





The following actions were taken by the Alpha Phi Omega Board of Directors at its meeting the weekend of January 26-27, 2018, in Easton, Pennsylvania:

The Board approved the agenda and the consent agenda that included the minutes of the June and October 2017 meetings.

Pursuant to Article X, Section 7 of the National Bylaws, the President declared the following charters null and void:

The Board, by unanimous vote, granted National Honorary Membership to Pam Murray, Rare Books Cataloger/ Metadata Librarian at Lafayette College. Membership was presented to Ms. Murray during Alpha Chapter's re-chartering banquet.



On January 27, 2018, brothers from across the county gathered on the Lafayette College campus to welcome back and celebrate the chapter that held the very first charter of Alpha Phi Omega - Alpha Chapter.

The event was a historic celebration attended by more than 250 students, alumni volunteers and honored guests. National President John K. Ottenad presented the charter, and Alpha Epsilon Kappa Chapter at Cedar Crest College hosted the ceremony welcoming 69 new brothers to the Fraternity. In a nod to the Fraternity's founding, the ceremony took place in Hogg Hall, formerly Brainerd Hall, where the original chartering ceremony was held on the second floor in December 1925.

What better way to celebrate this historic event and honor the campus where it all began for Alpha Phi Omega, than to share the experience from the perspective of the students of Lafayette College. The following is an article written about the re-chartering of Alpha Chapter by Jane Collins and published by the Lafayette College student newspaper – the Lafayette.

ALPHA PHI OMEGA TO REGAIN ALPHA CHARTER

Nearly a century after its founding in Hogg Hall on Lafayette's campus, Alpha Chapter of Alpha Phi Omega, the now international service fraternity and largest fraternity in the country, will receive its original charter. Lafayette will once again be home to the founding chapter of the organization which now boasts over 470,000 members, according to its website.

This Saturday, nearly 200 members of APO from around the United States, including the national president of the organization, and current members of the petitioning group at Lafayette will gather in Hogg Hall to celebrate the chapter's return. This Saturday not only is important for the international organization as a whole, but also marks the culmination of several years of work from student leaders, including current president Ariana Rothman '18.

Rothman arrived on Lafayette's campus in 2014 with a passion for service. She quickly became involved with the Landis Center, but noticed that students like herself felt that there wasn't an accessible way for students passionate about service to work together consistently.

"I was in POSP (Pre-Orientation Service Program) and loved it and at that point I knew that these are the people I want to hang out with in college, people who really care about helping other people and have the same values as me and interests," Rothman said. After participating in many of

the service programs Landis has to offer, she couldn't find exactly the type of opportunity she was looking for.

Rothman found what she was missing in the mission and vision of APO.

APO originally started at Lafayette on December 16, 1925, by Frank Reed Horton '26 with fourteen charter members being initiated on the second floor of what is now Hogg Hall. Membership began to dwindle

in 1974 to only one active member, and later underwent a brief reactivation in 1988. Following that, Alpha Chapter remained inactive until recently, when Rothman and other students put forth efforts to bring it back.

The process of returning to campus was lengthy, taking approximately three years, Rothman said.















In 2014, Rothman and Alex Storozum '18 began the process of contacting APO Nationals and Lafayette to pursue the charter. They had to prove to APO that Lafayette would support the endeavor.

Initially, their efforts encountered slight pushback. "There are so many service opportunities on this campus, why take away from that when you could just strengthen what is already there? What we found with APO is there are so many people on this campus and in Easton who just need hands, and now we have 70 pairs of hands," Rothman explained.

The group also had to create adequate programming according to the three tenets of APO to ensure future success: Leadership, Friendship and Service. Since being recognized at Lafayette as a "petitioning group" in spring of 2016, APO has been heavily involved in multiple events on campus, cosponsoring a few, including Relay for Life, the PASA "Take Back the Night" walk, and the Open Mic Night honoring Joey Towers.

Previous tries had been made in the past to bring APO back to Lafayette, but they were unsuccessful.

"There were a few attempts in the past by other Lafayette students to bring APO back on campus but they didn't put in the work to show that they took it seriously," former APO president Lauren Champagne '19 wrote in an email. "They just thought that they could get the charter back because they were the Alpha Chapter. We've all been working really hard to get this group off the ground and we're all really excited that it's all paying off."

APO is not considered a part of Greek life at Lafayette. As a result, freshman are able to join APO and members can be in both APO and in another Greek organization.

Next fall, any and all interested Lafayette students will be welcome to take part in the two-week long recruitment process and unlike other Greek organizations, APO will be able to pledge everyone who successfully demonstrates interest and passion for service.

Rothman and Champagne are proud to have helped bring APO back on campus and are excited to see it grow in the coming year.

"This organization has grown to an international level and has impacted so many people and communities, and it was all started at Lafayette. Something that has been so impactful was started here on our campus and we get to bring that legacy back to Lafayette," Champagne wrote.

Rothman emphasized that APO has been beneficial to campus service opportunities.

"It's an opportunity to have more people involved in things that are already happening on campus. Instead of taking away from things already happening on campus, it's making them stronger. I think it's really exciting," Rothman said.

College archivist granted honorary membership to APO for commitment to history

A collection once covered with dust in the basement of Hogg Hall now holds. a prominent place in the Lafayette archives and in the history of Alpha Phi Omega, the international service fraternity that started at Lafayette in that the collection to visiting Alpha Phi Omega brothers, a term referring to male or female members, from various schools.

On the same Saturday that Murray received her honorary

very same building in 1925, thanks to the work of college archivist Pam Murray.

Murray was granted honorary membership to the national chapter of APO on January 27 during the chapter's rechartering ceremony for her work with the documents that hold valuable pieces of APO history.

On Saturday, Murray was under the impression that her role was to be facilitator of the historical records for the ceremony. All that changed when Tom Southard, sponsor of the Alpha chapter at Lafayette, introduced Murray to the President of Alpha Phi Omega, the Honorable John K. Ottenad.

"He was introduced to me here in the archives and he said, 'Pam because of all the work you've done over the years for Alpha Phi Omega, we are going to make you an honorary member of the National Board,'" Murray said.

Honorary membership of the national chapter is a relatively rare occasion, Southard said, who said to his knowledge the honor hasn't been given in at least thirty years. Murray said she is also the first woman to receive the recognition.

Murray was humbled by the honor. "Usually people just say 'Thank you very much.' So when John said, 'Pam we're making you an honorary member,' I was really

surprised because I realized what a big honor that was," Murray said. While Murray worked directly with the documents and their

maintenance, she credits Director of Special Collections and College Archives Diane Shaw with saving the documents. When the charter was originally revoked Shaw immediately saved all the documents that she could from Hogg Hall to preserve that chunk of history in Lafayette's archives.

In the nearly three decades since Alpha Chapter disbanded, Murray has become somewhat of an expert on the APO archives. She frequently shows





membership, the 70 members of the Alpha chapter of APO at Lafayette, which lost its charter in 1991 due to low membership, received a new charter recognizing the names of the students involved in the effort. Over the past few decades more than a couple of attempts have been made at rechartering at Lafayette, but it wasn't until the last three years the idea was put into action.

"Over the last few years students had been coming to us saying how they wanted to get the ball rolling so we could pull out all the stuff for them to look at but we didn't really advise them, because that's not our job, our job is acting as a steward for the records, but we would help them in any way they wanted," Murray said.

"To be honest we were beginning to wonder if the chapter would ever get reinstated. Tom [Southard] and Lauren [Champagne '19] and Ariana [Rothman '18] came to visit us around the holidays and told us 'it's happening.' And we were really shocked and thrilled," Murray said. "Of course it's very emotional for a lot of Alpha Phi Omega people because they really see this chapter as the mother, they take it very seriously."

Southard said that is was not only Murray's maintenance of APO history, but also her

commitment to sharing the archives with APO brothers for so long that exemplified her worthiness.

"It's not just that she saved it, it's not just that she archived it, it's that she proactively invited brothers onto the campus and gave them access to these documents. So for us we appreciate everything that she's done but really she has shown her love and respect for the fraternity over many, many years even though none of us knew it by becoming an expert on the fraternity and sharing it with other people," Southard said.



NATIONAL SERVICE WEEK 2017: PREVENTING SUIC ON CAMPUS

Mental health is a complex and sensitive topic that most young adults do not openly discuss. In the 15-24 age group, suicide was the second leading cause of death in 2013, second only to unintentional injury.¹ According to the National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH), the 18-25 age group had the highest prevalence of mental illness at approximately 22.1 percent.² This means that in every one of the Fraternity's sections or regions, someone we know is or has been affected by mental illness.

It is with this in mind that the 44th Biennial National Convention passed the following resolution: Be it resolved that the National Service Week program of emphasis for 2017-2018 shall be "Suicide Prevention," with specific focus on "Preventing Suicide on Campus" in 2017 and "Preventing Suicide in the Community" in 2018.


