beautiful Forget-Me-Not, were commissioned for display at our National Headquarters. And of course, there were numerous items for sale to our members as a remembrance of this Anniversary, from postal commemoratives to apparel to prints of the living symbols (some of which may still be purchased through the National Office). With over 1,300 members participating, we again rededicated ourselves to the ideals set by our Founders by conducting our Rededication Ceremony.
