





MESSAGE FROM THE NATIONAL PRESIDENT

There are two topics I wish to discuss. First, this edition of the *Torch and Trefoil* contains the names of all Alpha Phi Omega Torchbearers for the current year. These are alumni who have donated \$50 or more to the Fraternity.

It is extremely important that you understand the significant role these individuals, along with those persons who also gave but are not Torchbearers, have in the continued success of your Fraternity.

Alpha Phi Omega's operating budget is approximately \$400,000 per year. Almost ten percent of that amount comes from dedicated alumni with the remainder derived from undergraduate fees, merchandise sales and other income. In addition, we have a mortgage payment on our new headquarters that is met entirely through alumni donations over and above gifts to the operating budget.

Simply put, Alpha Phi Omega could not function as we are used to without all the alumni who helped with donations, both large and small, this year. For example, if we fall even \$10,000 short in donations to the operating budget, it is likely that immediate cuts in the hours of part-time employees, postage and printing would be necessary. That would mean slower responses to chapter or-


ders and inquiries, and fewer Chapter Bulletins or Service Hotlines.

I hope that our students appreciate the sacrifices that our alumni make to provide Alpha Phi Omega — you — with a portion of their hard-earned money. It is particularly gratifying to me that our alumni gave more money than ever in the midst of a recession when it was harder to give.

They do it for you and because of you. I wanted you to know that.

Second, at the Regional Conventions this fall, we tried something new — a workshop on diversity and sensitivity. Based on the responses I received from undergraduates, as well as faculty advisors, this experiment was a success.

The purpose of Alpha Phi Omega is to gather college students together under the principles of the Boy Scouts of America in order to de-

velop leadership, promote friendship, provide service to humanity, and further the freedom that is our cultural and intellectual heritage.

But which college students? The answer is all college students who agree with our principles and purpose.

Where do we find students who share our ideals? Human nature being what it is (and those of you who participated in the "Wellington Foundation" exercise at the regional meetings know what I mean), we tend to associate with persons like ourselves, be that race, religion, nationality, gender, field of study, or personal viewpoints. Only when we are willing to admit this tendency will we understand that the same phenomenon will occur in our membership programs if the search for

new members is primarily limited to those with whom we already associate.

In short, lack of prejudice or intolerance does not equate with diversity or sensitivity to divergent views. And because the purpose of Alpha Phi Omega is not limited to those like us, we must reach out to all college students who may share our ideals and make them feel needed and welcome.

As an example, if I must develop a formula for world peace, what are my chances of success if I seek only the views of white, male, catholic, American lawyers? I must confront the barrier of my "like me" comfort zone if I am to succeed.

The same is true of Alpha Phi Omega as it attempts to fulfill its noble purpose. We will not make this country or the world a better place through service and leadership — or at least will not be as effective as we could be — if our membership is not as diverse and inclusive as the student population in general.

Alpha Phi Omega will never reach its full potential until each of us recognizes the inertia that results when people just talk to and associate with people like themselves. We have a tremendous gift to share if we are willing to reach out to others different from us to identify a common commitment to the ideals of leadership, friendship and service.

After all, therein lies the true unity of Alpha Phi Omega brothers, and those to whom we reach have many talents and perspectives that can help our Fraternity realize the vast potential of its future.

LAMBDA OMICRON

On Friday, August 30, 1991, Lambda Omicron Chapter, along with Beta Chapter, participated in the annual Run-From-Pitt to fight autism. This is the 21st anniversary of the benefit Run in which the Pitt vs. WVU football game is carried from Pitt Stadium in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, to Mountaineer Field in Morgantown, West Virginia. Run-From-Pitt, a journey of over 80 miles, is the focal event of a two-semester fund-raising effort to create funds to combat autism, a severely incapacitating lifelong developmental disability.

The run begins at Pitt Stadium with a handoff from Panther head coach Paul Hackett to Beta president Lisa Ballehr. The ball is then relayed by members of both schools through Pittsburgh and along Route 19 to Morgantown, West Virginia. The concluding handoff is from WVU/APO "Run-From-Pitt" chairman David Richard to Mountaineer head coach Don Nehlen during pre-game ceremonies at Mountaineer Field.

To raise funds, runners collected donations as sponsorship for the run, and sponsored a Pass-a-thon, car washes, cookie sales, bingo, and a benefit picnic. Students hosted Run-From-Pitt parties where collections were made for donations to fight autism. Spawning more spirit in the Run, a "design the official T-shirt" contest was held. Locally the Pro Image Sportshop was the sponsor of the T-shirts. The shirts were then sold to raise more money for autism. Money canisters were placed in area merchant shops to collect donations. During the fall semester even more events were planned including a showing of "Rainman," a movie about an autistic person starring Dustin Hoffman. Last spring, Dan Torisky, National President for the Autism Society of America, and his son,

Eddie, who is autistic, were invited to make a presentation to the Lambda Omicron Chapter. The presentation was extremely memorable and informative to all who attended. Informational flyers about autism were also made and posted, informing people of the event and creating more autism awareness. ... Just-a-brother

As many of you know, in the Leadership Development Workshop and the Chapter Presidents Workshop, you are asked to fill out a card which includes a space marked "position in chapter." Frequently, brothers will say to me, "I don't have a position in the chapter, I'm just a brother" . . . or "I'm not one of the leaders, I'm just a brother." Brothers, you do have a position in the chapter, and I hope it is not as "just a brother."

Just-a-brother misses a chapter meeting because, well, he's too busy

and anyway, he just ordered out for pizza. An active brother shows up on time, and he's even planned to have breakfast with his little brother first. Just-a-brother complains because the chapter doesn't plan projects or parties in which he is interested, but never serves on any of the committees which make these decisions. An active brother sometimes suggests a project he likes, and might volunteer to be the chairman if others in the chapter are interested in it. Sometimes he attends projects in which he is less interested, because it meets his schedule or it is an important project to the chapter.

Active brothers are leaders, even if they are not elected to an office or appointed to chair a committee. The brother who makes sure everyone has a ride to the pizza party after the chapter meeting is a brother. The brother who cheerfully volunteers to clean up after the all-night-popcorn-

and-study session — and gets others to help out — is a leader. The brother who tries to find the compromise between opposing ideas at a meeting, is a leader. The brother who seeks out pledges or visitors to make them feel welcome in the chapter . . . he is a leader, too.

Every brother contributes in some way to a chapter's well-being. Being an active brother is a privilege and a responsibility. Active brothers work at projects. Active brothers make decisions at meetings. Active brothers are friends who encourage each other, help each other, and listen to each other. Active brothers know that, together, they can have more fun and can accomplish more work than they would on their own. Active brothers, like all good leaders, seek out ways to improve their understanding of themselves and the chapter, so that they can develop new and innovative ways of providing leadership, friendship, and service.

Does your service program reflect your membership?

Our membership policy has expanded considerably over the past 62 years, but one thing that we have always included in our membership is people with varying ideas and interests. Frank Reed Horton was impressed by the way Scouts of different religious and ethnic backgrounds could work and play together. This is certainly what he also wanted for Alpha Phi Omega.

We already ask your chapter to do projects in four areas of service: to the Campus, to the Community, to the Members of the Fraternity and to the Nation. Of these four categories, service to the fraternity members is easiest to overlook and service to the nation is certainly the most difficult to think up. Much more important than faithfully including an exact balance of projects in these categories is that your chapter Service Program is made of a list of multiple projects that represent the differences of your own members.

Is your Service Program balanced with respect to new projects and "traditional" service projects? Don't let your chapter Service Program become overburdened with "traditional" service projects. Having some traditional service projects on your calendar is a good idea. These projects somehow connect us with the chapter brothers that came before you and help to make your chapter more than a club. Traditional projects also contribute to a continuing positive image on campus. "Isn't Alpha Phi Omega the group that always helps with the campus blood drive?"

Make sure that everyone contributes to the Service Program. Don't just let the service projects chosen be a product of the Service Vice-President, the Executive Committee, or even the Service Committee. As the number of people who contribute ideas to the Service Program increases, so will the volunteers to serve as project chairs. In addition, the participation at your projects will improve proportionally to the input from chapter members.

Remember, as current members of your chapter, you are Alpha Phi Omega on the campus! Each member has not only a right, but a responsibility to contribute ideas and to somehow change the group for the better. Each member should feel good about the projects that the chapter selects. If your current active members aren't excited by or interested in a particular service project, there is no rule (that I know of) stating that the project can't be changed or eliminated. Your Service Program should not be filled in with projects selected because "We've always done it that way."

Having a wide variety of Service Projects is likely to help your Membership Recruitment efforts also. This diversity of existing projects will appeal to a wider, more interesting group of potential new members.

As you come to the end of your school year, ask yourselves three important questions:

- 1) Did our Service Program reflect the diversity of our members as well as the needs in our community?
- 2) How can we better obtain service project ideas from our members?
- 3) Should we do anything to increase the diversity and creativity of our Service Program next term?

Answering and acting upon the answers to these questions will not only improve your Service Program, but it will strengthen your chapter as a whole.
