



needs of the group.
Focused education and activities are the major components of each visit.

Topics covered by Consultants include recruitment and retention techniques; APO education; developing a chapter brand on campus and in the community; enhancing pledge, service, fellowship

or leadership programs; and officer transition practices, including reporting responsibilities.

This past fall, three Chapter Consultants left home base in Independence, Missouri, and took the country by storm, visiting 69 unique chapters and extension groups in nine of the 11 regions.

Recruiting new students is vital to the growth of any chapter or group. Chapter Consultant Laurie Burns helped Delta Xi Chapter at Ball State University in Muncie, Indiana, understand the relationship between good recruitment techniques and a strong, diverse membership. The chapter of 15 active members welcomed 18 new pledges this semester and has the skills for long-term recruitment success.

Getting organized is a topic that the Consultants often touch on with students, especially with extension group members. The petitioning group members at Northwest Missouri State

possible so that members are able to make the most of their Alpha Phi Omega experience. One resource offered through the Chapter Services Department is the Chapter Consultant visitation program.

The goals of the Chapter
Consultant program include working
with chapter and extension group
members to develop leadership and
enhance programs and services;

with sectional chairs, regional directors,
regional extension coordinators,

University in Maryville were eager to learn about APO and welcome more students into the group. Chapter Consultant Samantha Benduha helped students build a calendar for the entire semester, including preparing service projects, fellowship events and leadership opportunities. She taught the group the importance of using each event as a long-term recruitment tactic.

Chapter Consultants also help chapters develop and put into practice SMART goals (typically these are specific, measurable, achievable, relevant and time-bound). Consultant Justin Taylor worked with members of Phi Xi Chapter at Austin College in Sherman, Texas, to implement their goals of connecting actives and pledges as well as keeping all levels of their membership engaged. The education piece revolved around valuing membership and realizing that every

brother and pledge has something unique to offer. At the focus event during his visit, Justin split the chapter into committees and each brainstormed activities that would engage the entire chapter.

Chapter Consultant success is not only determined through on-campus visits, but also through remote communication. Alpha Zeta Pi Chapter at the University of Maryland, Baltimore County, received visits in fall 2013 and spring 2014. Although the chapter did not have a visit this semester, its members have continued to reach out to the Consultant staff for support and have since developed a long-term officer transition plan and have actively sought opportunities to grow as leaders.

Some projects are conducted at other times of the year, and it is a joy to support the variety of ways brothers are serving their campus and community.

 provide all of the decorations and candy.



This gardening and outreach project at the Perry School Community Services Center was an extension of the ongoing partnership between the chapter and Little Friends for Peace. The improved garden will help feed people in the community and complement classroom sessions on respect, leadership and peace skills. The children at the center had the chance to learn tools to disarm conflict and serve others. The grant provided the funds to buy seeds and other supplies for the event.

 university facilities to teach everything from

drawing and painting to gardening and first aid. The brothers also served lunch and snacks. The grant enabled the chapter to get this new project off the ground and provided them the essential tools to make it an annual event.

 needed fleece for the blankets and gave
 them a chance to do more than their normal
 fundraising amounts would cover.


• Epsilon Lambda Chapter at Michigan


- Alpha Epsilon Zeta Chapter* at the


