This year's NVC theme, "Why I Volunteer," celebrates the dedication of all of the Fraternity's alumni volunteers and provides the opportunity to recognize each person's work and unique motivations for serving APO. TORCH TALK

Notes From the Field

During the spring 2015 semester, Chapter Consultant Samantha Benduha conducted 20 on-campus visits and three online video conference sessions with chapters and extension groups across the country. The visits spanned 10 states and seven regions of Alpha Phi Omega. During these oneto three-day visits, traveling Chapter Consultants host meetings and workshops that focus on customized topics that fit the needs of each individual group. To prepare for these hands-on, tailored visits, Chapter Consultants work with regional directors, sectional chairs, advisors and other alumni volunteers.

This semester, Samantha covered advanced membership retention practices with several of the chapters and extension groups. Such practices included leadership development, internal communication and brotherhood building.

During the Consultant visit with Alpha Delta Mu Chapter at Ramapo College of New Jersey, Samantha facilitated a workshop to guide chapter members through a leadership and personality assessment. Members learned about their individual leadership styles and the leadership dynamic within the chapter. Samantha led a brainstorming session on how the chapter can continue to expand leadership opportunities and develop a more positive APO experience for all types of leaders. As a result, the chapter created a leadership chair role and refined the executive committee election process. The chapter also developed a long-term goal to host monthly fellowship dinners.

Effective leadership would not be possible without strong internal

communication practices in place. When Samantha visited with Alpha Alpha Omicron Chapter at Longwood University in Virginia, members discussed the value and necessity of communicating with advisors on a routine basis. Transparency between the executive committee and the rest of the chapter was also covered during the visit. Based on Consultant recommendations, Alpha Alpha Omicron Chapter's executive committee decided to distribute a survey to the chapter for honest feedback and hold a

brotherhood-focused fellowship event. They plan to communicate consistently with advisors and include them in the evaluation process.

Chapter communication is even stronger among trusted networks and friends. During the visit with the SUNY New Paltz Petitioning Group in New York, students bonded while learning educational material in a fun, competitive atmosphere. Samantha held a relaxed game-show style event in which students were split into groups and asked about the history of APO,

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the current state of the Fraternity and the National long-term goal to reach 500 chapters by 2025. Through this experience, the group found inspiration to strengthen the new member education process and move even closer


Whatever the state of the chapter, membership retention practices should always be evaluated and strengthened in order to create the most successful experience possible for those in the Fraternity. Chapters interested in

Fraternity reviews all information submitted and communicates with Program Directors, region directors and other leaders to match alumni with open volunteer positions that fit with their abilities as much as possible.

A number of alumni have found rewarding volunteer roles by filling out the Volunteer Interest Form and working with the Fraternity. Brother Brandon Cummings, Alpha Delta Upsilon '05, saw a post about the form on APO's Facebook page and quickly found a position he is excited about.

"It was a very simple process. Julie reached out to me shortly after I submitted the form to match my skills and interests with volunteer openings," said Brother Cummings, who is now coordinating the APO IMPACT training webinars as a member of the Service Committee.

Brother Cummings joined APO at Saginaw Valley State University in Michigan as a way to meet other students and continue the passion for volunteerism he developed in high school. In college, he enjoyed building camaraderie with his APO brothers while helping the community. His experiences and relationships now motivate him to volunteer. "I met my beautiful wife when we pledged APO

together, and we now have an amazing son. I owe APO a tremendous amount for introducing us and want to give back," he said.

Brother Cummings is proud to be a part of APO IMPACT and is eager to continue serving the Fraternity. "My favorite thing so far has been seeing the reach APO IMPACT has and the potential of what it can do. In the last leadership webinar we did, over half of the people attending had never had formal leadership training. Within an hour we were able to give them some knowledge of good leadership principles, which is an important topic for our brothers."

Brother Danielle Lillie, Alpha Zeta Kappa '07, also used the Volunteer Interest Form to explore how to best serve APO. Community service has always been an integral part of life for Brother Lillie, so she found APO to be a perfect fit as a student at Eastern Kentucky University. After graduation, she felt something was missing without the Fraternity in her life, so she signed up to be a chapter advisor and member of the section staff.

"Once I started volunteering everything fell back into place," said Brother Lillie. She has appreciated her work with APO students over the past several years, but felt a desire to do more and didn't know where to look. Submitting the Volunteer Interest Form pointed her in the right direction. "Julie called me and presented opportunities she thought I would be interested in based on my answers on the form. When she started talking about the external relations chair on the Service Committee and what that position involved, I knew what I was meant to be doing. This is something I can do to further the goals of the Fraternity in a different capacity."

"I thoroughly enjoy the volunteer position as external relations chair," said Brother Lillie. In this role, she is working to set up APO as a certifying organization for The President's Volunteer Service Award with the goal to have 100 brothers receive this prestigious award for community service. "I am also working to increase the number of national partners for the Fraternity. Right now, I am in contact with several organizations and things are going extremely well, especially with Special Olympics. Hopefully

APO will have new partners in the near future," she said.

In addition, Brother Lillie hopes to one day become a director and observer for multiple APO LEADS courses. "I have registered

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for this year's National Volunteer Conference and look forward to continuing my journey and seeing my brothers from across the nation in Baltimore this summer," she said.

Brother Trey Bauer, Iota Rho '07, works with the Fraternity on the other side of the process. As the leadership development chair for Region IV, Brother Bauer connects chapters with various leadership development opportunities and he helps coordinate alumni volunteers who want to work within the region, especially those who need training to be presenters for APO LEADS courses. He appreciates having staff in the National Office available to direct alumni to possible positions.

"The interactions I've had with Julie have been positive," he said. "She

has steered folks to me who expressed interest in presenting for APO, and I have been able to give them more information about the process and make sure they get started on the right track."

Brother Bauer joined APO as a student at Florida State University, and like Brothers Cummings and Lillie, he found it to be one of the best parts of his college experience, which motivated him to volunteer after graduation.

"I liked the opportunity to be a part of the support system to active brothers," said Brother Bauer. "I gained a lot of self-confidence through APO. I met tons of lifelong friends and I met my wife. Being able to serve in the organization that gave me these things and more was really important to me." He hopes those feelings resonate with his fellow alumni, inspiring them to give back by volunteering for the Fraternity.

Brother Smith encourages all alumni to pursue one of the many ways to volunteer and ensure APO's success for years to come. "Whether it's serving as an advisor, extension sponsor, APO LEADS presenter, a special project coordinator or in any other capacity, our Alumni Volunteer Coordinator can help you find your niche," he said. FISCAL YEAR 2013-14

FINARUS SUMMARY

This year it is exciting to report that Alpha Phi Omega had a budget that exceeded \$2 million annually, making the Fraternity a multimillion-dollar operating organization. APO continues to be financially strong as we look toward the future.

Membership revenues are our largest source of gross revenue and exceeded \$1.21 million.

The Fraternity added 15,065 pledges,

slightly fewer than the prior fiscal year. But, once again, the Fraternity set new records in two membership categories for 2013-14: 13,382 initiates and 14,610 actives. For the first time ever, we totaled more than 27,950 student members!

The Fraternity continues to surpass the fiscal year fundraising goal and strives to reach progressively larger goals for the Torchbearer Fund, which now totals more than \$190,000. Contributions

provide slightly less than nine percent of APO's revenue, and we appreciate the continued generosity of members and alumni.

Bank services continue to increase as more chapters pay with credit card/ACH through the Officer Portal. The Fraternity continues to see increased revenue from the Affinity and Royalties category as we work to protect our logos and symbols.

Printing is over budget due to the bonus of increased membership, which required more membership cards and certificates.

We increased

membership in the Society of Life Members, which, in turn,

provides a stronger donor base for the

Fraternity. This increase, combined with an increase in graduating seniors, resulted in additional costs for printing and mailing *Torch & Trefoil* to these members. The Fraternity also launched an electronic version of *Torch & Trefoil*, which is reflected in greater-than-budgeted expenses under Publications.

Our largest expenditure continues to be program services, which includes efforts to equip students to sustain and grow healthy chapters. The Fraternity offered 13 weekend-long trainings attended by 581 students and alumni who learned skills from alumni volunteer trainers and each other: APO LEADS Serve (project management), Membership Academy (small and midsized chapters) and Membership University (chapters with 75+ members). Included in the leadership trainings was the initial launch of the Section Chair Academy, an advanced training opportunity for new and seasoned section chairs. Students and

fees and the Fraternity underwrites the remaining costs with help from the Jackie Burke Fund and GEICO sponsorship.

alumni pay minimal participation

In 2013-14, the Fraternity awarded \$7,945 in Youth Service Grants to 24 chapters for service projects benefitting pre-college-age youth, ranging from badge/patch days for Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts to spring health fairs for children. Grants of \$100 to \$500 are awarded on a competitive basis, and recipient chapters report back on project

expenditures and impact. The grants are fully funded by designated donor funds managed by the APO Endowment.

The John Mack Scholarship Award program is another successful donor-designated fund managed

REGION I

Alpha Gamma Sigma Chapter at New Jersey City University served at the Semi-Annual Book Sale for the M. Jerry Weiss Center for Children's and Young Adult Literature on campus. The center provides resources for professors and education majors at the university as well as the Jersey City community, and it advocates for literacy and education for inner city children and young adults. The chapter has been a part of this project for several years, and proceeds from the book sale help fund the continuation of the center's programs.

REGION II

Xi Zeta Chapter at Rochester Institute of Technology in New York held a weeklong fundraiser and awareness event on campus to benefit Dimitri House, a local homeless shelter. Brothers built a temporary structure with cardboard, wood and tarps and took turns living in it and asking for donations while dealing with cold weather conditions. The chapter has done similar events in the past, and this year brought in over \$1,000, the most ever raised from this service project.

REGION III

Alpha Alpha Delta Chapter at Salisbury University in Maryland hosted its second annual Line of Hope event to benefit the local homeless community. The chapter collected more than 1,100 new and gently used clothing items from students and staff at the university. The items were donated to the Diakonia Shelter in Ocean City, and the project was featured in two local newspapers.

REGION IV

Iota Rho Chapter at Florida State University coordinated the creation of a human ribbon for Sexual Assault Awareness Month. Current chapter members, alumni and other campus organizations participated in the project. Brothers were interviewed by a local television

news program to bring the event and the issue of sexual assault to the attention of the Tallahassee community.

REGION V

Alpha Epsilon Beta Chapter at Ohio Northern University in Ada held service events to benefit the Humane Society of Allen County. Brothers got together for an evening of fellowship and making dog toys and later spent time volunteering for the organization. The chapter helped with laundry, cleaning cages, walking puppies and more. The events were very successful, and they have been invited to continue this partnership with the humane society.

REGION VI

Mu Chapter at Indiana University in Bloomington put on its annual Rubber Duck Regatta fundraiser to assist a community organization. This year, rubber ducks raced down the Jordan River in Dunn Meadow and raised more than \$2,200 for the New Hope Family Shelter. The event also featured tailgate-themed games for students and local families to participate in.

REGION VII

Gamma Rho Chapter at the University of North Texas in Denton volunteered at the Lewisville Lake Environmental Learning Area (LLELA). The chapter held an annual camping trip at LLELA and while there helped plant native-Texas plants as part of an effort to restore the land to its natural habitat.

REGION VIII


