





ACTIONS OF THE 2012 NATIONAL CONVENTION

AMENDMENTS TO THE NATIONAL BYLAWS

Changes were made to the National Bylaws to clarify and/or change the language for consistency, or adopt/amend new policies. The following articles in the National Bylaws were amended by the National Convention:

ARTICLE VII – National Committees Section 6

Amend to Read: It shall be the duty of the National Service Committee to develop a two-year National Service Program for consideration and action by the biennial National Convention; to stimulate effective and well-rounded service programs by instigating resource development and distribution; and to encourage high-quality chapter service programs through an effective program of promotion and recognition of chapter service activities, opportunities and incentives.

ARTICLE XII – ALUMNI

Section 1: Local Alumni Association

Amend to Read: (4) Each recognized local alumni association shall annually reaffirm its recognition by May 15 by application to the **National Office** for review by the appropriate alumni relations committee. New associations may apply for recognition at any time. Initial recognition for an alumni association or annual reaffirmation of recognition shall consist of filing of the required forms and fees with the National Office. Recognition must be certified or rejected by the appropriate alumni relations committee within one month of receipt of the properly prepared forms. The minimum requirements for initial recognition will be no fewer than five alumni members. Additional requirements for alumni associations may be established and published at the discretion of the appropriate alumni relations committee with the majority approval of the National Board of Directors

Article III – Membership Section 2: Types and Conditions of Membership Subsection: (4) Advisory Membership

Amend to Read: Advisory members shall have all rights and privileges of active membership except those of voting within a chapter at meetings other than those of the chapter advisory committee, directing the supervision of pledges, and directing the establishment of pledge or active membership programs and policies.

Article III - Membership

Section 2: Types and Conditions of Membership Subsection: (4) Advisory Membership Amend to Read: (insert at end of current paragraph) Individuals who previously held advisory membership and whose advisory membership status concluded for any reason may be reinstated to advisory membership in accordance with any provisions adopted by the chapter. The reinstatement to advisory membership will only be completed once the chapter notifies the National Office of the change in membership status and transmits to the National Office a certification from the

individual acknowledging their agreement with this change in their membership status.

ARTICLE III – Membership Section 2: Types and Conditions of Membership Subsection: (7) Alumni Membership

Amend to Read: Upon leaving their respective academic institution as a result of graduation or termination of student status, or termination of advisory committee membership, all who have held active, associate, advisory, honorary or inactive membership in a chapter and who have not been suspended or expelled by that chapter or the National Fraternity shall be recognized as alumni members.

ARTICLE VII – National Committees
Section 2: National Advisory Committee
Amend to Read: SECTION 2. NATIONAL
ADVISORY COMMITTEES. The National
President shall establish one or more National
Advisory Committees. The National Advisory
Committees shall consist of a chair and members appointed by the National President.

NATIONAL STUDENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE. The National Student Advisory Committee shall consist of the National President as Chair, the National Vice President as Vice Chair, the National Executive Director and a number of active members. An active member who ceases to hold active membership is automatically removed from the committee. All members are voting members of the Student Advisory Committee, with the exception of the National Executive Director, who shall have all rights of the other members, except the right to vote. Other requirements for membership on the committee, as well as the method for appointment and the number of active members, are detailed in the Fraternity Operations and Policy Manual. The National Student Advisory Committee shall meet at least one (1) time per year in person and may have any number of meetings by teleconference or other electronic means. The National Student Advisory Committee shall advise the National President, and other fraternity entities as determined by the National President, on matters of importance and of interest to student members of the Fraternity.

OTHER NATIONAL ADVISORY COMMITTEES. The National President may appoint other National Advisory Committees as deemed necessary to advise the National President, and other fraternity entities as determined by the National President, on matters concerning the welfare of the Fraternity.

ARTICLE VI – National Board of Directors Section 2: Members of the National Board of Directors

Amend to Read: The National Board of Directors shall consist of the following elected members: National President, National Vice President, six program directors, 11 regional directors, and ex-officio members. These ex-officio members are: National Executive Director, National Legal Counsel, National Archivist, International

Relations Director, Past National Presidents, Life Members of the Board and a representative of the National Council of the Boy Scouts of America. The ex-officio members shall also serve as advisors to the Board and assume responsibility for special assignments on appointment by the National President. Each member of the Board shall have one vote at meetings of the National Board of Directors, except for the National Executive Director, National Archivist and National Legal Counsel, who shall be non-voting members. Every two years, By the first Board meeting following each National Convention, past National Presidents and Life Members of the National Board will be given the option to selfelect emeritus/a status with voice but no vote. Once emeritus status is elected, it will remain in place until revoked by that brother in writing to the National Executive Director. Unless a voting member of the National Board of Directors is appointed to serve as International Relations Director, the International Relations Director shall be a non-voting member. With the exception of voting, non-voting members of the National Board of Directors shall have the same rights as the voting members.

ARTICLE XI – Regions Section 2: Regional Leadership

Amend to Read: SECTION 2. REGIONAL LEADERSHIP. Nomination and election of the Regional Directors shall take place in Regional Meetings at National Conventions in accordance with the procedures established in the Standing Rules of the National Convention. Only registered delegates entitled to vote, representing chapters within the appropriate region, and the alumni voting delegate for that region, may nominate and elect their regional director. Regional directors' terms of office shall begin upon adjournment of the final legislative session of the National Convention at which they are elected or upon their election, whichever is later.

ARTICLE IX – Chapters Section 7: Inactive Chapters

Amend to Read: A chapter shall be considered inactive when any of the following situations occur: The chapter fails to remain in good standing for two (2) consecutive years, unless good cause can be shown by the regional director. The administration of the institution where the chapter is located withdraws permission for the chapter to operate. Written notification is received from a brother who is authorized by the chapter to represent the remaining brotherhood that it is or will be inactive. No active, associate or inactive members of the chapter are enrolled at the institution. The charter of an inactive chapter shall be declared null and void by the National President after an investigation conducted in accordance with the procedures set out in the Fraternity Operations and Policy manual confirms the chapter's inactive status. The rechartering procedure shall consist of fulfilling all the requirements for a new chapter.

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ARTICLE IX - Chapters

Section 6: Annual Charter Reaffirmation

Amend to Read: Each chapter shall annually reaffirm its charter by November 15 by submitting a roster of the active members, a roster of the advisory members, payment of Annual Active Membership Dues, and a copy of the current chapter bylaws, standing policies, membership policies, and other policies that are specific to the chapter's operation and management, and certifications that the chapter is in compliance with the Membership and Risk Management Policies of the Fraternity and is in compliance with the Standard Chapter Articles of Association

ARTICLE X – Sections Section 3: Sectional Conferences

Amend to Read: A sectional conference shall be held at least annually at a time and place determined by the chapters in the section, subject to the approval of the regional director. A sectional conference may formulate recommendations and propose amendments for the consideration of a regional conference, the National Convention or the National Board of Directors. A section may establish section dues and assessments, in addition to those established by the National Fraternity, by a vote of those chapters in good standing at the national level. Any chapter not in good standing but represented at a sectional conference shall be entitled to all privileges as a chapter in good standing, with the exception of voting. If a chapter fails to pay any section dues or assessments, it shall be considered not in good standing at the sectional level, but this will not impact the chapter's standing at the national level.

ARTICLE XI – Regions Section 3: Regional Conferences

Amend to Read: A regional conference shall be held at a time and place determined by the chapters in the region, subject to the approval of the regional director. A regional conference may formulate recommendations and propose amendments for the consideration of the National Convention or the National Board of Directors. A region may establish region dues and assessments, in addition to those established by the National Fraternity, by a vote of those chapters in good standing at the national level. Any chapter not in good standing but represented at a regional conference shall be entitled to all privileges as a chapter in good standing, with the exception of voting. If a chapter fails to pay any region dues or assessments, it shall be considered not in good standing at the regional level, but this will not impact the chapter's standing at the national level.

ARTICLE IX – Chapters Section 8: Chapters in Good Standing

Amend to Read: A chapter in good standing is one which yearly meets its financial, administrative, and Annual Charter Reaffirmation obligations to the National Fraternity; is not more than ninety (90) days delinquent in its financial accounts with the National Office; has maintained its

501(c)(3) not-for-profit status with the federal government and any appropriate state and local not-for-profit status; has confirmation of submission of a Spring Youth Service Day Report and a National Service Week Report; has at least one active member; and which has not been declared inactive or suspended, or had its charter revoked, or has not otherwise been deemed in violation of the policies or National Bylaws of Alpha Phi Omega or of the rules, regulations or policies of its school.

AMENDMENT TO THE STANDARD CHAPTER ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION

Article III – Membership Section 5: Advisory Membership

Amend to Read: Advisory members shall have all rights and privileges of active membership except those of voting within a chapter at meetings other than those of the chapter advisory.

committee, directing the supervision of pledges, and directing the establishment of pledge or active membership programs and policies.

ARTICLE III – Membership Section 5: Advisory Membership

Amend to Read: (insert at end of current paragraph) Individuals who previously held advisory membership and whose advisory membership status concluded for any reason may be reinstated to advisory membership in accordance with any provisions adopted by the chapter. The reinstatement to advisory membership will only be completed once the chapter notifies the National Office of the change in membership status and transmits to the National Office a certification from the individual acknowledging their agreement with this change in their membership status.

Article III – Membership Section 7: Alumni Membership

Amend to Read: Upon leaving their respective academic institution as a result of graduation or termination of student status, or university employment or termination of advisory committee membership, all who have held active, associate, advisory, honorary or inactive membership in this chapter and who have not been suspended or expelled by this chapter or the National Fraternity shall be recognized as alumni members.

AMENDMENT TO THE STANDARD POLICY OF RISK MANAGEMENT

Article: Sexual Harassment/Abuse/ Discrimination

Amend to Read: The Fraternity will not tolerate or condone any form of abusive or discriminatory behavior on the part of its members, whether physical, mental, or emotional, in respect to sex, race, ethnicity, physical, mental or emotional disability, age, marital status, sexual orientation, gender identity, or religious affiliation. This is

to include any actions which are deemed to be demeaning to all, but not limited to date/gang rape or verbal harassment.

AMENDMENT TO THE FRATERNITY OPERATIONS AND POLICY MANUAL

Category III – Awards
Subcategory: 1. National
Policy XIX: NEW POLICY – The Howard R.
Patton National Leadership Award
Amend to Read: Naming the National Leadership
Award after Brother HOWARD R. PATTON

Category V – Membership and Extension Subcategory: 2. Chapter Policy II: National Pledging Standards Clause 1: The General Objectives Of Pledging Amend to Read: An appropriate period of pledging consists of a well-rounded program of opportunities in Leadership, Friendship and Service, which has been recorded and authorized by the chapter., and provided to the pledges at the beginning of the pledging process. Requirements for the pledging period are to be provided to the pledges at the beginning of the pledge process.

Category V – Membership and Extension Subcategory: 1. General Policy III: Alpha Phi Omega Membership Policies Section 3: Other Policies Subsection: H

Amend to Read: Active brothers are responsible for maintaining chapter membership practices involving any members of the Fraternity, including actives, in strict accordance with the policies of Alpha Phi Omega and its stated purpose <a href="mailto:and-new-mail

Category II – Organizational Subcategory 1: National – Responsibilities/Rights Policy V: Special National Committees

Amend to Read: Policy – V. Special National Committees. The National President appoints all Special National Committees with the concurrence of the Board of Directors. All Special National Committees expire at the close of the next National Convention.

NATIONAL STUDENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE. The National President shall appoint, after consultation with and upon the recommendation of each regional director, a number of active members from each region, according to the following chart:

# of Chapters In Region	# of Students
0-20	1
21-40	2
41 or more	3

When a region gains or loses enough chapters to gain or lose a seat on the committee, that gain or loss is applied immediately. In the event that a region gains a seat, the regional director shall

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recommend one or more active members, from whom the National President shall appoint one. In the event that a region loses a seat, the regional director shall notify the National President, within thirty (30) days of the loss, which active member from that region is to be removed from the committee.

RESOLUTIONS

- Be it resolved that the National Service Week program of emphasis for 2013-2014 be "APO Shows Respect to All." Be it further resolved that the project theme for 2013 be "Respect for Self" and that the 2014 project theme be "Respect for Others."
- Whereas Alpha Phi Omega has information booths at National Scout Jamborees to promote ourselves to Scouts and Scouters, and
 - Whereas the World Scout Movement has regular World Scout Moots, bringing together older Scouts from around the world,
 - Be it resolved that Alpha Phi Omega-USA work with Alpha Phi Omega-Philippines and ICAPO to have an APO information booth at the upcoming 2013 World Scout Moot, which would allow us to promote our Fraternity to the Scouts of the world.
- 3) The Alumni Relations & Internal Volunteer Development Committee is directed to create a recognition program for alumni volunteers of the Fraternity. The program will be at a level below and not meant to compete with the National Distinguished Service Award. In addition, the Committees are encouraged to consider ways to publicize recipients of the awards.

The recognition program could include:

Advisor's Award of Merit

The Phyllis C. Tenney Excellence in Advising Award remains the highest award for advising, with recipients nominated by their chapters. The Advisor's Award of Merit would recognize those advisors who give unselfishly of their time and talents and complete a set of requirements. While the Tenney Award is given to a small number of advisors who are nominated by their chapters and then selected by a national committee, the Advisor's Award of Merit would be given to any advisor that completed a set of requirements that shows their commitment to the chapter. Requirements could include: 1) serving as a chapter advisor for at least three of the prior five years; 2) participating in at least three CAPS sessions with the chapter; 3) attending at least 50 percent of chapter meetings over that time; 4) attending at least 75 percent of Advisory Committee meetings; 5) attending at least 75 percent of chapter Induction and Initiation Ceremonies; and 6) each year over the prior three years, attending at least one

event at the sectional, regional or national

Alumni Service Award

This award would be created to give alumni of the Fraternity a goal in their service. This award could consist of a set of requirements that, when completed, show the commitment of the alumni to continuing service to the Fraternity. The award could be given at one of four levels (national, regional, sectional or alumni volunteers) and could only be earned once. Most well-rounded volunteers are already doing this work, but it would strengthen the Fraternity volunteer corps by both giving goals to work toward and recognizing their service. Requirements would be in areas of Service, Friendship, Leadership and Stewardship and could include requirements like serving in a volunteer position, attending events like conferences or leadership development programs, and donating to the Fraternity.

National Volunteer Service Award

This award would be given by the National President, National Vice President or a Program Director for outstanding service on a national level. Nominees would be required to have at least five years of service at that level. The National Office would maintain a list of volunteers who meet that criterion (as defined by those who have served at least five years as national committee appointees), which would be distributed twice each year to the President, Vice President and Program Directors. The award could only be received once. Awardees would be recognized with a certificate and a lanel pin

Additional Suggestions

Other national committees should also consider how they can create awards recognizing staff and volunteers. In addition, the Board of Directors should make a concerted effort to recognize alumni efforts with the National Certificate of Appreciation. The Certificate exists to recognize individuals, chapters or organizations that have made a significant contribution to the advancement of Alpha Phi Omega. In addition, to ensure the general membership of the Fraternity understands this award, we request the Fraternity create a webpage that lists individuals, chapters or organizations that have been awarded the Certificate, the date the Certificate was presented and a brief description of why the Certificate was given. The Fraternity should educate chapters on the Chapter Outstanding Service Certificate. This certificate is available from the store on the Fraternity website. It can be given by the chapter to recognize anyone who has "rendered outstanding service." Chapters should understand that recipients could include alumni volunteers and advisors, and chapters should be given suggestions on how they might set criteria for the award.

- The Alumni Relations & Internal Volunteer Development Committee is directed to continue the development of the "Sturdy Oak" program.
- 5) The Alumni Relations & Internal Volunteer Development Committee is directed to encourage programming for alumni at regional and sectional conferences and to continue programming at the National Convention.
- 6) The Alumni Relations & Internal Volunteer Development Committee is directed to research and benchmark other alumni/ae associations/groups from other fraternities and/or sororities.
- 7) The Alumni Relations & Internal Volunteer Development Committee is directed to implement and/or increase communication and outreach to graduating seniors beyond membership in the Society of Life Members. Communication should provide information on how to stay involved at the various levels of the Fraternity (sectional, regional and national). Communication should come through various forms of media (i.e., letter, brochure, video, etc.).
- 8) The Alumni Relations & Internal Volunteer Development Committee is directed to encourage regional directors and sectional chairs to have active staff members in an alumni relations role on regional and sectional staff
- 9) The Alumni Relations & Internal Volunteer Development Committee is directed to implement and/or increase visibility of training for the alumni relations leadership position (alumni secretary, alumni chair, etc.) at the chapter level.
- 10) Be it resolved that the National Board of the Fraternity examine the change of terminology suggested by proposed legislation item MEM-3A-08 as it relates to extension and current-chapter retention. Both Greek-letter organizations and institutions of higher learning are moving away from the terms "rush," "rushee(s)," "pledge(s)," "pledging," "pledge program" and "pledgemaster" and transitioning to the complimentary terms "recruitment," "potential new member(s)," "new member(s)," "new member education program" and "new member educator."
- 11) Be it resolved that the National Board of the Fraternity research the implementation of a streamlined submission process for Chapter Assessment Planning Session, H. Roe Bartle Awards and Chapter Re-affirmations.
- 12) Be it resolved that the National Board of Directors create and enforce a comprehensive policy for actions to be taken during an investigation regarding chapters that are under consideration of becoming inactive. This policy should take steps to confirm or refute the legitimacy of the chapter's representative and chapter's condition.

- 13) After discussing Ref. #: CFO-11R-41, we recommend that the National Board consider providing a digital option of the *Torch & Trefoil* subscription with the Life Membership subscription. We think this move would reflect our fraternity's sustainability efforts to protect natural resources and keep up with technological developments. This compromise also balances the benefits of having paper copies for more traditional alumni who may be reminded to consider donating over the course of their Life Membership, as well as providing a more accessible form for those who are technologically savvy.
- 14) The Alumni Relations Committee and the Membership and Extension Committee are directed to expand the Chapter of Excellence program to include requirements addressing member education regarding the volunteer opportunities available in Alpha Phi Omega after active membership. Communications in all forms may include opportunities beyond membership in the Society of Life Members and could provide information on how to stay involved at the various levels of the Fraternity.
- 15) Whereas Alpha Phi Omega's first chapter was located at Lafayette College in Easton, Pennsylvania, and the first National Office was located at the Carnegie Library of Homestead in Munhall, Pennsylvania,
 - Be it resolved that Alpha Phi Omega have memorial plaques installed at these locations to memorialize these facts.
- Whereas National Honorary Membership is the highest honor that Alpha Phi Omega may bestow on an individual,

Whereas there is no current comprehensive list of all National Honorary Members,

Be it resolved that Alpha Phi Omega examine the Fraternity archives to compile a list of those who have received National Honorary Membership since the Fraternity's founding, with the intention of creating a perpetual plaque that would list all National Honorary Members and the year they were so recognized.

17) Be it resolved that the Board of Directors consider the following amendment to the Fraternity Operations and Policy Manual:

Selection is made by the Service, Scouting and Youth Services Convention Reference Committee in session at the National Convention based on the two-year time period between Conventions. The chapter has submitted at least one project to the Project Archives prior to the National Convention.

Selection is made by the Awards and Appreciation Convention Reference Committee from among chapters submitting materials for consideration. Applications must be received by the Awards and Appreciation Convention Reference Committee prior to it convening on the first night of the National Convention or at a later time to be determined by the Committee.

20) Be it resolved that the Board of Directors consider the following amendment to the Fraternity Operations and Policy Manual:

Fraternity Operations and Policy Manual CATEGORY # – III SUBCATEGORY # – 1 POLICY # – V SECTION # – 2

Selection: Applications must be received by the Awards and Appreciation Convention Reference Committee prior to it convening on the first night of the National Convention or at a later time to be determined by the Committee. Presentations may be written, verbal or visual. Video, the format of which is approved by the National Executive Director in advance of the National Convention, is limited to 15 minutes in length.
