Alpha Phi Omega is proud to announce that 40 chapters have received the Chapter of Excellence Award (COE) and 66 chapters have received the Pledge Program of Excellence Award (PPOE) for the 2015-16 school year for chapters' outstanding accomplishments and completion of requirements. The purpose of the COE and PPOE awards is to recognize chapters in good standing whose programs of Leadership, Friendship and Service promote growth, retention and stability for the active chapter, while providing a positive, inviting and educational environment for prospective and new members. These awards are

also designed to promote better communication between the chapter, sectional, regional and national leadership through regular and timely reporting of chapter activities. The requirements for each award must be completed during the annual reporting period of August 1 through July 31, which corresponds to the Fraternity's fiscal year. A chapter may achieve only one level of excellence in each award per year but may qualify for both awards in the same fiscal year. This year, COE and PPOE recipients will be recognized at the National Convention in Pittsburgh!

So, to all of the brothers I've had the pleasure of getting to know this semester: I can't wait to catch up in Pittsburgh!








is a full-time, two-year commitment, complete with a competitive salary, health benefits, paid vacation, furnished housing and extensive travel opportunities.

As pledges initiate and become brothers, seniors graduate and become alumni, and executive boards transition with a change in officers, APO chapters across the U.S. are constantly evolving with fresh faces, new ideas and a collaborative passion for Leadership, Friendship and Service. In a so-called perfect world, there would be no error, no conflict and no need for help. Everything would be easy and it would just work. Unfortunately, in that scenario, there would also be no room for improvement, no resolution, no growth and no progression. Fortunately for the brothers of Alpha Phi Omega, there are numerous resources dedicated to their success.

Every year, starting in early spring, the Chapter Services Department (CSD) team gets a fresh start assessing the health, growth and general stability of all active chapters and extension groups. The CSD is in constant contact with regional and sectional volunteers and acts as a direct link between chapters and extension groups and the National Office to improve the function and continued growth among our Leaders in Service. The Department consists of seven full-time staff members and, with the help of the Leaders in Service campaign, it hopes to expand its support and to put more students on more campuses providing more service.

The strengths and weaknesses of APO chapters and extension groups are as diverse as the brothers that make up this great Fraternity. In order to assess chapters' needs, strategically resolve issues, and acknowledge and promote the successful chapter operations, the CSD utilizes reported data from the past four years. The information is categorized using the three Rs: recruitment, retention and reporting. Although the data cannot possibly tell the entire story of each chapter, it helps identify the trends of chapters' successes

as well as the areas where assistance might be needed.

"Our main goal is to help our chapters succeed," says Director of Chapter Services Stacey Robinson. "With the information collected, we create the resources to help elevate chapter programming and operations."

The CSD shares its list of chapters and extensions groups with regional directors and sectional chairs for their input and recommendations. Once the list has been finalized, the chapter consultants are then assigned to visit the schools and universities across the country.

Chapter Consultants

Chapter consultants are recent graduates and brothers hired by the Fraternity as full-time staff members. They are valuable resources intended to provide chapters and extension groups with as many skills and resources as they can to keep them moving forward and growing. The Fraternity's consultants are highly trained and have a wide range of knowledge, skills and experience from their time as active brothers and from the chapters they visit each semester. They spend three months out of the year training in all areas of APO and collaborate with other fraternal organizations, and then they hit the road for fall and spring visits.

"The Fraternity currently has three chapter consultants who travel across the U.S. to work with chapters one-on-one," says Stacey. "With the Leaders in Service campaign, we hope to be able to add a fourth consultant to our team sometime in the future who can increase our ability to help more chapters with their recruitment, retention and

reporting and assist extension groups on their road to chartering."

Each chapter consultant visits between 15 and 20 schools per semester. The consultants collaborate with regional directors, sectional chairs and advisors and, together, they determine the areas of growth that are specific to the needs of each visited chapter and extension group.

"The support of local volunteers is critical to the success of our chapters as well as the success of their visits with consultants," says Stacey. "Before the visit, volunteers already have an established relationship with the chapters and are able to share their knowledge with the consultants."

Chapter Organizer Program

This year, the CSD launched the Board's pilot program to expand extension efforts and to help reach the Fraternity's goal of having 500 active chapters by 2025. The Chapter Organizer Program is for graduate students who are brothers of the Fraternity studying at universities where Alpha Phi Omega does not currently have a presence on campus. During this pilot period, the Fraternity has contracted and provided training for two chapter organizers to help get the extension process started.

"It is too early to determine the success of this pilot program, but I hope to see two chapters charter because of these efforts," says Stacey.

Upon the completion of the contractual agreements, the CSD will assess the effectiveness of the Chapter Organizer Program.




