A sophomore at Southeast Missouri State College, Brother "J. J." has contributed consistently to Beta Psi Chapter's program of service since his initiation in January, 1942. He was selected as an Honor Freshman his first year in college. He is a Life Scout and has done all his Scouting work in the Southeast Missouri Council at Cape Girardeau, Missouri.

An Open Letter to All Members from the National President

My Dear Brothers:

Living in a world that demands a continually shifting readjustment while the amazing pages of history are being sternly written, we must give our intelligent consideration to the adjustments necessary in Alpha Phi Omega.

Civilian students are fewer and the great need of our armed forces overshadows all that we do and plan. Yet this fraternity, its ideals, its background, its promise of the future, are the very things for which our brothers in uniform are grimly battling today. From all over the continents come their letters, all saying in varying words with but a single cry: "Alpha Phi Omega must carry on, must be there when we come back. Tell the men not yet in service that we're counting on them to keep Alpha Phi Omega progressing on every campus."

Ours is the job of measuring up to their plea. There are certainly many


problems, but we must not fail our trust.

Thus it is needful that we make our readjustments. Let's recognize, first of all, that our younger men are doing a great job and are proving themselves earnest and able in their leadership. It has been necessary to place tremendous responsibility on them, and they have measured up in marvelous fashion. The latest draft is drawing heavily on this field, but there are still men of this bracket and younger at hand. Let's utilize them fully. Their energy is boundless, their spirit sincere, and their capabilities surprising. Even if they can be with us for but a few months at this time, they can make a real contribution to our fraternity and in return will have enduring membership in our brotherhood. Pledge them, train them intensively, and initiate them at the earliest possible moment. Don't wait for large groups—pledge men daily, weekly, constantly.

Secondly, every campus that has received students of the armed forces should embrace this field of manpower. I have just finished reading, with pleasure and approval, a marvelous letter from the president of Beta Beta Chapter, Brother Bill Gordon, telling of contact with the morale officer of the training detachment stationed there, and the fine results ensuing. Even in a new job as a part of Uncle Sam's army, the student in uniform is interested in fellowship and service.

Third, and exceedingly important, is the fact that this summer almost every college will be operating full swing; if a man is being deferred to remain in school, Uncle Sam expects him to stay on the job the year-round and carry on. In every such school Alpha Phi Omega should likewise carry on the year-round.

No two campuses have like problems, but there is a way for *every* chapter to carry on and unless we find that way we are failing those who have had to leave this trust in our hands. They've given a lot to Alpha Phi Omega, and they're giving a lot for us now. *Let's keep faith*.



THE ARMY GIVES O. K. TO FRATERNITIES

Soldier students assigned to colleges may join fraternities if they want to and if they get an opportunity, the War Department announced on April 6.

The Navy had previously ruled that its trainees would be permitted to take part in fraternities and other extracurricular activities to such an extent as their time will permit.

Every chapter of Alpha Phi Omega should be alert to select new members from the military units and to render service to the Army and Navy groups in every way possible.


