Ensign C. A. Schutze, Jr.

Receiving his BS degree in business administration and his Ensign's commission in the United States Naval Reserve the last week of October, Brother C. A. leaves behind an enviable record of leadership and service in Alpha Phi Omega and in other affiliations at the University of Texas. He was initiated into Alpha Rho Chapter in May, 1940, and served ably in many capacities in the chapter, being elected president last year. During his presidential term he led his chapter to unprecedented heights in service and man-power despite the heavy drain of war upon university enrollment.

Brother Schutze was selected for Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges, was elected to Friars, senior organization which includes the four outstanding senior men of the entire campus, and to Phi Eta Sigma, honorary scholastic fraternity. Students of the Chinese language tell me that the symbol for the word "crisis" combines the symbols of the words "danger" and "opportunity". This combination holds true in Alpha Phi Omega.

When the war began, then again when all men over eighteen became subject to military service, and later when the student reserves were called up, the membership of all college organizations was affected. The whole thing spelled "danger" for fraternities. Yet in Alpha Phi Omega that danger was turned into opportunity. The crisis opened new avenues for unselfish service in our chapters. It caused us to make "Service to the nation as participating citizens" the primary objective of our organization. It caused increased interest on the part of many faculty advisors. It proved that our program of Leadership, Friendship and Service is a practical, workable program in wartime as well as in peacetime. It proved that in the final analysis men of America are fundamentally interested in service to God, to country, and to fellowmen. It proved that the training and ideals we have received in Scouting in earlier years are "the real stuff" which will carry us through in times of uncertainties and strife.

Our chapters are pushing ahead this fall, beginning with very small numbers of members at the opening of the fall term and building up sizable pledge classes to proceed with a strong program.

Any crisis is just what we make of it. Let's continue to build Alpha Phi Omega more strongly this year than ever before and render every possible service to our nation toward victory and a permanent peace to follow.



Brother S. E. Scott of Gamma Rho Chapter recently taught the standard course in Red Cross first aid to a class of deaf mutes. In probably the most unusual class ever to meet at the North Texas State Teachers College, four students who could neither hear nor speak received Red Cross certificates after meeting the regular twenty-two hours for instruction and two hours for examination. All instruction was under the direction of Brother Scott, himself a deaf mute. He had previously completed the instructor's course under Professor W. G. Cooper, Red Cross coordinator at the college and senior faculty advisor of Alpha Phi Omega.

Brother **Frank Vernon**, treasurer of Beta Sigma Chapter, has been elected president of the senior class of Texas Technological College.



WISCONSIN BROTHER WINS AIR MEDAL IN SICILIAN CAMPAIGN

For meritorious service in flying bombing raids against the Axis in Sicily, Brother Mautner has been awarded the Air Medal. He is a pilot with the "Avengers" medium bombardment group. By flying on subsequent missions, he has qualified for three Bronze Oak Leaf Clusters to the Air Medal, the war department announced.

The "Avengers" operated in close support of the British Eighth Army in the Tunisian campaign and helped them smash into Tunis. Later they joined in the attack on Pantelleria and were an important factor in the final reduction of that Italian fortress in the Mediterranean.

Brother Mautner was studying chemical engineering at the University of Wisconsin and was an active member of Beta Theta Chapter of Alpha Phi Omega and he enlisted in the air force the day after Pearl Harbor.


PROTECT YOUR HOME FROM TUBERCULOSIS

In the face of a wartime rise in tuberculosis, local tuberculosis societies all over the United States point out three fundamental facts. First, tuberculosis is an infectious disease and should not be thought of as an act of God or an inherited disease. Second, tuberculosis causes no symptoms in its early stages making advisable chest X-rays for all persons possible. Third, tuberculosis is curable by early diagnosis and prompt treatment. Funds to help stamp out tuberculosis are needed now in increased amounts. Sales of Christmas Seals for 1943 are depended upon to pay the cost of fighting this serious disease in the coming year.

Here is an opportunity for Alpha Phi Omega chapters to render a valuable service. Each chapter is asked to have a committee contact the Christmas Seal chairman in its community and arrange to back the sales of Christmas Seals on the campus.
