ACTIONS OF THE NATIONAL EXECUTIVE BOARD

Alpha Phi Omega's Board reviewed the Fraternity operations in detail on Saturday, March 26, in a decision-making session at Cleveland, held under the leadership of the National President, Dr. Tom T. Galt. Many of the nineteen members present took part in committee meetings held the day before.

The Board received reports from the President and

the Director and from 24 committees. Every phase of APO's program was analyzed and discussed. The meeting was the second held in this university year. Board members travel at their own expense. They give Service as well as preach it.

The principal actions taken were as follows:

- A revised operating budget was adopted for the balance of the fiscal year, which terminates August 31. Some items were raised and others lowered to meet changing conditions.
- 2. The Convention Committee's recommendations to open the Minneapolis Convention December 27 and close it on December 29 were accepted. The Committee was instructed "to make a strong effort to get advisors to attend and involve them in the convention's proceedings."
 - A sum of \$1,000 was budgeted as a subsidy for 1966 Convention expenses. Any unexpended amount will revert to the Fraternity's general operating fund.
- 3. The progress of the Fund Raising effort now under way to secure Sustaining Memberships, was reviewed. Board members have contributed more than \$700 to date, the report showed. The Board authorized the Fund Raising Committee "to obligate the Fraternity up to the sum of \$1,000 to initiate a Sustaining Membership program."
- Proposals from chapters to introduce Rituals for the observance of Founder's Day and for the use of "Jewels of Office" at installation of chapter officers were reviewed and discussed. The Board decided

- these would be placed on file at the National Office and made available to chapters on request, but not incorporated in the National Ritual.
- Color slides of the Emblem and of the Crest are to be made official supply items, to be sold to chapters.
- 6. Proposals were rejected to have APO conduct a Nationwide blood drive for Vietnam servicemen and to join in a dollar donation campaign to secure contributions to the Vietnam American Legion Relief Drive, on the recommendation of the Awards and Service Committee. A proposal to make assistance to Mental Health Associations a national project was discussed. The Board accepted the Committee's recommendation that this type of project be favorably recommended to chapters for their consideration, but not accepted as a national Service project.
- 7. The Board accepted the recommendation of its Awards and Service Committee that a National Laureate Chapter not be established, but that additional Certificates of Recognition be authorized to enable chapters and sections to honor APO members meriting them.
- A proposal to establish a program of National Collegiate Service Awards was referred back to the committee in charge for further study.
- Received and referred to its Executive Committee a comprehensive report from the National Legal Counselor, Brother Aubrey B. Hamilton, pointing to the need for funds to carry out some of the legal requirements of the Fraternity.
- Adopted procedures recommended by the Personnel Committee to govern the employment of personnel by the Fraternity.
- Commended the National Director and the entire APO staff "on the conduct of the operations of the Fraternity."
- Received with commendation the report of the Long Range Planning Committee and adopted its recommendations for the Fraternity's future expansion.
- 13. Noted with pleasure the receipt of a letter of appreciation to all APO Chapters from Peace Corps Director Jack Vaughn to Dr. L. R. Steig, Chairman of APO's Peace Corps Project Committee.
- 14. Accepted with pleasure reports from nine other Committees indicating progress in assignments given them.
- Moved to recess, but not adjourn, the Board Meeting so that action by mail may be taken whenever the President deems necessary.

19th NATIONAL CONVENTION AHEAD

Plans for Alpha Phi Omega's Nineteenth National Convention, to be held December 27-28-29, 1966, are well under way, according to Convention Chairman Ed Andrews. The Hotel Radisson, Minneapolis, will be the Convention headquarters.

Convention costs will be held to a minimum. The registration fee will be \$4 per person. Hotel rooms with multiple housing will be available at \$4 per night per person,

and up. Room reservation cards will be sent to all chapters this Fall.

Alpha Rho, the University of Texas, once again has taken the lead. Last month the chapter deposited registration fees for five Brothers with the National Office. The Convention Committee urges each chapter to plan now to have at least two representatives at Minneapolis. Every chapter should set up a Convention savings fund to cover travel and costs. Many Sections are studying travel plans for their chapters and checking costs by rail, by bus, and by air. Chapter "How-We-Do-It" displays will be welcome.

The Convention will open officially with a banquet Tuesday evening, December 27, and will close at a banquet Thursday evening, December 29. Registration will begin at 9 A.M., December 27. Convention Committees will meet that day and so will the National Executive Board. Proposals to amend the National Constitution and By-Laws must be submitted in writing to the National Executive Director at the National Office and received there at least 60 days prior to the opening of the Convention.

Alpha Phi Omega National Conventions provide a unique experience in your fraternity life. They offer the opportunity to meet and talk with brothers from all parts of the country, and the chance to exchange ideas with other delegates on the best possible ways to be of Service on your campus. They enable you to meet the people who have made Alpha Phi Omega what it is today, and to meet those who are doing their part to insure that the future will be even greater.

Plan now to meet with your Brothers from all parts of the United States at "Minneapolis in '66."

When APO's best chapters are named, invariably the name of a fine Advisor comes to mind. The Convention Committee hopes the Minneapolis meeting will prove outstanding for the number of Advisors in attendance.

Delta Beta + 1053 Pints of Blood = Holiday

Students at the University of Oklahoma were granted a half holiday April 4 by Dr. George L. Cross, the University's President.

The President took this unusual action to signify his pleasure and that of the administration for the tremendous success of the APO sponsored blood drive, which netted 1053 pints for the American Red Cross. This is the first proclaimed holiday in 15 years at the university.

The blood drive took place Feb. 22-25. This was the largest blood drive in the history of the Southwest United States.

Every student and faculty member now will be eligible for free blood transfusions for one year. So far as is known this is the first Blood Drive in which officials turned away 200 to 300 blood donors who arrived after the 1000-pint goal had been attained, according to Brother Goldfield.

The Campus Daily and Oklahoma City and Norman newspapers featured the drive. This may be one of the reasons for Delta Beta's record-breaking 58-man Pledge Class.


