NOTES FROM THE MARCH BOARD MEETING

The following notes were taken at the Alpha Phi Omega Board of Directors meeting on March 28, 2020:

The Board approved the agenda and adopted the consent agenda which included the approval of the minutes of the June 22, 2019, October 2, 2019, and February 10, 2020, meetings.

Pandemic Operations Update

The Board received an operations update on what was being done, and near future plans during the pandemic including a discussion of any items they felt should be continued and or stopped.

Spirit & Standards

At the recommendation of the Spirit & Standards Task Force, the Board approved suspending the membership of Jasmine McLean of Chi Lambda Chapter. Additionally, Chi Lambda Chapter at Elizabeth City State University was placed on administrative review.

Election of Board Member

The board unanimously approved electing Marc' Bady, Dean of Students at Coe College, to serve as an appointed member of the Alpha Phi Omega Board of Directors.

Action & Discussion Items

Strategic Discussion

Brother Bingman provided an update on the strategic plan including progress to date on the goals and objectives. It was noted that the update had been prepared prior to the pandemic and that the focus needs to be on the short term and the impact of the pandemic on the Fraternity.

Declaration of Inactive Chapters

At the recommendation of the appropriate regional

chairs and the Membership Chair and pursuant to Article X, Section 7 of the National Bylaws, the President declared the charter of Alpha Zeta Tau Chapter at the University of Pittsburgh at Johnstown null and void.

Financial Review

The Board was provided a cashflow overview of the next five months and discussed the financial impact the pandemic is having on the Fraternity. A task force was established to explore all federal, state, and local resource options available to help the Fraternity in these challenging times. Members of the task force include Brothers Rob Coop, Melody Martin, Kent Lee, Bob London and Richard Scruggs.

Check Signing Authority

The Board approved amending Category – 7 Finance, Policy 7-1. Bank Account Signatures.

Legal Update

Brother Znosko provided a legal update on Board operations during the pandemic emergency. A task force was established to propose necessary changes to the National Bylaws that provide flexibility during a government declared emergency. Members of the task force include Brothers Jen Znosko, Ken Tinkler, Mark Stratton, Jeff Neurauter and Bob London.

Executive Session

The Board moved into Executive Session for the purpose of the Executive Director's annual review.

Time & Place

The next in-person Board meeting is scheduled for June 27, 2020 in Phoenix, AZ.


CONGRATULATIONS XI OMICRON

A LETTER TO THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear Bob,

How are you? I wanted to take a moment to write a thank you to Alpha Phi Omega and all those who have given me so much.

I am a teacher of 8th graders, and at a faculty meeting a couple of years ago, our administration introduced us to "S.M.A.R.T.E.R." goals. When I heard the acronym, I didn't blink. When the principal asked us to raise our hands if we were familiar with this concept, I expected myself to be one of many of the more seasoned teachers to know what this goal setting system was. Instead, I was surprised and, I admit, confused at first, to find that only one other person, an administrator, raised her hand. And that's when I remembered, I actually learned about the SMARTER goal system during an APO LEADS workshop, Launch, and again during other workshops and conferences. Needless to say, I had an edge, and still do today, each time we are required to write one of these goals. The memories of how to write one flooded back quickly, and I still use that knowledge every three months when we write new quarterly goals.

Now, here we are, facing a pandemic that has removed teachers from the classroom though not away from the task of educating the next generation. And suddenly, I once again find myself using tools from my APO past. I am phone and video conferencing, communicating in a variety of formats that require my attention to tone and detail, pre-recording lessons and providing written instruction that can be followed without my presence, and trusting students to lead themselves through their lessons and to ask questions when they need extra guidance in their learning.

Thank you Alpha Phi Omega alumni for giving me these tools, which were forward-thinking in my younger years, so that I may easily utilize and implement them now to provide the best education I can to my students now. Without [APO's alumni volunteers] to introduce me to new things that made me a better leader and a better teacher, I may have found the struggle much more difficult. Not only did they teach me new tools, but they also taught me to embrace the future and to be flexible to try new things.

Again, thank you for all that you do, and I continue to support Alpha Phi Omega!

BROTHER JOHN "JACK" JADEL PASSES AWAY AT 90

It is with profound respect that APO announces the passing of Brother, Youth Service Grant founding donor and former Endowment Trustee John "Jack" Jadel, Zeta Kappa '50. Brother Jadel's generosity and vision for the Fraternity led to the establishment of the Youth Service Grant in 1995, a program that has funded thousands of youth-focused service projects by APO chapters.

Brother Jadel, 90, died April 12, 2020. He was preceded in death by his daughter Pam, in 1994, his college

sweetheart, wife, partner and mother of his children, Mim, in 1999 and his second wife and best friend, Louise in 2017. He is survived by his son, Jeff, his two grandsons and two great grandchildren.



Jadel was born on March 21, 1930 in Toledo, Ohio, a son

of the late Frank A. and Iva (Robb) Jadel.

He attended Bowling Green State University in Ohio. During his undergraduate years at BGSU, Jack began his journey with APO. He was initiated in the spring of 1950 by Zeta Kappa Chapter.

Brother Jadel graduated from BGSU in 1952 and was immediately commissioned a 2nd Lieutenant in the Army. After training at Fort Sill in Lawton, Oklahoma, he served in Korea as commander of a forward Artillery Company before being discharged.

He earned an MBA at the Kelly School for Business at Indiana University in 1955 and then joined Dow Chemical as a salesman. Professionally, he went on to rise in the ranks of various companies, eventually earning his way up into the executive suites. He retired in 1975 as the President of Akzo Nobel's specialty chemical division.

Throughout his many years of involvement with Alpha Phi Omega, Jack exemplified the principles of Leadership, Friendship and Service. In 1995 he created the Youth Service Grant and continued to give graciously to the Fraternity in the many years following. Jack's vision – service and generosity within APO and elsewhere – has benefited countless youth and is just one example of how the Cardinal Principles learned in college become lifelong standards.

Additionally, Brother Jadel served the Fraternity for more than ten years as a member of the Alpha Phi Omega Endowment and was a consistent and loyal donor to the Fraternity.

Jack was honored for the incredible contributions he's made to APO through his leadership and dedication as



a brother, a Trustee, a donor, a Scout and a friend, when he was awarded the National Distinguished Service Key, the Fraternity's highest honor, in 1998. Less than ten years later, he was named the 2007 Fall Pledge Class Namesake Honoree.

In addition to his service to APO, Brother Jadel was a

lifelong Scout and gave graciously of his time, talent and treasure to the Boy Scouts of America. He was recognized for his contribution to Scouting with the Distinguished Eagle Scout Award, the Silver Beaver, Antelope and Buffalo, and served as President of the National Eagle Scout Association.

Jack will continue to touch the lives of each new generation of APO leaders by inspiring and challenging them to give unselfishly of their time and energy – to the Fraternity and the world – just as he has.

You will be missed, Brother Jadel, however your light of service shines brightly through the youth impacted by your generosity.

Congratulations Service Innovation Grant Recipients!

As a national service fraternity, Alpha Phi Omega places a high value on service done by its chapters and members. Every year, chapters think up a variety of service projects serving countless causes and every year, the Fraternity provides funding for projects that do service in an innovative way. This funding is provided through the Service Innovation Grant.

The program aims to provide monetary support for chapter service projects that address an area of need in an innovative way. APO chapters in good standing were encouraged to apply for a grant with a minimum benefit of \$100 and a maximum benefit of \$500. Funding for this grant program has been made possible through the Leaders in Service Campaign and the generous support of alumni members and friends of the Fraternity.

Sometimes projects that receive the grant are ideas that have never been attempted before by the chapter while others are recurring projects that chapters have done many times — the only two criteria are that the project must be innovative and able to be replicated by other APO chapters in the future.





The remainder of this story is told by the chapters and members who served and shared their service through social media this spring. There were many more stories of service that went untold online yet left an equally important impact.



FISCAL YEAR 2018-2019

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

Alpha Phi Omega ended Fiscal Year 2018-19 with expenses exceeding revenue as budgeted. Thanks to the hard work of the Fraternity's leadership team, APO finished the year as planned in terms of membership revenue despite membership declines over the past two fiscal years. Thorough planning and financial projections prepared the Fraternity for this loss, therefore necessary adjustments were made throughout the year.

The charts below provide a picture of the Fraternity's revenue sources and expenses. Note that our membership revenue makes up the largest portion of our income at 42 percent. Program services (services provided to chapters and extension groups) commands a larger relative proportion of our expenses at 66 percent.

REVENUE

Increasing revenues from non-student fee sources is a component of our commitment to the overall health of APO. We continue to determine cost-effective ways to reach our annual fund goals, as this is essential in our efforts to expand programming while keeping student costs low.

With the generous support of our donors, the Fraternity exceeded the Torchbearer Fund goal and closed the year at \$204,539 in donations, which is the highest amount to date. The continued support of APO donors provides a vital revenue stream that ensures program continuity and development during membership fluctuations.

In addition to a successful year for fundraising, the Fraternity also saw increased revenue in royalties and merchandise sales. Affinity partnerships and resulting royalties ended the year at \$105,822, which was \$14,172 more than budgeted, and merchandise sales were up for the year despite reduced membership.


EXPENSES

As mentioned, expenses outweighed revenue in FY2018-19 as budgeted. The 2018 National Convention was the largest contributor to the deficit. Part of this was intentional as the Board endeavored to elevate the Convention experience for our student members in various ways. Unfortunately, there was also a significant decrease in attendance as a result of high travel costs – more so than projected based on Convention history. That being said, the event itself was a successful step forward towards reimagining the Convention. Students and alumni in attendance came together to celebrate APO and better themselves as leaders. High-profile keynote speakers and changes to the schedule offered attendees a more member-focused experience than previous Conventions.

The Fraternity continued to support chapters and students through grants and scholarships in FY2018-19, totaling \$82,714. John Mack Scholarships totaling \$62,500 were awarded to 53 deserving students with the highest scholarship awarded at \$5,000. Most awards ranged from \$1,000 -\$2,500. Youth Service Grants totaling \$8,545 were awarded to 25 chapters. The Service Innovation Grant was awarded to 8 chapters, with funds ranging from \$150 - \$500 each. These grants continue to have a positive impact on chapters' abilities to find new and innovative means of providing service to communities.

It is vital that the Fraternity continue to push forward with generous giving, dedication to improved recruitment and retention, and accurate membership reporting.

Thank you to the dedicated volunteers and donors who support the work of this great organization through their time, talent and treasure. As always, the continued success of the Fraternity rests with each of you – every alum, every donor, every volunteer and every student.
