

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


"I will replace myself..."

This valuable resource provides collegiate Brothers immediate access to hundreds of national documents and customizable aids, all enabling chapters to enhance their efforts in exhibiting and promoting our principles of Leadership, Friendship, and Service.

The CD-ROM represents the culmination of a three-year effort by Fraternity alumni volunteers to provide greater amounts of informative material to chapters through the increased use of electronic media. This effort also led to the formation of the National Media and Technology Committee, which oversees the design and implementation of electronic media-oriented efforts.

"This project has been a long time dream of many brothers and I am proud to see it come to a fruitful completion," said Joel Natt, an organizer of the CD-ROM project and current Chair of the National Media and Technology Committee. "I believe that it will benefit the chapters and the Fraternity as we grow and change, while embracing more challenges ahead."

"This is a compilation of resources that chapters actually use," said Howie Barnes, Section 89 Chair. "They are meant to be used as examples to give chapters a leg up so they don't always have to reinvent the wheel at every turn."

Having finished their first project, the National Media and Technology Committee is now working on a similar CD-ROM for use by alumni volunteers. In addition, this instrumental project continues to enhance strong membership recruitment for the Delta Chapter. With proven methods and a solid program foundation, MBU is an enduring service tradition for the Delta Chapter and Auburn University, and will continue to be so.

Also celebrating their 10th Anniversary this fall is Merit Badge University (MBU) and University of Scouting (UOS) sponsored by the Gamma Theta Chapter and Venturing Crew 492 at the University of Colorado at Boulder. Each spring and fall season, these programs serve more than 500 Scouts, Venturers/Sea Scouts and Adult Leaders of Arapahoe District, Longs Peak Council, BSA.

More recently, this project has been adopted by Section 30 and Brothers of Epsilon Xi at Colorado State University, Brothers of Mu Pi at the Colorado School of Mines, and the new petitioning group at the University of Northern Colorado. A few Scout units from adjacent councils also participate.

When Gamma Theta Brothers first created their MBU in 1993, it was based on service ideas obtained at a Regional APO Conference with much of the development derived from trial and error about what worked and what didn't. Over the years, the concept has been finely tuned into an effective program that meets the needs of the District Scouts and Leaders and that is approved and endorsed by the Council's Advancement Committee.

Brothers of Gamma Theta work diligently to recruit a mix of APO counselors, university professors and grad students, District Counselors and Scout unit leaders and other volunteers to assist in offering approximately 30

merit badges and 12 University of Scouting training/informational classes. Various games and exercises such as "capture the flag" and scavenger hunts are available during recreational time. All Scouts are required to be in full uniform during the day's events.

One of the great advantages in sponsoring these events on campus is the plethora of resources and expertise that each Scout can truly benefit from. For example, the state of the art University planetarium can simulate a week's worth of stargazing for the astronomy merit badge. In addition, astronomy is taught by a professor or graduate assistant in astrophysics/space science, which adds increased enthusiasm as each Scout works toward his or her individual goal. Other examples include the swimming merit badge and "Discover SCUBA," which are taught at the University pools by certified PADI SCUBA instructors and rock

climbing, which is led at the local indoor rock gym by certified instructors/counselors and the Rocky Mountain Rescue group. What better "hands-on" service opportunities could there be to enhance the lives of these young people?

It's certainly an honor that the respected Scouting community of Colorado has built trust and confidence in Alpha Phi Omega, which will continue to grow and benefit our leaders of tomorrow.

We acknowledge and thank David O'Leary, Mike Nathan, Bob Amick, Katheryn Mason and David Self for their personal time and contributions regarding the Merit Badge University story. We understand that there are many more APO chapters involved in similar service programs and we encourage you to submit those stories and photos to the Torch & Trefoil (TandT@apo.org) for consideration in upcoming issues.




