

# George L. Dacy 2002 Fall Pledge Class Namesake Honoree



In Alpha Phi Omega's history few individuals have had more of an impact at the chapter level than Brother George L. Dacy.

In his 64 years as a member and Advisor, George has touched lives and inspired numerous leaders of our Fraternity. Pledging the Alpha Rho chapter at the University of Texas at Austin three years after the chapter's founding in 1935, George has had a personal impact on the lives of many activated members in the largest chapter in Fraternity history.

As an Alpha Rho Advisor for more than 34 years, George is an outstanding example of how Brothers can continue to serve their local chapters and the Fraternity throughout their lives. During his years of service, he has influenced the leadership development of three National Presidents, five Regional Directors, and many Sectional Chairs and Advisors. He has served as their sounding board, their support, and their friend. He has inspired countless members to take on positions within the chapter and beyond, and they, in turn, have encouraged more members to do the same.

Growing up in Austin, Texas, George earned the rank of Eagle Scout, and in 1937 attended the first Boy Scout Jamboree in Washington D.C. Upon attending the University of Texas, he pledged Alpha Rho in the fall of 1938 and was installed personally by

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
# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

then National President H. Roe Bartle on January 15, 1939. George went on to hold various offices in the new chapter and developed many of the programs that are still in existence today.

George was an Active member of Alpha Rho until 1941, when he was called to duty during World War II. He served as a Captain in the 1st Marine Division, and fought in many major battles of the Pacific campaign. After the war, he continued his military service in the Marine Reserves, retiring with the rank of Major. He returned to the University of Texas and the chapter in 1946, and graduated with a Bachelor's Degree in Business Administration in 1948.

While working in his family business in the 1960s, George was recruited by personal friend Dean Arno

Nowotny, our Fraternity's third
National President, to be an Advisor to
Alpha Rho. Since accepting this honor,
he has led by example, showing that a
lifelong commitment to service and
leadership can be most rewarding. He
has encouraged members to commit to
service, either through APO or elsewhere. In being a pillar in the chapter,
he has motivated members to develop
into stronger Brothers who are dedicated to our three cardinal principles.

He is revered by current members and alumni alike, and has been honored with a Chapter Distinguished Service Key and a Lifetime Achievement Award. George's personal dedication to the Fraternity has extended outside of the chapter. His character and commitment are well known throughout the Region and Nation, and he has made countless financial contributions. He was one of the "FAB 50" donors who made it possible to build the National Office. Most recently in 1998 he received a National Distinguished Alumni Award to honor his 64 years of service in the Fraternity.

Alpha Phi Omega is only part of George's life of service. Now in his 80s, he is still actively involved in the Boy Scouts of America, the local Food Bank, and Austin Child and Family Services. For the past eight years, George has led the Austin Optimist Club's annual Christmas Tree Sales program, raising money in support of various youth programs. As a member of St. David's Episcopal Church, he has served on the vestry and taught Confirmation class for many years. George and wife, Laverne, recently celebrated their 53rd wedding anniversary. They are blessed with a wonderful family of three sons and nine grandchildren.

To quote a recent graduate, "The chapters are the link between the individual and the national organization. Without dedication on the chapter level, it is almost inconceivable to imagine the whole. Mr. Dacy is the living epitome of this dedication. Since pledging over 60 years ago, he has done his all to show how the individual can affect the chapter, and how important the chapter is to the individual."

George L. Dacy has made a lasting impression on Alpha Phi Omega and its members. We are very fortunate to have him as one of our Brothers. He is one of the best friends a person could hope for, and he is always willing to make time for anyone. As he says, "If you want to be my friend, I'll make room for you." George is planning to attend the National Convention in New Orleans, Louisiana, and is looking forward to making room for a lot of new friends.

By tradition, the Fall Pledge Class Namesake Honoree challenges the Fall Pledge Class. Here is George's challenge:

"I have two areas that I would like to see this fall's pledges provide service. The first is to the disadvantaged youth in your community. Just a little bit of help gives a glimmer of hope to those that need it most. I see this on a regular basis in my Optimist Club. Second I would like to charge each pledge to serve our Fraternity by committing to invite one person to join Alpha Phi Omega. One of the biggest differences I see today is that our chapters recruit the people that come to them instead of going out and inviting students to join. This will help our retention numbers because retention starts with recruitment."


EPSILON ZETA CHAPTER Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute Troy, New York

This service project allowed the Boy Scouts to receive their Engineering Merit Badges within one day. This badge usually takes one to two months to complete.

# OMICRON NU CHAPTER University of Puerto Rico/Rio Piedras San Juan, Puerto Rico

The Omicron Nu chapter at the University of Puerto Rico, Rio Piedras Campus participated in a 10K race as a service project. The team worked along with the Puerto Rico Council of Boy Scouts in setting out water for the runners of the 10K International Competition on the island. More than 6,500 people participated in this event, either volunteering or racing. Streets were closed and the racers were ready for one of the longest races in the metropolitan area... and Alpha Phi Omega was there to help!





# THETA UPSILON CHAPTER Case Western Reserve University Cleveland, Ohio

What can a chapter do to attract attention and possibly recruit new members? With a little hardboard, sand paper, white wall paint, blue and yellow acrylic paint, and some artistic ability, three Theta Upsilon chapter Brothers – Andrew Brinkman, Andrea Quinones, and Lauren Wanosky created a sandwich board sign that would not only attract attention to the chapter but also to the Brothers wearing it!

Some important things they learned along the way:

- 1) Always start the project early because you never know when problems will arise.
- 2) Spray paint will NOT work in environments of 32 degrees and below.
- 3) A quick car ride to a nearby Brother's house at midnight is one fast way to get wall paint and strange looks from Mom and Dad.
- 4) Wearing this sign is a great way to get strange looks from students on campus.
- 5) Most importantly, this sign brought Brothers together to spread the word about Leadership, Friendship and Service!

### SIGMA RHO CHAPTER Elon University Elon, North Carolina

This past February, the Sigma Rho chapter at Elon University collected both money and stuffed animals for an organization called "Share A Bear," which collects teddy bears and other stuffed animals for children with AIDS. Nearly every Brother and pledge participated in this project in some important way, including helping manage a table at the student center, advertising, and purchasing stuffed animals. # MU ZETA CHAPTER San Francisco State University San Francisco, California

Last year, more than 90 chapters in the nation earned the Joseph Scanlon National Certificate of Merit. Chapters receive this distinction based on several criteria including a reported net growth of 15 percent after having reported an active membership of 51 or more active Brothers in the previous year. # LAMBDA NU CHAPTER Duke University Durham, North Carolina

The week was spent learning about the Florida environment and natural habitat and successfully planting more than 2,200 native trees along the St. John's River basin. # ALPHA PHI OMEGA'S NATIONAL DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARD

The purpose of the Fraternity's National Distinguished Alumni Award (NDAA) is to recognize those alumni who have continued to further the principles of Leadership, Friendship, and Service beyond their college years in exceptional ways. How an alumnus shows this dedication can range broadly. The service can be in his community or on her college campus, to the youth of our nation, or via many other opportunities including, but not limited to, the Fraternity.

Any advisor, honorary, or alumni member of Alpha Phi Omega is eligible. The nominee must exemplify our cardinal principles and provide outstanding service to others in creative and unique ways. It is not a requirement that a nominee has to be involved in alumni activities of the Fraternity.

Candidates for the NDAA must be nominated by an active member, advisory member, alumni member, or a recognized alumni association. The nomination form is available from the National Office or the Fraternity web site www.apo.org. Once received, the form is acted upon by the National Alumni Relations/Internal Volunteer Development Committee. If the nomination is approved, the committee will work with the nominator to arrange for presentation of the award (a yellow key on a yellow ribbon). Presentations can be made at National Conventions, Regional or Sectional Conferences, Chapter Banquets, Local Alumni Association events, or non-Fraternity events as appropriate.

# Tsuruda Receives Distinguished Alumni Award

Lori Tsuruda, alumna of Alpha Chi chapter (Massachusetts Institute of Technology), received the Fraternity's National Distinguished Alumni Award on June 7, 2002. The award presentation took place as part of the 10th anniversary celebration of People Making a Difference (PMD).

PMD is a Boston-based nonprofit organization that involves volunteers in meaningful, one-day, hands-on projects that complete real work, provide needed resources, and connect people with the community and each other as they work together to make a difference. Brother Tsuruda founded the organization and has served as its only executive director (an unpaid position until 2001). From the nomination letter received by the National Alumni Relations/Internal Volunteer Development Committee, PMD began as a result of her work with APO and other service organizations. "She saw a need – sometimes charitable organizations need a group of people to come in and perform a one-time job."


Under her leadership, PMD runs 50 community service projects a year, which translates to more than 350 volunteers putting in nearly 3,400 hours for service projects in 24 communities in the greater Boston area. Again, Brother Tsuruda's nominator put it succinctly: "...Lori is exactly the type of Brother this award was designed for – someone who has taken the principles she learned in Alpha Phi Omega and put them into practice to serve her community."

The award was a total surprise to Brother Tsuruda and was presented to her at the end of the PMD ceremony. Alpha Phi Omega alumni made up nearly half of the 80+ PMD volunteers participating in the anniversary celebration, including PMD board members mrn Tomusiak (also a former member of APO's National Board of Directors), Ian Agranat, and Nancy Goldberg. Other Fraternity alumni in attendance included Ellen Kranzer, Carla Moran, George Kober, Jennifer Bash, and Keith Roots, National Alumni Relations/Internal Volunteer Development Director, who made the presentation. # Charles R. Baquet, III Acting Director of the Peace Corps

Nominated by President Clinton and unanimously confirmed by the U.S. Senate, Charles R. Baquet III was sworn in as the Deputy Director of the Peace Corps on March 26, 1994. Baquet began his career in public service as a Peace Corps volunteer in the Somali Republic from 1965 to 1967. After completing his Peace Corps service, Baquet pursued a long and distinguished career in the Foreign Service, working in Asia, North America, Africa and Europe. Baquet assumed the position of Acting Director of the Peace Corps in January 2001. He was initiated by the Kappa Xi chapter at Xavier University of Louisiana in 1960.
