ALPHA PHI OMEGA HOSTS A BOOTH AT THE SCOUTS BSA NATIONAL JAMBOREE





Alpha Phi Omega volunteers hosted a booth at the Scouts BSA National Jamboree on July 19-28, 2023! Not only were APO members able to spread the word about what APO is, they had the opportunity to connect with more than 15,000 Scouts, Venturers, Explorers, staff, volunteers and local community members!

Approximately every four years since 1935, which was delayed due to the Polio epidemic, Scouts BSA has assembled for a National Jamboree. During Jamborees, Scouts have opportunities to learn new skills, participate in fun activities, and, most importantly, meet other Scouts from across the nation. The COVID-19 Pandemic delayed the 2021 National Jamboree, however Scouts reassembled in July 2023 at the Summit Bechtel Reserve, located in Glen Jean, W.Va. Alpha Phi Omega has staffed a booth at National Jamborees for decades, and this year was no different.

The 2023 National Jamboree was the first National Jamboree that allowed female Scouts to attend and participate as members of Scouts BSA troops as opposed to attending as a member of Venturing or Exploring programs. Females represented more than 20 percent of National Jamboree attendees.

In addition to the female Scouts BSA troop member attendance, this National Jamboree was significant to all Scouts. As part of the National Jamboree, there was an unveiling ceremony for the "Ascending Eagle" statue which was created to "honor and inspire past, current and future generations of girls and women in Scouting."

Brother John T. Conover, Jr., Zeta Beta `88, served as the lead for the Alpha Phi Omega booth. While at the event, many Alpha Phi Omega members volunteered their time to make this happen.

Below is what Brother Conover had to say about his experience:

"I'm finally back from the 2023 National Scout Jamboree. I had the time of my life!

I attended two Jamborees as a youth. In 1981, I was immature. In 1985, I returned to Ft. A.P. Hill as a 'Jamboree Veteran', and absolutely rocked the Jambo. I never thought I'd have a Jamboree experience that surpassed 1985, but I was wrong.

At this Jamboree, I met wonderful National Eagle Scout Association (NESA) staff and volunteers, representatives from the BSA Alumni Association and informed hundreds of Youth Scouts about Alpha Phi Omega. I had an absolute blast!

Thank you to APO Eagles for the Alumni Association Distinguished Service Key (DSK). Now I need to earn this every day, and have fun doing it. This one's for you Jamie Conover Stewart, Zeta Beta '87, as you continue to inspire me to spread the news of Alpha Phi Omega every day!"






2023 FALL PLEDGE CLASS **NAMESAKE HONOREE:**

Rick Diles. Beta Sigma, '81


















Brother Diles, the oldest of four, was born in Lubbock, Texas. When he was young, he first learned of Scouting when his parents took him to a Cub Scouts meeting. He eventually earned his Arrow of Light, which is the highest accomplishment in Cub Scouts. The Arrow of Light is also the only award that transfers to Boy Scouts. When Brother Diles transitioned to Boy Scouts, he became a member of Troop 157. It was this Troop that helped guide Brother Diles to earn the rank of Eagle Scout. As he got older, when he wasn't participating in a Scouts activity, you could find him mowing yards for cash to buy gas for the motorcycle he shared with his brother Jeff, who was also a Scout. Living a life of service early on helped him develop his skills for university and beyond!

After living in Colleyville, Texas for a short while, Brother Diles found himself returning to his roots in Lubbock, Texas to attend Texas Tech University. There he joined Alpha Phi Omega, originally learning about APO because of its roots in the Boy Scouts of America. During his time at Texas Tech, he served as his chapter's Scouting chair, vice president of service and chapter president, before being elected as the Section 40 Chair his junior year. To pay for school, Brother Diles worked at a local dry cleaner for three years. He also changed his major from Petroleum Engineering to Business Administration because he wanted to be a BSA business professional. After graduation, he served as Beta Sigma's Scouting advisor for three years and was on the APO National Scouting & Youth Services Committee.

Brother Diles fulfilled his goal of working as a BSA business professional. He had the opportunity to work on

11 National Jamborees and World Jamborees, including lead roles in retail food and trading posts. For two of these events, he was the Director of Food Operations. This required him to manage a team of over 600 volunteers and hundreds of contractors over a three-week period. The team provided over a million meals. His service also includes rural and inner-city districts, regional sales, merchandise buyer and as director of three BSA supply departments: Merchandising, Sales and Licensing/ Business Development.

Apart from his work with APO and BSA, Brother Diles has served many other organizations, including his church, Big Brothers Big Sisters of America, United Way, Optimist Club, Lions Club, Babe Ruth Baseball and the Parent Teacher Association. For his contributions, Brother Diles was presented with chapter and sectional distinguished service keys, and the National Herbert G. Horton Service to Youth Award. He was also Beta Sigma's pledge class namesake in spring 2011.

Brother Diles is a member of APO's Society of Life Members, an Eagle Scout and the recipient of the BSA Silver Beaver Award. In 2020, after a 34-year executive career with the Boy Scouts of America, he retired. He now resides north of Dallas-Fort Worth, Texas, with his wife, Melody, who's also a brother of Beta Sigma Chapter. Additionally, Brother Diles has two children, one of whom is an initiate of Iota Mu Chapter at the University of South Carolina. Using his platform as the Fall Pledge Class Namesake, Brother Diles wants to bring his experience in Alpha Phi Omega and the Boy Scouts together to call for a renewal of leadership and service in the local community.



A Challenge to the Fall 2023 Pledge or New Member Class

Greetings brothers and those to be,

It is a stunning honor to be the 2023 Fall Pledge and New Member Class Namesake. As a boy, I learned about Alpha Phi Omega from a page in my Boy Scout Handbook. Years later, in the first week of my freshman semester of college, I spotted a poster promoting an APO recruiting "smoker". I remember hiking across campus thinking "What am I doing? I don't know anybody that'll be at this thing!" Now, 42 years later, I've made many dear friends because of that hike.

I challenge all fall 2023 pledges and new members to create an event that brings Scouts to campus and demonstrates APO as an active community leader, as well as expands your chapter's strategic service partnerships.

Hosting Scouts on campus is an exciting opportunity. Here are seven steps to consider:

- 1. Know your capabilities: Before you collaborate with the Scouting organization to develop plans, brainstorm activities that align with your chapter goals and campus resources. This could include campus tours, Badge Day, classrooms for training events, campus beautification, Eagle Scout & Gold Award Reception, Lock-in at Rec Center, etc.
- 2. Contact Scouting organizations: If your chapter isn't already connected via your advisors, reach out to the local councils of the Boy Scouts of America and Girl Scouts USA to express your interest in hosting them on your campus. Don't give up. If you don't hear back from the "office", reach out to individual "troops" via these tools:

- 3. Discuss ideas with the Scouting organization: Determine the number of Scouts, dates and any specific activities or facilities desired.
- 4. Coordinate logistics: Reserve classrooms well ahead. Be sure to consider parent parking in your plans. Liability waivers and insurance coverage may be required. Share any campus rules or regulations visitors need to follow and provide your guests with a point of contact for assistance during their visit. Don't forget dining options and restrooms.
- 5. Arrange chapter members and pledges to serve as guides for Scouts: Your team can assist with navigating the campus, answering questions and ensuring a smooth experience. If you need extra help, contact other campus service-minded clubs.
- **6.** Execute a great event: It's simple. Be a leader. Be a friend. Be of service.
- After the visit: Collect feedback from Scouts and your campus representatives to identify future improvement.

Remember, each Scouting organization may have specific guidelines and preferences, so please maintain regular communication throughout the process. If your interactions with Scouts goes well, who knows, you might just recruit a future Fall Pledge Class Namesake Honoree.



FISCAL YEAR 2021-22 FINANCIAL SUMMARY

The Fraternity closed the year with revenues lagging expenses by \$38,178. The Fiscal Year was centered on completing the strategic direction development and focusing the Fraternity's limited resources in the areas most needed to support chapters emerging from the pandemic.


Revenues continue to be driven by membership dues, which have been significantly impacted due to the reduction in membership. However, small growth in membership since last fiscal year ended the year in a more positive direction than the previous year. The generosity of donors to the Torchbearer Fund helped support the Fraternity during this critical time, closing the year at \$243,306. The Fraternity also received critical assistance from the Alpha Phi Omega Endowment, supporting programs like the 2022 APO Leader's Summit in Phoenix. The Fraternity was able to secure \$107,340 through the Employee Retention Credit (ERC) which assisted with gradual recovery from the economic downturn and inflationary pressures caused by the pandemic.

Expenses remained focused on delivering programs to members, maximizing the opportunities to deliver leadership learning experiences, service and friendship opportunities for members and alumni alike. In Fiscal Year 2021-22, the Fraternity was able to award 20 John Mack Scholarships totaling \$40,300 and 19 Youth Service Grants totaling \$7,980. The Fraternity saw the return of our first in-person national event since the pandemic, welcoming brothers to the 2022 APO Leader's Summit. This event brought together active members and alumni from across the country to focus on the future of the Fraternity, and through generous donations, we were able to provide travel grants and reduced hotel costs for some attendees. The National Office staff also made several strategic changes to reduce expenses such as telecommunications and delivering digital editions of the Torch & Trefoil, helping offset increases in expenses such as insurance fees.


Throughout Fiscal Year 2021-22, APO improved organizational communications, increased productivity and implemented new programs to continue to support our membership. The Fraternity's leadership team completed organizational restructuring and continued to utilize valuable staff resources.
