This convention promises to be the largest gathering held thus far in Alpha Phi Omega. The program will be thorough, covering all phases of our fraternity activities.



William E. Slesnick
Receives Rhodes Scholarship

Entering the University of Oklahoma in 1941, Bill immediately affiliated with a local Scout Troop and with Pi Omega, the local service fraternity which was preparing to petition Alpha Phi Omega for a charter.

While a freshman, was elected to membership in Phi Eta Sigma, freshman honor fratternity; was elected Scout Governor of Oklahoma to serve during Scout Week, 1942; received Pi Mu Epsilon mathematics award; became a charter member of Delta Beta of Alpha Phi Omega in May 1942; and received an appointment to the U.S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, on the basis of a competitive examination.

He entered USNA as a midshipman in the summer of 1942 and graduated (70th in a class of 1049) with a BS degree in 1945.

Commissioned an ensign upon graduation, he went to sea for the next two years. He then decided on career as a mathematician and resigned naval commission in July 1947.

He returned to Oklahoma and reentered University of Oklahoma as a senior, studying advanced undergraduate mathematics, and as a candidate for a BA degree, reaffiliated with Alpha Phi Omega and served on campus and community projects committees, as vicechairman of membership committee, and as chairman of nominating committee. Served as Post Advisor of Explorer Scout Post 222. Elected to membership in Pi Mu Epsilon, honorary mathematics fraternity; to membership in Pi Lambda Phi, social fraternity; and to post of Senior Advisor of Phi Eta Sigma. Received BA degree May 1948. He is an Eagle Scout and Vigil Honor member of the Order of the Arrow.

He received Rhodes Scholarship in December 1947, and has been accepted at Jesus College, Oxford, and will study mathematics there. Congratulations and best wishes, Bill.
